The Groom Tigers win 1991 Homecoming game with a final score 56-14, against the Amherst Bulldogs.

Brian Baker rushed for 133 yards on 22 carries. He tallied three touchdowns on an 18 yard run, a 60 yard interception return and a fumble recovery in the end zone.

Paul McLaughlin also had a very good night scoring four touchdowns for Groom. Runs of 45 yards 10 yards and 5 yards scored three touchdowns. His total rushing amounted to 122 McLaughlin also caught a 26 yard pass from quarterback Bruce Britten to score his 4th touchdown.

Amherst fell short in first down making only 5 to Grooms 15. Contributing

to that was Grooms ability to pick off those passes. Baker, Britten and Kirk Webb all made interceptions.

Groom punts were averaging almost twice as far as Amherst, compare 40 yards to 25 yards. Kirk Webb handled the kicking duties for extra points and
