"This will greatly increase the county-wide communication capabilities in times of emergency as well as the day-to-day law enforcement operation, "said Judge Roselius.



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

## Notice of Redistricting Hearing

Senate Select Committee on Legislative Redistricting, chaired by Senator Bob Glasgow of Stephenville, and the House Redistricting Committee, chaired by Representative Tom Uher of Bay City, have held 13 hearings throughout the state since March of this year. The hearings are to receive testimony from interested individuals in preparation for drawing new district lines for congressional, legislative, and State Board of Education districts.

The Austin hearing, to be held on Friday, September 28, 1990, at the LBJ Auditorium, 26th Street and Red River, is the last of the currently scheduled interim hearings being held before the next regular legislative

session. For the Austin hearing, the committees will be seeking testimony regarding statewide redistricting issues as well as information concerning Austin and the surrounding area. The hear-

ing will begin at 10 a.m., with regional issues to be addressed in the morning and statewide issues to be taken up after a lunch break between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m. If you would like to address the committees about issues regarding either the Austin area or redistricting in Texas in general, please plan to attend. In addition, the committees welcome written comments as testimony submitted either as a a supplement to oral testimony or as an alternative to appearing before the committees in person.

The actual census numbers that will be used by the state for redistricting purposes must be provided to the legislature before April 1, 1991. At that time, the legislature will be requesting additional comments and more specific suggestions regarding new district boundaries. Your continued interest in redistricting is an invaluable addition to the success of the process.

#### **GOVERNOR PROCLAIMS** FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Citing the loss of 300 lives and more than \$1 billion in property damage to fires during 1989, Gov. William P. Clements Jr. has proclaimed the week of October 7-13 as Fire Prevention Week.

"Fire continues to be a major threat to all Texans, particularly the very yound and the very old," said James E. Saxton Jr., chairman of the State Board of Insurance.

During 1989, fires in

Texas killed 292 people, injured more than 2,200 and destroyed an estimated \$1.125 billion in property, according to reports submitted by Texas fire See Fire, Pg. 13

## **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company has filed an application with the Texas Public Utility Commission to introduce two experimental services called Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding -Don't Answer are optional call management services that will automatically forward a customer's incoming calls to a pre-designated number whenever that incoming call encounters a busy or don't answer condition. These services are for both business and residence customers. The company proposes that the services be available beginning November 19, 1990.

The monthly rates for Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding - Don't Answer are \$1.00 for residence customers and \$3.00 for business customers. The monthly rate for subscribing to both services is \$1.75 for residence customers and \$4.00 for business customers. During this experimental offering period the installation charges will be waived.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding -Don't Answer are expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$752,000.

Call Forwarding - Busy Line and Call Forwarding -Don't Answer will be offered on an experimental basis in selected areas throughout the state for 12 months. The availability of these services after that time will depend on Southwestern Bell's decision of whether to offer the services on a permanent basis.

Persons wishing to comment on these services should notify the commission by November 9, 1990. 

## Why is Art In A History Museum

by-Michael R. Grauer, Curator of Art

Generally speaking, history museums are dedicated to collecting, preserving, interpreting, and exhibiting objects which aid us in understanding and remembering the past. Typically these artifacts consist of things people used in some way; tools, weapons, toys, clothing and personal items. History museums also gather archival materials such as correspondence, diaries, business papers, and etc. All these objects tell us more about our past.

However, also revealing of our past, are those objects that were not "used" for anything other than aesthetic pleasure. In other words, those things of beauty which were "got" simply to be "looked at." By this I mean fine or decorative art being artglass, ceramics, and silver, for example. For a history museum to aggregate these types of objects is to help us understand collecting taste and patronage in a particular

area. In the case of the Panhandle-Plains Histolrical Museum, the art collections we have compiled tell us: What kind of objects the citizens of the Texas Panhandle collected for their aesthetic pleasure; which artists they patronized; what kind of art appealed to them most. Knowing these things allows us to learn more about the people of the Panhandle. The types of objects they considered beautiful and important enough to collect remind us of the levels of sophistication found in this part of the world. It is for this reason that there are five galleries in which the permanent arts collection of the Museum is exhibited. Two additional galleries are planned.

The Museum's fine arts collection is exhibited in four galleries: Asian, Frank Reaugh, Texan, European and American, Next May the Museum plans to open a gallery for its decorative furniture collection, as well as a gallery for decorative arts. These seven galleries will allow Museum guests to share in the aesthetic

experiences the original owners felt while these objects graced their homes, while, simultaneously allowing the visitor to gain insight into the levels of artistic sophistication enjoyed by Panhandle residents. By giving these objects to the Museum, the donors felt that they could contribute to the aesthetic pleasure and art knowledge of future Museum patrons.

While there have been numerous donors, the arts collection at the Museum came from three main benefactors: James D. Hamlin of Farwell; Mrs. H.S. (Johnnie) Griffin of Wichita Falls; and Lucille N. Jones of Canyon. These three patrons gave not only their fine arts collections, but also their decorative arts and decorative furniture collections. Generally speaking, Judge Hamlin collected English furniture and paintings, Asian art, and American art as well as American furniture and decorative arts. Their gifts to the museum are the foundation for what is today an excellent art collection.

Most of the objects seen in the Asian art gallery were made for the tourist trade and indicate that Panhandle were not culturally chauvinistic in their collecting tastes. Using 541 works by Reaugh, most of which are from the artist's estate, the Frank Reaugh Gallery illustrates the career of one of the most celebrated painters in Texas's art history. A gallery dedicated to historical Texan art--art made in Texas before 1950-is a new development for the Museum and is intended to acquaint patrons with our own art history. European paintings and sculpture grace a fourth gallery in which the work of artists from Russia, Belgium, The Netherlands, Spain, Italy and Germany, is exhibited along with the Museum's extensive collection of British art. The British collection far outnumbers any other country and may be the legacy of British money interests in the settling of the Texas Panhandle. While the Museum has galleries for many different kinds of art, the

American paintings collection is by far the strongest, but thats a subject for another column.

Just as firearms, tools, utensils, and letters help us understand our past better, so, too, do works of art collected in our area. With this in mind, the PPHM's art collections are exhibited in permanent gallery stuations to augment the aesthetic experiences of our visitors, educate them in art history, and intensify the love for beauty that is inherent in all of us. It was in this vein that our art collections were given to us and we intend to build on the legacy of past donors to continue enhance the quality of life in the Texas Panhandle.

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

# NOTES & TALES From OLD ROUTE 66 by D. Trew

If you read the paper and watch TV, it seems that an awful lot of alcoholic beverages are consumed today. Well, it happened in the old days too, there just wasn't as much to drink and the media didn't print it.

Every old timer can recall a still or a home brew place where alcohol could be obtained. We can't print most of these stories because of embarrassment to living citizens. Stories abound about the bootlegger and his hollow tree, leaving money at a certain culvert and going back in a few minutes to pick up whiskey. One bootlegger furnished liquor at the dances. You told him what you wanted inside the dance hall, and gave him money. He would leave and after a few minutes, you would follow him outside. He had a small bell that he would ring. You had to listen for the bell and find him in the dark. If he recognized you and all was well, you got your whiskey. If not, he would just disappear.

Old 66 had its drinking stories too. One group of people stranded in a blizzard at the Standish Motel in Alanreed, drank anti-freeze and died. Alanreed's nick-



name of "Gouge-eye" came from a saloon incident. The shoot-out in Alanreed that killed several people was the result of a drinking and fishing party that turned bad. Blood testing for alcohol wasn't done in the old days, so probably many of the wrecks on "Blood Alley" were probably caused by drinking

drinking. Several men tell of getting their first 'taste' by swiping whiskey from a bootlegger in McLean who lived by a motel. Seemed the motel owner arranged the sale and the man hid the bottle by fence posts out back to be picked up later. Two young men were supposed to be picking cotton by Old 66 when they happened on a stash in the field. As it was cold they made a nest in the cotton trailer and stayed drunk all day instead of picking cotton. Said they sure got a licking when they got caught.





## Dr. Charles Sisk Opening Pampa Practice

Charles W. Sisk, MD, is opening his office in the Coronado Medical building Coronado adjacent to Hospital in Pampa this week. Dr. Sisk is a specialist in internal medicine with an emphasis in the treatment of arthritis and rheumatism.

Dr. Sisk's wife Betty is a native of Pampa. Her mother Margaret Wells lives

Dr. Sisk said that as a specialist in the treatment of arthritis and rheumtism he is qualified to use different types of treatment for the relief of arthritis symptoms. He uses immuno-suppressive, medications, joint aspirations, and injection of joints among other treatments for the disease.

Dr. Sisk has been in private practice in Kansas City, Missouri since 1978. He served as an associate professor of medicine in the division of immunology and rheumatology at the University of Missouri Medical Center in Columbia, Missouri from 1975 to 1978. He has served as the director of medical and scientific affairs for the Arthritis Foundation in New York:research coordinator

for the department of medicine and surgery of the Veterans Administration, Central Office, Washington, D.C.; and assistant professor of preventive medicine at Kansas University Medical Center, Kansas City, Kansas.

Dr. Sisk received his medical degree from the University of Illinois





Schools are increasingly receiving pressure to raise students' test scores, lower the drop-out rates, cut budgets, and at the same time provide a multitude of student services and requirements. Because of this, many new and innovative programs are surfacing and are in a pilot study. One such project is

education (YRE).
The traditional Sept.-June

calendar used in most of our nation's schools was not originally designed for educational reasons. Rather, it was created to support the agricultural economy of the early 1800's. The questions being asked are: "What is the justification for continuing a nineteenth-century, agriculture-based school calendar in an urban/suburban nation only a few years away from the twenty-"How first century?"; many students were asked to bring in the harvest last summer?"; "Should not we instead be asked questions about students who have too

providing year-round little to do during the long

Proponents of YRE believe that a school calendar should enhance the learning process, not impede it. They maintain that a yearly schedule of shorter, more frequent breaks creates a more continuous flow of instruction, aiding in the retention of knowledge and learning to greater achievement gains. Research studies on YRE have shown many positive results for students, teachers, and parents.

One of the basic concepts being tried is the 30-10 method--go to school for 30 days (six weeks) and then off for ten days (two weeks). With some minor modification for state testing and the Christmas Holidays, this schedule has been tried with proven success. This calendar is still utilizing the 175 student days.

The major result is expected to be that the students on the YRE calendar will retain more learning than students on the traditional school calendar. Other expected results are: 1) Student achievement will increase 2) Student discipline will improve 3) Student and teacher attendance will improve 4) Student, teacher, and parent morale will improve.
