





Carson Co Sheriff's Report

Twelve persons were booked into the Carson County Jail during the past week. Five persons were arrested for DWI - First Offense, one for DWI -Second Offense, three for Poss. of Controlled Substances, one for Public Intoxication, one for Injury to a Child and one for Criminal Warrants out of Gainesville, TX.

Deputies responded to a vehicle fire on Interstate 40 near the 93 mile marker on Monday evening. A van carrying carnival employees from New Mexico to Oklahoma caught fire and had to be extinguished by Panhandle Fire Department. The Texas Highway Patrol assisted in traffic control and the Panhandle EMS unit responded to check for injuries. No injuries were reported by the six occupants of the vehicle, but the 1987 van was completely des royed.

Carson County deputies and the Panhandle Fire Department responded to another vehicle fire Saturday afternoon on Highway 60 approximately seven miles west of Panhandle. Amarillo wornen and her son escaped injuries when they left their 1980 pickup after noticing smoke coming from under the hood. The vehicle was engulfed in flames shortly after their departure. The vehicle was determined to be totalled. Fire officials indicated that the fire may have been caused by a ruptured gas line leaking on the manifold of the pickup.

Deputies assisted the White Deer City Marshal and White Deer Ambulance Service when a resident passed away at his home.

Officers are investigating the unlawful entry of a mobile home in the Fritch area where various items of lingerie were missing. An Interstate 40 convenience store and service station reported a gas drive-off where the subject was westbound on the Interstate.

Officers checked a number of reports of cattle on the highway and assisted with medical emergencies in towns within the county. Deputies and the Texas Highway Patrol investigated three Cuban nationals who said that they had been dropped off in Groom by a truck driver. After checking to see if the subjects were wanted for any offenses, they were transported to the nearest bus terminal so they could return to Los

Angeles. Carson County Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol were called to a restaurant/truck stop in Groom Friday evening when citizens observed a man striking a young child. A 40-year-old Oklahoma man was arrested on a felony charge of Causing Injury to a Child and is currently being held in the Carson County Jail pending trial. Another man was arrested for Public Intoxication as a result of this same case.

The child is currently in the custody of the Department of Human Services pending the location of a relative or foster parent who is deemed to be suitable to care for


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



IRS Focuses On Non-Filers Of Income Tax

As part of a nationwide effort, the Dallas District of Internal Revenue Service is increasing its focus on taxpayers who have failed to file tax returns. If you are one of the majority of taxpayers who file and pay every year, this is good news. If you are one of those who has not yet filed, don't wait any longer.

IRS is assigning 2,000 revenue agents and examiners nationwide to find delinquent taxpayers and secure their returns and unpaid taxes. Additional personnel are also being assigned at IRS processing centers to investigate records and information documents that indicate a tax return should be filed.

Dallas District recently completed an outreach campaign to bring people into the system. According to Gary O. Booth, IRS Director for the Dallas District,

convinced, from the numbers of taxpayers who took advantage of our outreach assistance, that most taxpayers are willing to comply with the tax laws if they have the information and help they need to do

Booth urged those who did not take advantage of the special assistance offered earlier to file their returns now. IRS will work with people who owe tax to help them meet their tax obligation.

"Ii is only fair to taxpayers who are filing and paying their tax on time for IRS to ensure that all others do, too," Booth remarked. "And since penalties and interest continue to increase your debt, you are helping yourself if you file now."

Jerry D. Harris. Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee, stated that Clayton Yeutter has consistently worked to expand the role of U.S. Agriculture in the world. Domestic policy involves agriculture in every way. Secretary Yeutter's visit with ASCS committees and employees demonstrates the

place farm programs have in our domestic policy.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is the United States Department of Agriculture agency that administers farm programs passed by Congress. This includes programs that affect many local farmers and ranchers.

Chairman Harris noted that this meeting brought together local agriculture leaders and Administration policymakers for training and evaluation of the effectiveness of current programs. The conference helped find ways to improve the service provided through policy decisions and improve the knowledge of ASCS employees.






