This week's schedule will continue east on 2nd Street, branching off of 2nd and North down Texas Street to 1st Street.

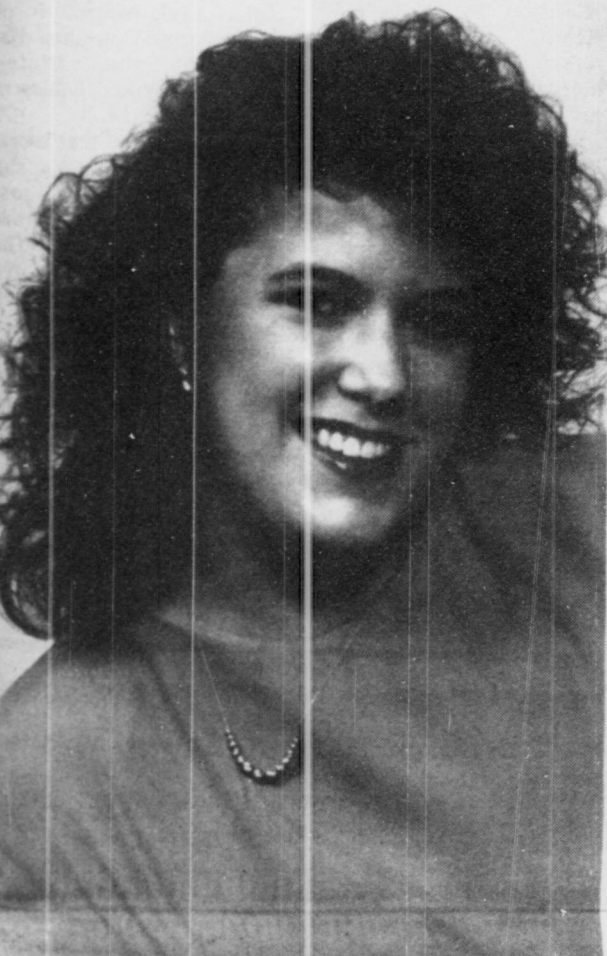
Water Superintendent Don Case said "There are no scheduled shut downs. The only time water will be off is if there is a break."

Miss Babcock will receive a \$200.00 scholarship at the end of her reign.

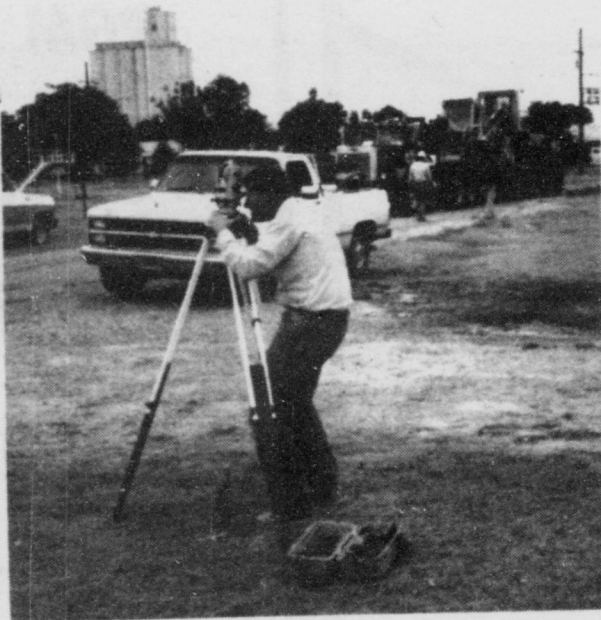
Susan's future plans are to attend college and possibly major in business or accounting.

## Tigers Overcome Slow Start To Beat Amherst, District Begins

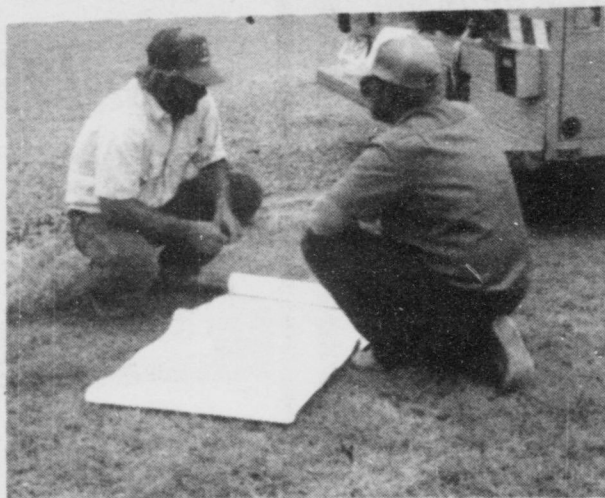

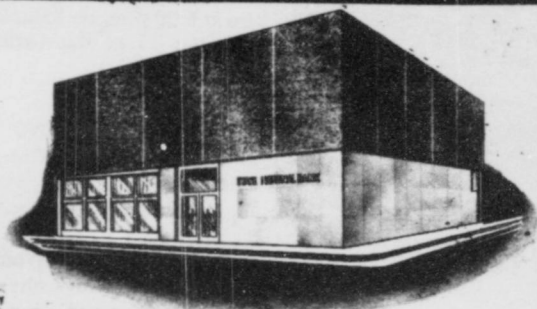

Motorola Bid with a \$838.00 addition for a six-cavity duplexer.

Sheriff Timmons said that Carson County recently received a \$110,000 Federal Grant that will pay for the new equipment. The balance of the grant, he said, will be used for first aid equipment, and a new phone system in the Courthouse.

"This will greatly increase the county-wide communication capabilities in times of emergency as well as the day-to-day law enforcement operation," said Judge Roselius.

"No bids were received for two surplus law enforcement cars; therefore, they will be placed in the Amarillo Auto Auction Sale.

Commissioners discussed commodity distribution for October, noting that butter, flour, peanut butter, honey and vegetarian beans will be distributed to eligible residents of the county.

A \$25,000 safe keeping receipt was released from the First Bank and Trust of White Deer.

The court was invited to attend open house at the Panhandle Alcoholic Recovery Center, 1600 Coulter, Building G, in Amarillo on Oct. 18 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Judge Roselius said "The center provides chemical abuse treatment for area counties. Residents are encouraged to visit the facility if they have someone who is in need of help because of chemical abuse."

The center is provided through efforts of county judges in the 26-county area of the Texas Panhandle.

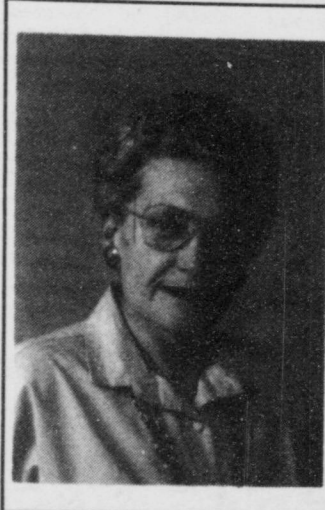

## Notice of Redistricting Hearing

The Senate Select Committee on Legislative Redistricting, chaired by Senator Bob Glasgow of Stephenville, and the House Redistricting Committee, chaired by Representative Tom Uher of Bay City, have held 13 hearings throughout the state since March of this year. The hearings are to receive testimony from interested individuals in preparation for drawing new district lines for congressional, legislative, and State Board of Education districts.

The Austin hearing, to be held on Friday, September 28, 1990, at the LBJ Auditorium, 26th Street and Red River, is the last of the currently scheduled interim hearings being held before the next regular legislative session.

For the Austin hearing, the committees will be seeking testimony regarding statewide redistricting issues as well as information concerning Austin and the surrounding area. The hear-

ing will begin at 10 a.m., with regional issues to be addressed in the morning and statewide issues to be taken up after a lunch break between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. If you would like to address the committees about issues regarding either the Austin area or redistricting in Texas in general, please plan to attend. In addition, the committees welcome written comments as testimony submitted either as a supplement to oral testimony or as an alternative to appearing before the committees in person.

The actual census numbers that will be used by the state for redistricting purposes must be provided to the legislature before April 1, 1991. At that time, the legislature will be requesting additional comments and more specific suggestions regarding new district boundaries. Your continued interest in redistricting is an invaluable addition to the success of the process.

## GOVERNOR PROCLAIMS FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Citing the loss of 300 lives and more than \$1 billion in property damage to fires during 1989, Gov. William P. Clements Jr. has proclaimed the week of October 7-13 as Fire Prevention Week.

"Fire continues to be a major threat to all Texans, particularly the very young and the very old," said James E. Saxton Jr., chairman of the State Board of Insurance.

During 1989, fires in Texas killed 292 people, injured more than 2,200 and destroyed an estimated \$1.125 billion in property, according to reports submitted by Texas fire See Fire, Pg. 13

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## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed an application with the Texas Public Utility Commission to introduce two experimental services called Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are optional call management services that will automatically forward a customer's incoming calls to a pre-designated number whenever that incoming call encounters a busy or don't answer condition. These services are for both business and residence customers. The company proposes that the services be available beginning November 19, 1990.

The monthly rates for Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are \$1.00 for residence customers and \$3.00 for business customers. The monthly rate for subscribing to both services is \$1.75 for residence customers and \$4.00 for business customers. During this experimental offering period the installation charges will be waived.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$752,000.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer will be offered on an experimental basis in selected areas throughout the state for 12 months. The availability of these services after that time will depend on Southwestern Bell's decision of whether to offer the services on a permanent basis.

## Why is Art In A History Museum

Generally speaking, history museums are dedicated to collecting, preserving, interpreting, and exhibiting objects which aid us in understanding and remembering the past. Typically these artifacts consist of things people used in some way; tools, weapons, toys, clothing and personal items. History museums also gather archival materials such as correspondence, diaries, business papers, and etc. All these objects tell us more about our past.

However, also revealing of our past, are those objects that were not "used" for anything other than aesthetic pleasure. In other words, those things of beauty which were "got" simply to be "looked at." By this I mean fine or decorative art being art-glass, ceramics, and silver, for example. For a history museum to aggregate these types of objects is to help us understand collecting taste and patronage in a particular

area. In the case of the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, the art collections we have compiled tell us: What kind of objects the citizens of the Texas Panhandle collected for their aesthetic pleasure; which artists they patronized; what kind of art appealed to them most. Knowing these things allows us to learn more about the people of the Panhandle. The types of objects they considered beautiful and important enough to collect remind us of the levels of sophistication found in this part of the world. It is for this reason that there are five galleries in which the permanent arts collection of the Museum is exhibited. Two additional galleries are planned.

The Museum's fine arts collection is exhibited in four galleries: Asian, Frank Reaugh, Texas, European and American. Next May the Museum plans to open a gallery for its decorative furniture collection, as well as a gallery for decorative arts. These seven galleries will allow Museum guests to share in the aesthetic

experiences the original owners felt while these objects graced their homes, while, simultaneously allowing the visitor to gain insight into the levels of artistic sophistication enjoyed by Panhandle residents. By giving these objects to the Museum, the donors felt that they could contribute to the aesthetic pleasure and art knowledge of future Museum patrons.

While there have been numerous donors, the arts collection at the Museum came from three main benefactors: James D. Hamlin of Farwell; Mrs. H.S. (Johnnie) Griffin of Wichita Falls; and Lucille N. Jones of Canyon. These three patrons gave not only their fine arts collections, but also their decorative arts and decorative furniture collections. Generally speaking, Judge Hamlin collected English furniture and paintings, Asian art, and American art as well as American furniture and decorative arts. Their gifts to the museum are the foundation for what is today an excellent art collection.

Most of the objects seen in the Asian art gallery were made for the tourist trade and indicate that Panhandle were not culturally chauvinistic in their collecting tastes. Using 541 works by Reaugh, most of which are from the artist's estate, the Frank Reaugh Gallery illustrates the career of one of the most celebrated painters in Texas's art history. A gallery dedicated to historical Texan art--art made in Texas before 1950--is a new development for the Museum and is intended to acquaint patrons with our own art history. European paintings and sculpture grace a fourth gallery in which the work of artists from Russia, Belgium, The Netherlands, Spain, Italy and Germany, is exhibited along with the Museum's extensive collection of British art. The British collection far outnumbers any other country and may be the legacy of British money interests in the settling of the Texas Panhandle. While the Museum has galleries for many different kinds of art, the

American paintings collection is by far the strongest, but that's a subject for another column.

Just as firearms, tools, utensils, and letters help us understand our past better, so, too, do works of art collected in our area. With this in mind, the PPHM's art collections are exhibited in permanent gallery situations to augment the aesthetic experiences of our visitors, educate them in art history, and intensify the love for beauty that is inherent in all of us. It was in this vein that our art collections were given to us and we intend to build on the legacy of past donors to continue to enhance the quality of life in the Texas Panhandle.

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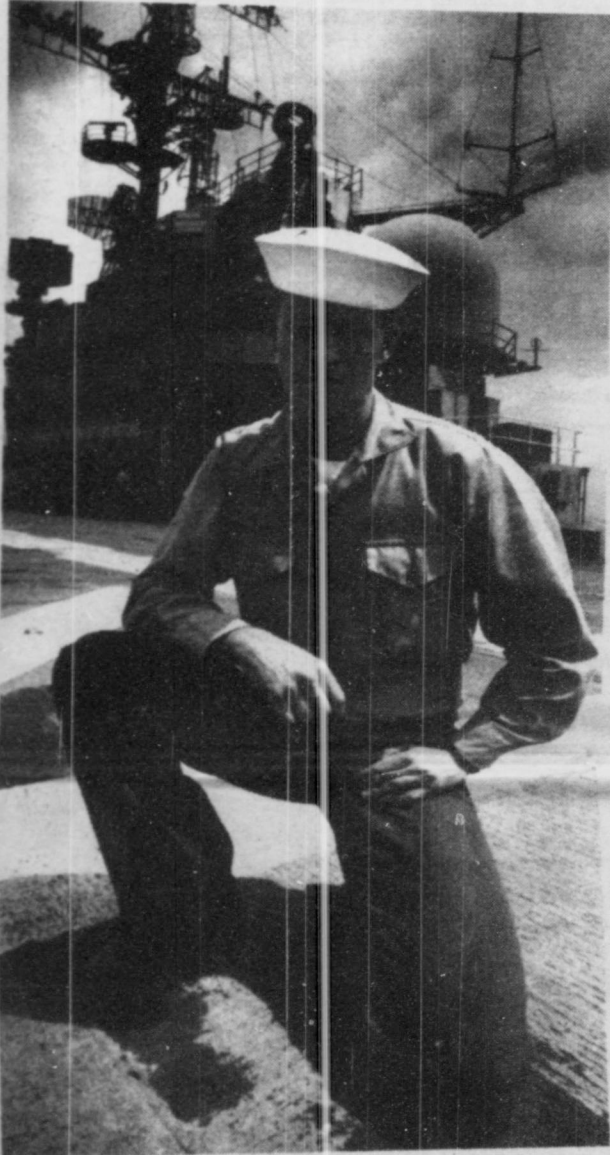

With the increasing interest in the history of the old U.S. Route 66 throughout the Texas Panhandle, comes the need to collect archives and artifacts related to it.

The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum is seeking photographs of people and places along "America's Main Street" for a proposed exhibit in 1991. Anyone having photos dating from the mid-1920s through 1965 is encouraged to call 806-656-2261 or write to the Research Center, Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, P.O. Box 967, WT Station, Canyon, TX 79016.

Needed are scenes from Shamrock, McLean, Alanreed, Groom, Conway, Bushland, Wildorado, Vega and Adrian. Amarillo is well represented by photographs in the archive; however, there may still be photos in private hands that would be invaluable in the interpretation of the route's history. If the owners of these photos are unwilling to part with them, the Museum would copies made.

John Kelleher, Jr., of Amarillo and currently a student at Brown University, spent many of his vacation hours this summer as a volunteer searching the files of Amarillo newspaper for background material for the exhibit. He found the following item in the Amarillo Daily News, dated December 5, 1928: Captioned "Get The Panhandle Out Of The Mud" the article stated, "The newest organization of this section of the Panhandle Highway Association. Its objective is worthy of the keenest interest of the entire citizenship, and no project undertaken in years holds such far reaching importance to the Plains country. The association's objective is the paving of Panhandle roads. Adopted slogan: "Get the Panhandle out of the mud."

John also located the following item in the Daily News, dated April 24, 1928: Captioned "Organize Fight Against Changing Route In City" the article stated, "The protests vigorously oppose a change in the road's routing which would take it off North Fillmore street as it enters Amarillo from the east and off 6th street as it leaves the city to the west. Property owners on both Fillmore and 6th streets declare they have gone to heavy expense in widening their streets in order to accommodate the traffic of the important highway, and that the changes would be unfair to them."

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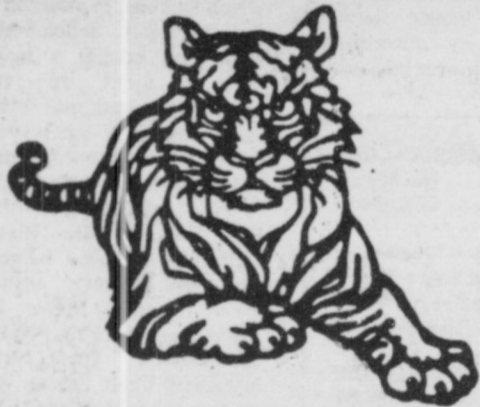
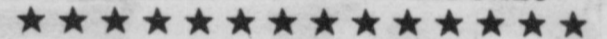

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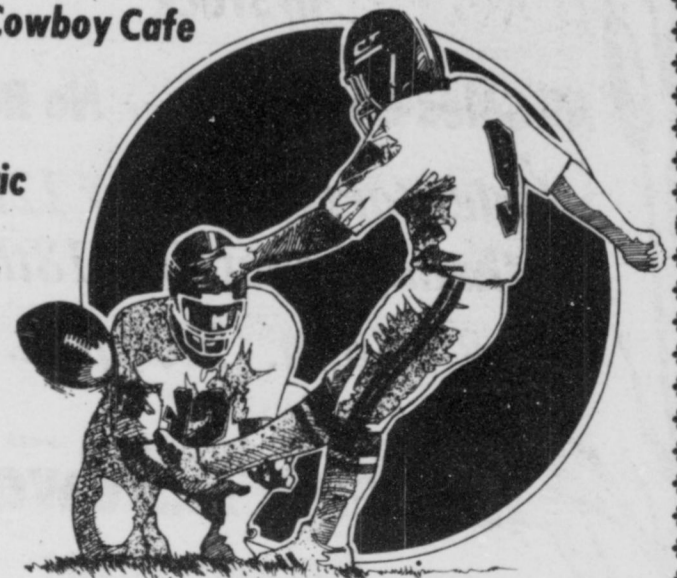

## YOUR SCHOOL

BY Rex Peeples

Schools are increasingly receiving pressure to raise students' test scores, lower the drop-out rates, cut budgets, and at the same time provide a multitude of student services and requirements. Because of this, many new and innovative programs are surfacing and are in a pilot study. One such project is

providing year-round education (YRE).

The traditional Sept.-June calendar used in most of our nation's schools was not originally designed for educational reasons. Rather, it was created to support the agricultural economy of the early 1800's. The questions being asked are: "What is the justification for continuing a nineteenth-century, agriculture-based school calendar in an urban/suburban nation only a few years away from the twenty-first century?" "How many students were asked to bring in the harvest last summer?" "Should not we instead be asked questions about students who have too

little to do during the long summer vacations?"

Proponents of YRE believe that a school calendar should enhance the learning process, not impede it. They maintain that a yearly schedule of shorter, more frequent breaks creates a more continuous flow of instruction, aiding in the retention of knowledge and learning to greater achievement gains. Research studies on YRE have shown many positive results for students, teachers, and parents.

One of the basic concepts being tried is the 30-10 method--go to school for 30 days (six weeks) and then off

for ten days (two weeks). With some minor modification for state testing and the Christmas Holidays, this schedule has been tried with proven success. This calendar is still utilizing the 175 student days.

The major result is expected to be that the students on the YRE calendar will retain more learning than students on the traditional school calendar. Other expected results are: 1) Student achievement will increase 2) Student discipline will improve 3) Student and teacher attendance will improve 4) Student, teacher, and parent morale will improve.

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## New Arrival

An election for Soil and Water Conservation District Director to serve in Zones one and two on the Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District is scheduled for October 11, 1990 at 7:00 p.m. at the Gray County Courthouse Annex on East Frederic in Pampa, Texas, announced Tony Smitherman, Chairman of the Board.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.

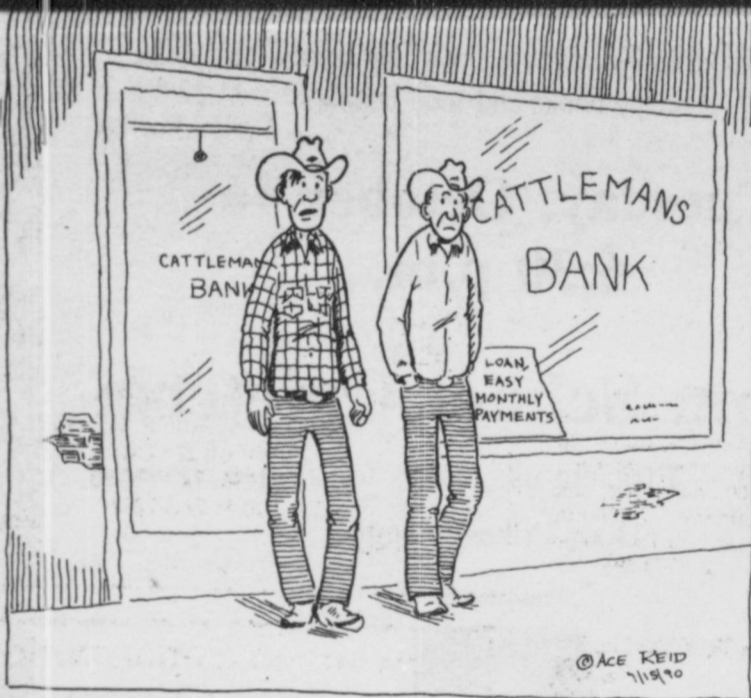
The district board of directors coordinates the conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.
