Groom's Broadway To Receive **Much Needed Curbing By City**

In a regular meeting of the Groom City Council last week, members voted to repair the curbing on the east side of Broadway, block 99 for 53 feet. The owners of the property will pay half the cost. One of the main businesses effected will be the Groom News.

In other business a sick leave policy was adopted for all regular full time employees. The policy handbook shall read: Regular full time employees compensation for absences due to illness, injury, or other extreme circumstances

that may arise, upon approval by the city council. Employees shall be entitled to one hour to eight hour per month sick leave up to 96 hours per year. This shall receive full time may be extended to certain circumstances as deemed necessary by the city council.

Termed a "miracle" by a witness traveling from Oklahoma City as she described the near fatal tragedy for a family of eleven, enroute to California from Pennsylvania.

Saturday afternoon the van travelling four miles east of Groom blew a tire, flipped over in the center median before coming to rest, disrupting the trip of the Polishchuk family.

"I was behind the vehicle, but had not activated any emergency lights when I saw a big cloud of smoke come out of the back when the right rear tire blew," Holland said.

The family, originally from Russia, consisted of seven children, their parents and one set of grandparents. The family had been to Pennsylvania to pick up the grandparents and was returning to the residence at Hesperia, Calif.

GROUNDWATER DISTRICT The Texas Water Development Board (Board) today approved a \$500,000 agricultural water conservation loan to the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District No. 3. Funds will be used by the District to make low-interest loans to individual farmers to purchase and install more efficient irrigation systems.

The District covers all or parts of the following six counties in the Panhandle: Carson, Gray, Donley, Armstrong, Potter and Roberts. The area covers 2,350,080 acres.

DOT CHALLENGES HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS IN ESSAY CONTEST

In honor of its 25th anniversary, the U.S. Department of Transportation today announced a nationwide essay contest open to high school students challenging them to map out a course for transportation that will meet the needs of tomorrow.

The essay contest, entitled "Transportation: Planning Today for Tomorrow's Needs," encourages students to focus on futuristic transportation technologies, including intelligent vehicle highway systems, high speed rail, global satellite systems, hypersonic aircraft and alternative fuels. Students who write essays should also address environmental and safety concerns as well as examine transportation problems expected to be faced because of future growth and shifts in population and lifestyles.

"We want high school students to think creatively about the transportation system of the future," said Secretary of Transportation Andrew Card. "More importantly, we want these students to consider careers in transportation, working to address the challenges of the 21st century."

Essays should address the stated topic, not exceed 1,000 words, and charts, graphs or other materials are optional. Students should incorporate local examples as much as possible. All essays should be submitted to the U.S. Department of Transportation, Office of Public Affairs, Room 10414, 400 7th Street, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20590 no later than April 17, 1992.



They were the first to bring a large capacity grain dryer to the area which permitted the farmers to bring in much wetter grain. Had it not been for this dryer and two more that followed, the 1991 milo crop would probably still have been in the field and a large part of it would have been

damaged or lost.

Roman also pioneered the first water sprinkler system to this area which have proven to be much more efficient than the old flooding system that was used before.

Roman was the first to plant irrigated corn here which has proven to be a profitable crop.

The 4th grade Little Dribblers is coached by Marshall Haynes, assisted by Clint Herndon.



"Celebrating 46 Years of Irish Galas" is the fitting theme selected by the Irish Micks and Lassies celebrate the 46th St. Patrick's Day Celebration in Shamrock, Texas.

This year there will be more events than ever. The people of Shamrock are working to assure that they keep the bragging rights for the biggest Irish Community Celebration this side of the Emerald Isle itself.

Festivities will Friday, March 20, with the pre-St. Patrick's Celebration banquet, featuring Tom

DeFrank at the National Guard Armory.

There will also be a Carnival that will last all weekend and a Chili Cookoff welcome party beginning




