Despite Mother Nature's bad temper here lately wheat harvest is progressing nicely.

16 State EMT Exams Given

On March 3, eighteen people enrolled in a E.M.T. (Emergency Medical Technician) class in Groom. Dave Bulla, instructor for Amarillo College agreed to teach the 16 week, 14 Continued Education Hour course.

The course included classroom instruction, practical application and on the field experience. Each student was tested by State Skills Examiner in CPR, Oxygen Therapy, Patient Assessment, Traction Splinting, Bandaging and Splinting. Classroom knowledge was also tested and the student must have obtained a 70 average to qualify for the State EMT Exam. Clinical hours were summed up with an average of 24 hours in St. Anthony's Emergency Room and at least three ambulance runs with the Amarillo Emergency Medical Service (most students received numerous numbers of ambulance calls, during their hours at the EMS Center).

Of the 18 that started the course 16 were present for the State Written Exam held in Amarillo this past Tuesday. Those who qualified for testing were: Laverne Thomas, Kay Holland, Toni Pavlovsky, Bobby Wakefield, Tony Painter, Brent Stephens, Jeremy Thomas, Doyle Lee, Don Scott Hagy, Brandon Colpetzer, Kurt Shults, Donald Burgin, David Hinson, Kevin Kerlee, Pat Britten and Charlotte Whatley.

Pam Biggs/Paramedic of Panhandle assisted Dave Bulla with the class and was on hand for testing.

Students will receive written acknowledgment in the next three weeks, whether they passed or failed.

Groom students wish to thank Groom Lions Club members for making the class available, along with the Groom Ambulance Service. David Britten and Brent Stephens are to be commended for their moral support and extra push, when many of us got tired and frustrated along the way.

Post Office Labeling Slowing Down Out Of State Paper Delivery

It has come to our attention that our out of state customers have not been receiving their papers until 10 to 15 days after publication.

Let us at the Groom News assure you, first off, that the papers have not failed to be in the Groom Post Office on Wednesday evening before the Thursday publication date in a very long time.

Most times they are transported that day to Amarillo for distribution.

We think where the problem has come in is the new mail bag labeling system the post office has implemented. In the past out of state papers were shipped to Amarillo and sorted there to go out to their respective states. Under the new process, papers are sent in bulk to

Amarillo then to Dallas before they are sorted for distribution.

Groom Postmaster Doris Kuehler said, "We did what they (the Postal Service) asked us to do, by using the new labels for the Dallas location. Apparently there must be a bottle neck somewhere."

Upon discovering the problem Kuehler contacted area supervisors in Lubbock. Doris Coursey, a member of the Mailing Requirements Unit, said that they would put out a publication watch to try to pinpoint the problem, and for now return to the old labeling system.

We, at the Groom News, regret this delay. Please, if your paper fails to reach you in a reasonable length of time tell your local post office so with their help we can correct this problem.

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

Smitherman's Look For Excellent Peach Crop

Tony and Monta Gene Smitherman who live about three miles southwest of McLean began raising peaches about six years ago and have added about 300 more trees since that time on the four acre orchard.

This is the only irrigated orchard in this area.

Despite the late freeze, rain and hail, they seem to have a big crop again this year.

In 1989 they sold their first peaches, they had just a few because of the hail that

year. In 1990 quite a few peaches were sold and 1991 has been the best year so far.

The Smitherman's have several varieties, Sur-Crop, Sentinel, Ranger, Sun Prince, Majestic, Rustin Red, Contindor, Bounty, New Haven, Jefferson, Indian Red (white peach) and Alberta.

They come off at different times, about every seven days there are some getting ripe. When one is finished up another one is getting ripe. The Albertas and Indian peaches come off in August.

The peach orchard has to be maintained throughout periods other than picking

season. In the fall the trees have to be sprayed for

boreds and soon after the blooms start shucking in the spring they conduct several sprayings for insect control. Every tree has to be pruned each year in late winter. Most trees will produce fruit for 15 to 20 years.

Monta Gene said they chose to put in peach trees because they believed the demand would be better. They are the only peach operation in Gray County.

If you are out driving around you can usually see several cars at their place, all eager to purchase the big, sweet, juicy peaches.

At press time the Smithermans were out of peaches for a few days.
