Melvin Wills reporting 1" to 1:30" of rain Sunday night around Groom.

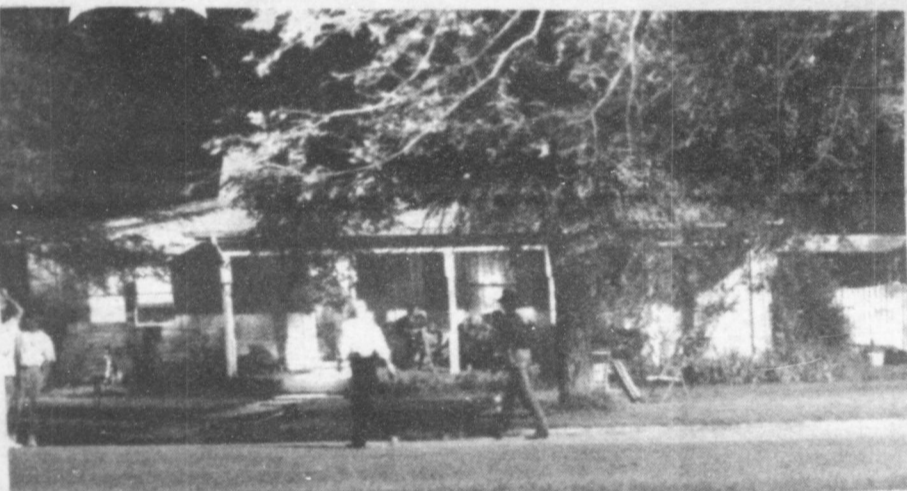

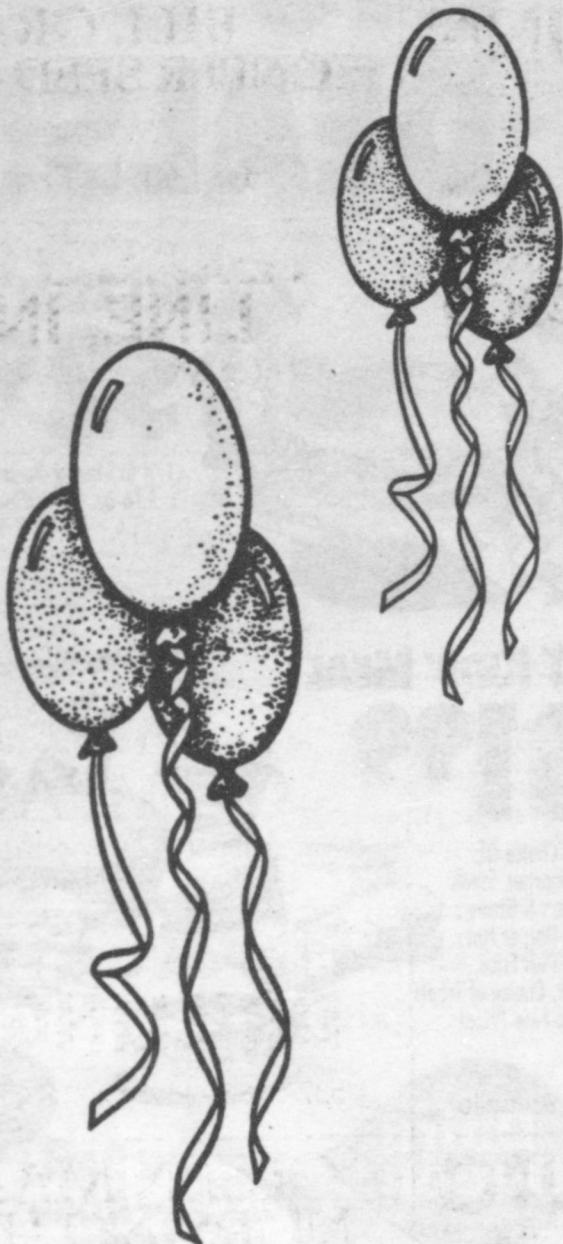

SHERIFF'S REPORT**

It has been said that an army travels on its stomach. Movie companies are very similar. If not fed often and well very little work gets done.

Frank Woodward and crew know this all too well. For many years his business, 4-Star Catering, has been feeding the multitudes at movie sets all over the United States.

"We paid him off at the end of the show. . . he was really more of a sponsor than a partner. . . all he ever asked of us was that we be the best," said Woodward.

Cooking for so many people out of the back of a semi-truck would be terribly difficult for most people, let alone the kind of gourmet meals they prepare, not to

mention the hundreds they feed.

"I think the most I have feed at one meal was 5,000 during the shooting of Harlem Nights," said Woodward.

"Conditions are many times difficult, such as the remoteness of our location during the shooting of Dances With Wolves, we were 60 miles from Pierre, S.D. The last ten miles was across an open field. We had to truck in water and

everything else we need."

Woodward has three other trucks and usually works nine months a year. True to form on the last night of shooting here in Groom, the cast and crew and friends dined on lobster and tenderloin. The cafeteria never looked better with its red linen tablecloths and white napkins. They were also serenaded by a stringed quartet from the Amarillo Symphony. If you asked me I'd give 4 Star Catering at least 10 stars.

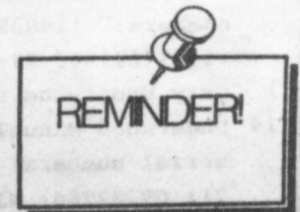

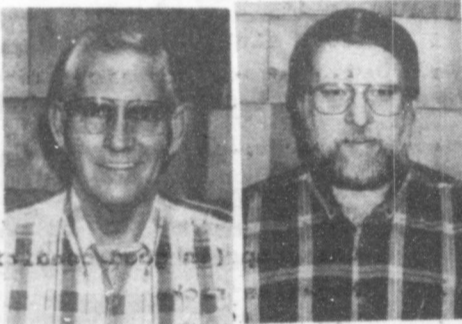

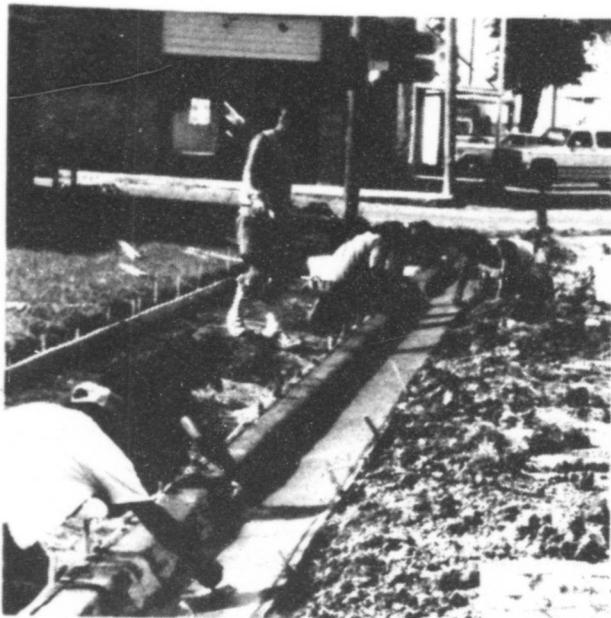

Major To Receive N.A.C.A.A. Award

Jett V. Major, County Extension Agent-Agriculture for Hockley County has been selected by the National Association of County Agricultural Agents Association to receive the N.A.C.A.A. Distinguished Service Award. The D.S.A. is the highest award given by the N.A.C.A.A. It is a highly prestigious award that is awarded to less than three percent of the agricultural agents in the nation annually.

Major was selected to receive the D.S.A. because of his highly successful Extension educational programs in Hockley County.

He will officially receive his award at the N.A.C.A.A. annual meeting in Little Rock, Arkansas during the week of August 9-13, 1992. He will also be recognized along with the five other Texas D.S.A. recipients at the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association annual meeting in El Paso during the week of August 2-5.

He is a 15 year veteran with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. A native of Groom, Major began his extension career in 1977 as assistant county extension agent in Lubbock County. He then served as County Extension Agent-Agriculture in Floyd County for three years and Lamb County for eight years before assuming his current position in Hockley County in 1990.

Major has conducted a strong result demonstration program in all counties served and has focused his educational efforts primarily on water quality and conservation and agricultural diversification. Cotton is the commodity receiving most of his attention since all four counties he has served consistently rank among the top ten cotton producing counties in the state.

He has twice been recognized by TCAAA for his farm and ranch newsletter and he aggressively utilizes the mass media to reach his clientele with two weekly radio programs. A weekly

agriculture newspaper column, and a bi-weekly horticulture newspaper column during the growing season.

He has maintained an active 4-H program and has served as a trainer agent for the last 13 years. He has served as TCAAA state chairman for extension programs. District director for TCAAA, and district representative for the Alpha Zeta Chapter of Epsilon Sigma Phi National Extension honorary Fraternity.

Major has an associate of science degree in agriculture from Clarendon Junior College, a bachelor of science degree in animal science from Texas A&M University and a masters of science degree in agriculture education from Texas Tech University. He is married to the former Lynette Michael of Groom and they reside in Levelland with their 12 year old daughter Carey Jynette and their eight year old daughter Casey J'Lynn.

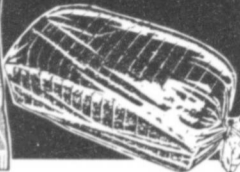

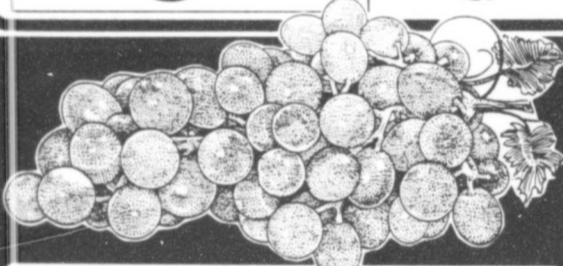
