

Greetings:

It will be difficult to keep this letter short, but I'm going to try.

I have been working in the field of education for the past thirty one years. I have worked in three states: Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico. Financing education has always been a problem in all states; Texas is no exception.

I can assure you that taking money from one school district, or one geographical location and passing it on to another one is not the answer. Yes, I know that you think that you are at your wits ends, but you are not.

I think that I should tell you that if you were to seriously pursue this present course for school funding that you will be driving the citizens of the Texas panhandle out of Texas. Secession is a real issue and the instituting of this type of legislation would be the thing that pushes the citizens of the panhandle into final action. Have you seen what Kansas is doing?

If you are not aware of what we think about local education and local control, let me tell you that it is the most important thing in our educational philosophy. We do not want any more of our money leaving our area. I don't want Houston's money and I don't want Houston receiving any of my money.

I'm serious when I say, the panhandle of Texas will become serious about secession if you pass a financial educational package like you are planning. This not a threat - it is a fact

Do I have a plan? You bet. Let each school district finance their own education. It has worked in the past and it will work in the future. Government intervention is not the answer to school finance and it never will be



order who is committed to completing the walk-sees the potential for "American Indians, who have preserved a spiritual way of life against humiliation and oppression...to liberate humanity from the danger of annihilation, to show a way to break through the deadlock of the United States, so that cruel history will never be repeated." He and some other walkers beat small hand drums and chant the words of Buddha,

Kyo." Dennis Banks--longtime activist and co-founder of the American Indian Movement in 1969-spoke to the spiritual walkers as they passed through San Francisco's financial district at the beginning of their journey: "This is the year we say goodbye to Columbus...This place where you are starting out represents financial power. On October 12 you come to the place of political power. None of this is spiritual power. The spiritual power

"Na Mu Myo Ho Ren Ge

is in all of you...You've seen the crumbling of power in the Soviet Union. These buildings too will fall when there is spiritual power here, inside." In 1978 Banks and others organized the Longest Walk (the model for this journey), which grew from fifteen participants to tens of thousands by the time it reached the U.S. Capitol.

Walkers cover around twenty miles per day in sunshine, ran, or snow along city and suburban streets, small roads or interstates. They are hosted by

groups in the towns they pass through, holding meetings to explain their purposes and to discuss the problems of Native Americans in the past 500 years and the potential for renewal. Walkers can join the group for any length of time--one day or 9 months.

Our beautiful mother earth is in pain. Financial and political policies create poverty for native people and others here throughout the world and risk annihilating the planet
