## Board Lowers Local Tax Rate By $12^{\text {c }}$, Offsets CED Increase

In a special meeting of the Groom School Board, trustees unanimously agreed to lower the local tax rate by approximately 12 cents. This decrease will be offset by the state mandated by the state mandated
increase of approximately 12 increase of approximately 12
cents by the County Education District (CED). What this means in dollars and cents to taxpayers is effectively the same total tax paid in as last year. However, the school itself stands to lose not only the 12 cents but approximately $\$ 20,000$ in state Tier II funds.
In other words, as our local tax decreases, the school becomes ineligible for some tier II money. The District loses 59 cents for every $\$ 1.00$ that Groom ISD does not collect in local taxes.
I don't feel that we should pass on the 12 cents to our taxpayers just to receive $\$ 20,000.00$ worth of Tier II money" stated Superintendent Kenneth Sweatt.

In Benjamin
Al Homer wants to warn Tiger fans traveling to Benjamin for Friday night's football game. Al who lived in that country for 31 years was raised at Rhineland, 12 miles southeast of Benjamin. Al reported that back in the early 1950's he and Uncle John Homer (Paul Homer's dad) were going to visit Al's parents Killian and Mary Homer in Rhineland, arriving in Benjamin around meal time and not wanting to interrupt his parents meal, they
decided to stop in a cafe in Benjamin to eat. They ordered and were served two glasses of what Uncle John stated then as serving orange juice instead of water. But come to find out it was water from the red clay earth.
Former Mayor of Groom Al Homer said, "The water was later condemned by the government and water wells were dug across the Brazos River." Al continued by saying, "it's just something to think about traveling Friday it does get hot down there and the water, well, use your own judgement."

With a fund balance of roughly $\$ 600,000.00$ in C.D.'s the district can afford to dip into these reserves to make up the difference in the budget.
"We may be able to make up the deficit if we don't need to spend as much on technology as we have allowed, based on what we spent the last two years," stated Sweatt.
The board felt th technology may be an area where they may have over budgeted.
"Most of our technology computers etc. - are in good shape. Unless something unforseen happens we should not need the full amount budgeted. This would get us much closer to a balanced budget without dipping too far into our fund balance," he added.

In other business the trustees unanimously ratified the budget for 1992-93. Although some line item balances fluctuated the budget is effectively the same as last year's $\$ 1.35$ million.
Discussion was held concerning the site based managernent plan. This way of work would consist of a council made up of teachers, non-faculty
members, parents, busines people and non-teaching professionals. Their purpose would be to provide input and recommendations to the board on aca bjectives performance bejectives, permanc objectives, goal setting, budgeting and curriculum The board approved the plan and timeline for implementation. It will now need to be approved by TEA in Austin. The district hopes the council will begin work in September of this next year.

Trustees went inte executive session to discuss a proposal from their attorney concerning a settlement from asbesto litigation. Two and a half years ago the school, along with most other schools in Texas, entered into a law suit to recover expenses for removing asbestos from the schools. Due to a court order the terms and conditions of the settlement cannot be made public. However, the board was allowed to release the amount of the settlement, $\$ 44,949.94$. Out of which $35 \%$ will be retained by the lawyers as payment for services. Legal fees will also be deducted from that amount. What is left will See School, pg. 4

It's unfortunate that Carson County residents should have to think twice about rendering aid or assistance to motorists or pedestrians who pass through our county, but we have been dealing with some potentially dangerous subjects lately and there is little doubt that some would
take advantage of an unsuspecting person if they were given the opportunity. The Carson County Sheriffs Department can be reached by calling 537-3511 or by dialing $9-1-1$ in the event of an emergency. Our office dispatches all emergency units (fire, police, ambulance) and we are equipped with a

Telecommunications Device for the Deaf (TDD) which allows us to communicate with persons who are hearing and speech impaired. The TDD system can be used whether your call comes in on our routine business line or the 9-1-1 system.
Persons who are hearing or speech impaired and who do not have the TDD system in their home can contact the Panhandle contact the Panhandle Council for the Deaf in Amarillo for information on obtaining such a unit for
their home.

During the week of August 24, 1992 the Carson County Sheriff's Department answered sixteen calls on the 9-1-1 Emergency System. ## Commissioners Adopt 92-93 Budget

Carson County Airport. The work cos

Commissioners, in regular session Monday, Aug. 24, reviewed the 1992.93 fiscal year budget and approved it as presented.
Only two county residents attended the public hearing on the budget prior to its adoption.

The 1992-93 tax rate was also approved. The 3360 per $\$ 100$ evaluation was agreed upon as it was noted that the County lost $\$ 50,310,100$ in tax base during the last year. The loss was primarily due to natural gas prices and loss of production. The rate breaks down to .24211 for General Fund, . 03736 for Farm to Market Fund, and .05646 for Special Road Fund.
The 1991-92 budget was amended $\$ 3,300$ in order to cover expenses in the area of fuel and vehicle maintenance incurred by extra driving caused by the tornadoes that hit the Fritch area of the County in June.
Judge Roselius reported that road signs have arrived and will be put in place in and will be put in place in the near future.
"These signs will give direction to emergency personnel when responding to a call in the county, Roselius said.
Roselius also reported on the County's effort to obtain funds from the Texas Department of Community Affairs to dispose of the burn - pit at Fritch. "If approved, the funds will be available to dispose of the materials in a satisfactory manner," he said.
The commissioners also approved a resolution to enter into an agreement with the Texas Department of Transportation to do maintenance work at the Panhandle-Carson County
approximately $\$ 195,200$, will be set up on a $90 / 10$ cost share with the City Panhandle the City of Panhandle and Carson County. "The approximate cost to the city and county will be $\$ 19,500$, R Roselius explained. "The actual cost to each entity will be $\$ 9,760$. We have this revenue in our airport maintenance account."

It was noted that requirements for the indigent health care program will be posted on the bulletin board in the courthouse.

Preliminary plans were made to attend the County Judges and Commissioner conference in El Paso on Oct. 13-16, where the commissioners will meet the annual continuing education requirements.

## Bench Mark Compares Budgets

Despite widespread reports last Fall of school budget cuts，trustees adopted the largest spending increase in history ．－$\$ 1.8$ billion more．Classroom teachers received one dollar in six of the additional spending．
Spending was $\$ 1.4$ billion more than budgeted revenue，and trustees increased school taxes by a billion dollars．However， when the beginning balance of $\$ 4.2$ billion is included， resources far outpaced expenditures．

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks 1991－92 School District Budgets in Texas， an annual publication of the Texas Research League，an Austin－based，educational

## corporation engaged

 governmental research．An average of $\$ 3,979$ per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus $\$ 337$ for repayment of debt and $\$ 617$ per student for capita outlay．
McLean ISD＇s budget provided $\$ 6,491.03$ per student for current operations，$\$ 0$ for debt service，and $\$ 71.93$ pe student for capital outlay oased on the 212 students enrolled in October 1991.

The average base salary or classroom teachers paid by McLean ISD in October 1991 was $\$ 25,068.00$ plus supplements for the career adder．The average for administrators was $\$ 36,960.00$ and $\$ 32,039.00$
for other professional support employees （librarians，counselors nurses，supervisors，etc．）．

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries Statewide payroll expense averaged $\$ 3,236$ averaged $\$ 3,236$ per student，as compared to $\$ 4,847.33$ in McLean ISD Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns．

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 10.4 students in McLean ISD while the statewide pupil－teacher ration was 163 to ration was 16.3 to one．
chool districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of $\$ 1.274$ per $\$ 100$ of appraised value，which value averaged $98.8 \%$ of market value（selling price）

For 91－92
The＂true tax rate＂was \＄1，259（\＄1，274 times 98．8\％） statewide．Locally，the McLean ISD imposed a rate of $\$ 1,235$ including $\$ .755$ by the county．Property was appraised at $105.8 \%$ of its market value making the true rate $\$ 1.307$ per $\$ 100$ of market value（selling price）．

The report points ou that the calculation of a true tax rate based on true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools．

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency Farmers participating in the Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.
Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 2, 1993, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and
