

McLean Stops Groom In 2nd Half

The football game that was expected to decide the district championship for District 1-1A and plenty of excitement to last the year between the Tigers of Groom and the Tigers of McLean was just the game it had been billed. The final score of 92-53 was indicative of the second half domination by McLean but the score at half, 48-40 McLean leading, was an offensive fireworks show. Each team trading touchdowns, defenses not able to hold, Christian Looney's passing and Paul McLaughlins' scampering kept the scoreboard lit throughout the first half.

Coach O'Dell said, "Looney is probably the best athlete in the state." Looney scored six touchdowns to lead McLean. His team gained 348 yards on the ground and 338 yards passing. Looney completed 25 of 39 passes with one interception.

Coach O'Dell said, "Our boys played as well as they could, we tried at least four variations of defense, none seemed to work. Our boys are very upset . . . and hope to redeem themselves Friday night with Miami. We still have a good shot of making the playoffs," O'Dell concluded.

"As far as injuries go, we were lucky, only Paul McLaughlin and Corkey Hickey were slowed Friday night with cramp dehydration."

McLaughlin opened the games' scoring on a five yard run, Tom Lambert's kick was good. McLean's David Cronister started the McLean's scoring when he pulled in a 3 yard pass from Looney and Jeremy Thomas' kick was good. It was McLean scoring the next three times, first, Tommy Pennington catching 18 yard 6'2" Looney. The Christian quarterback, Looney scored on runs of 8 yards and 1 yard, with Thomas connecting one of the two PATs. He again scored on runs of 4 yards, 44 yards, 15 yards and 6 yards. extra point run himself, and again scoring on a 39 yard pass from Bo Burgin. McLaughlin finished the night scoring on an intercepted pass from Looney on a PAT returning it 80 yards for one point.

Corkey Hickey added scores on runs of 4 yards and 18 yards. Also scoring for Groom was Wes Hall when he hauled in a pass from Burgin going 30 yards. Harold Cave also scored on a 39 yard pass from Burgin.

McLean had 35 first downs to Groom's 12. Yards rushing by McLean was 348 yards and 300 for Groom. Groom had 132 yards passing while McLean had 338 yards. Total yards gained by McLean was 686

Satellite Dish Latest Educational Tool For Groom Schools

If you have driven by the school lately, you may have noticed the new satellite dish that graces the front lawn. The new system was completely paid for by a grant from Texas Education Agency Technology.

"We are very excited and pleased to have this addition to our technology system," said Leslie Crowell.

We now have the capability to get programs from many educational channels as well as being linked with Austin and other school computer systems. Four class rooms are directly linked to the system so that programs such as the NASA Network and C-Span (Congress) can be observed in progress. Also Mrs. Crowell will tape programs that teachers are interested in for a particular class so that they can be

viewed at a later time. The teachers will also be able to receive all of their inservice training in this manner.

The Texas Education N e t w o r k , C N N , Nickelodeon, C-Span and University of Oklahoma are just a few of the 250 channels that the dish can pick up.

The possibilities are endless with this type of system. Continuing education and subjects not offered by local districts are two distinct possibilities for the future.

"Although, at this time, it is very expensive, it is possible to link up with a classroom in another place to offer a student a class that is not offered in Groom at this time," stated Mrs. Crowell.

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



Carson County Sheriff's Report

By Sheriff Loren Brand Eleven persons were booked into the Carson County Jail this past week. Two were arrested for Driving While License Suspended, four for Drug Paraphernalia, one for Arson, one for Speeding and three for DWI.

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Deputies are investigating the theft of a CB radio from a field near I-40 and also the theft of a tractor radiator from a building near Hwy 207. This is a prime time for thieves travelling through our county to take advantage of the fact that there are a number of trucks and farm machinery parked in fields near the roadways. Our deputies are increasing their patrols of all county roads and we would greatly appreciate your assistance by advising us when you see a suspicious vehicle in your area.

Carson County and Hutchinson County deputies along with the city marshals from White Deer and Skellytown were dispatched to check on a group of 20-25 vehicles which were seen travelling from Pampa to an area north of Skellytown. The vehicles were apparently driven by employees of the property owner, but there was a question of whether they had permission to be on the property after hours.

S.S. Required For Renewing License

Beginning November 1, Texans applying for a driver's license and persons renewing their license or

seeking a duplicate will need to show their Social Security card, according to the Tex is Department of Public Safety.

Social Security numbers already are required for Commercial Driver's Licenses, which the DFS began issuing in Septembor 1990.

"We think this new policy will make it harder for an individual to fraudulently obtain a driver's license, explained DPS Driver's License Inspector John Hall. "This should pay off by reducing crimes where a fake identification is important, like hot check cases. It also should make it more difficult for a minor to obtain a license with an incorrect year of birth."

Only Social Security cards issued by the federal Social Security Administration will be accepted, Hall said.

Comptroller's Report Explores Job Market

"For decades, the myth of Texas - cultivated by epic movies like Giant and the television series Dallas - was synonymous with gushing oil wells, huge cattle ranches and big spenders. Our future, however, rests with a much more valuable resource - unlimited human potential," State Comptroller John Sharp said.

The future of the Texas labor force is explored in the latest issue of Fiscal Notes, a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division. Fiscal Notes again explores the issues that are evolving from Forces of Change, a yearlong study by Comptroller researchers of all aspects of the Texas economy to the year 2025.

"Rapid change in the economy and the nature of the workplace means workers will have to learn new skills and keep up with new technologies. The question is whether we are willing to do those things competitively," Sharp said.

Will we choose to educate and train a large Texas workforce for goodwage, high-skill jobs? If not, we risk sinking to the level of a second-class society, and the boom years of the 1960s and 1970s will be only a far too distant memory.

"For the 1990s and beyond, a student who aims for high school graduation and postsecondary training will find lots of opportunity for jobs like registered nurse or secondary school teacher. Among the occupations with the fastest rate of growth by 2000 will be health services," Sharp said.

But if that student drops out of school, he or she may end up in other areas high in demand but low in pay - fast growing but lowskilled jobs as janitors and maids, general office clerks, truck drivers and child care workers, the article concludes.

"No longer can a worker depend on sheer physical strength or the benefits of nass production to provide he economic security the

worker seeks," Sharp said.

"The successful workers of the future must be able to master a variety of intellectual exercises stressing higher-order thinking skills, mathematical computations, the ability to communicate clearly and to adapt to new technologies. "Despite Texas education

reforms, many of today's students leave high school ill-prepared for the workplace. Colleges don't always provide the flexibility and affordability that adults returning to school need. It has fallen to many employers to prepare their workers for the future," "Nationally, Sharp said. government, corporations, unions and workers spend \$1 billion each year on remedial education for workers."

"By 2000, an estimated two million Texans will be working in professional and technical occupations," Sharp said. "However, the next fastest growing segment will be traditionally lowpaying services. With the prospect of an economy increasingly dependent on low-skilled, low-pay jobs, more attention is being paid to making investments in the work force, both at public and private levels."

Tree Seedlings Available

The Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District is now accepting orders for tree seedlings. The conservation tree program is designed to offer tree seedlings at a nominal cost with the aim to protect cropland, feedlots, and buildings, and to control erosion and enhance wildlife.

Several species will be available this year. The District will be offering potted conifers including Austrian Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Eastern Red Cedar, Rocky Mountain Juniper,-Southwestern White Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, and Scotch Pine.

Several species of bareroot hardwoods will also be available including Caragana, Catalpa, Cotoneaster, Cottonwood, Desert Willow, Goiden Willow, Green Ash, Hackberry, Honeylocust, Lacebark Elm, Lilac,


Fruiting Mulberry, Nanking Cherry, Native Plum, Osage Orange, Pecan, Red Oak, Russian Olive, Sand Cherry, Siberian Elm, and Skunkbush Sumac.

Wildlife Packets will also be available. These packets include 25 seedlings each of 4 different species, and are designed to enhance quail and pheasant, deer, and turkey populations.

The trees will arrive at the District Office in March. The District suggests that tree orders be placed early as many species sell out very quickly. Anyone interested may obtain an order form at the Gray Co. SWCD Office located in the Gray Co. Courthouse Annex on East Frederic (Highway 60), or by calling the District Office at 665-1751.


