McLean ISD Trustees Vote No To Lawsuit Fee, Hire Seven New Employees

The McLean I.S.D. voted in a split decision not to approve payment for litigation costs to the Gray County Appraisal District. The \$3,071.62 bill was the school district assessed share of the settlement in the Hocchst Celanese lawsuit. Trustee Magee made the motion not to pay the Appraisal District because McLean ISD did not share in the proceeds from the lawsuit settlement. Those supporting the move not to pay were also Bill Thomas, Jake Hess and James Hefley. Voting to pay were Gwen Henley, Steve Brass and Thacker Haynes.

Seven new employees were hired to round out open staff positions.

The board, with the help of the Band Boosters, interviewed two men for the band teacher's position during the meeting and the board hired Jerry Sparks of Spearman to fill that position.

Other personnel hired and the positions they will teach were: Kurt Moser, physical education; Lori Hamburger, science; Clayton "Chuck" Hill, social studies; June Close, first grade; Bonnie Richert, math; and Jan Moser, library aide.

The school board also approved a contract with Scholastic Analysts, a teacher appraisal service. The cost of the service will be an estimated \$100 per teacher evaluated. The

appraisal team has a pre-conference with those to be appraised and explains the process. Teachers are met with individually, an evaluation is completed and a post-conference is then held.

The outside appraisal team's review will count as 40 percent of the appraisal, with the school principals' appraisals making up the other 60 percent, Superintendent Stanley Lamb said.

In unrelated business, the board accepted the low bid of Larry Swanson with Swanson Construction for renovation to the portable concession stand used at football games and other functions. Swanson bid \$2,850 on the project.

The board also accepted the \$3,470 low bid of Swanson for the construction of storage cabinets in the business office.

Swanson was also awarded the bid for the installing of new playground equipment. Swanson bid \$3,275 on that project. Lamb explained that the playground equipment must be installed according to specifications. The equipment will have a cement retaining wall, underground piers and reinforcement bar.

"It's made a certain way and has to be installed a certain way," Lamb told the school board. "If we don't

install it properly, we're liable (in the event of an accident), not the company who manufactured the equipment."

The board also unanimously voted to reopen the bidding process for a termite treatment at the football stadium.

The board approved the preliminary 1991-92 budget, which Business Manager Shirley Johnson said is basically the same as last year's budget. She told the school board that the state wants the budgets approved by the end of August, although there are still many financial uncertainties for school districts across the state because of the recent school finance reform legislation.

Johnson said the state has said school districts can come back later and amend their budgets as needed. The estimated budget for the McLean ISD is \$1,384,000. The school district is expected to have an estimated \$133,000 operating deficit. Johnson stressed that all the figures she could give the school board at this time are tentative.

Johnson also reported that health insurance costs for the school employees are going to be significantly more, especially for the ones who have dependant coverage. She suggested that the school district pay

15 percent more per employee to help the employee.

The school district last year paid \$92 per employee for insurance with the employee picking up the remainder. On a motion by Brass and seconded by Henley, the board unanimously approved paying \$105.80 per employee to help with insurance costs. The increase will cost the school district \$6,789.60, Johnson said.

In other business, the board: canvassed ballots from Saturday's election; approved minutes of a prior meeting; heard a report from Henley, the board's representative to County Education District 14; set 5:30 p.m. Aug. 29 as the date for a public hearing on the 1991-92 budget; unanimously voted to accept a new school bus as is and see about having it painted after it has arrived. The bus was scheduled to be painted black with "Fighting Tigers" in white, but that was going to cost \$3,500, Lamb reported, which was more than the school had budgeted; unanimously approved a revised complaint procedure; heard from Lamb, on gym use and control. It was decided that gym use rules will be strictly enforced.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

School has begun. So far - so good! Everyone is here and things are rolling.

Unofficial enrollment figures are as follows:

Kindergarten - 11, First - 9, Second - 19, Third - 12, Fourth - 21, Fifth - 14, Sixth - 15, for a total elementary of 101 students. Seventh - 16, Eighth - 21, Ninth - 19, Tenth - 26, Eleventh - 15, Twelfth - 20, for a total jr. high and high school of 117 students. The grand total for the school is 218 students.

School enrollment at the end of school last year was 217. So, no big increase, but no decrease, either.

Living in the McLean Community is a privilege and being involved with the McLean Schools is a privilege. I realize that many of our students do not believe that, but they will someday. The best schools in America are the rural schools. We have little or no crime, minor drug problems, and overcrowded classrooms are not a problem.

Teachers and parents are all genuinely concerned about all of the school students and their success in the school program. That can't be said of large urban school systems. I hope that I can help our student body realize some of the good aspects of attending a small school like McLean I.S.D.

We welcome parent's questions or comments. I believe with all of us working together for the good of our students, we can provide an outstanding place for our children to gain their education.

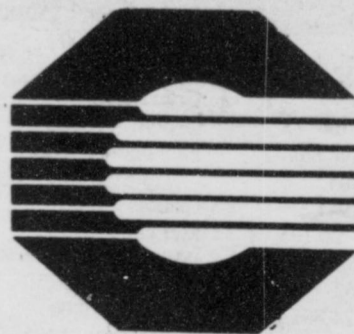

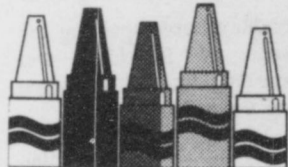
