Students in grades 7 through 12 who attended Groom ISD last year have already registered and have received schedules. These students do not need to come to school until the first day of classes, August 24.



NEWS FROM THE ASCS OFFICE

The final date to certify your acres of corn, grain sorghum, cotton and any acreages of ACR or CU/Pay or any other acreages not already reported, has been extended to August 14, 1992. If you have not done so already, you need to contact the ASCS Office to set up an appointment to report these acres.

August 14, 1992 is the final date to request measurement service on your acres of spring seeded crops. It is very important that acreage reports are accurate, since there is only a 5% tolerance on overstated as well as understated acres. If you are unsure of some or all of your acreage, measurement service will provide guaranteed acreage measurements at a reasonable cost.

In order to obtain a Commodity Credit Corporation Joan on your 1992 wheat, you must provide the ASCS Office with the following: Warehouse receipt from the storing warehouse. Pay storage to warehouse for 9 months. If your crop has a lien, you must obtain a lien waiver from the lienholder. Bring warehouse receipt, and applicable lien waiver to the ASCS Office.

Crop loan rates for 1992 in Gray County are as Wheat \$2.22/Bu; follows: \$1.65/Bu; Oats Barley \$.91/Bu; Corn \$1.90/Bu;Gr., Sorgh. \$3.09/Cwt.

CARSON COUNTY SHERIFF'S REPORT


