The national bee is open to all students, 16 years of age and under, through the 8th grade.

The project will consist of the construction of eight to 12 flood water retarding structures along the creek in Gray and Carson Counties.

The cost of the program will be shared by the federal and state

Duane Bartee of the Gray County SCD said surveying and gathering easements for the structures will take approximately two years. He said construction will then get underway with work to be contracted on a bid basis.

Actual construction should take only about one year, he said, The project will cover approximately 226,000 acres along the creek. Evelyn Mason, Gray County AS CS office manager, makes the lowing report on results of the farm certification method of measurement used in this county in 1965:

This was used on wheat, barley, corn and grain sorghum and the farmer reported his own acreage after he had measured it himself. of the reported farms were spotchecked for accuracy. One hundred sixty-three farms were spot-checked on all the reported crops. On these 163 farms the wheat and all the feed grain was measured for comparison with the farmer's report. On 97 of this group, the farmer's report was used completely on all crops. On 66 of the farms checked, the measured figures were used for at least one crop.

The changes found on spot-checks did not make anyone in the county ineligible for payment. The changes ound amounted to a small acreage and did not throw anyone out of compliance on any program.

Final payments are being made now. Most wheat payments have been made and feed grain is being paid. All payments on all farms should be received within the next very few weeks.

Final cotton payments are also being made now and will be completed shortly
