DPS Warns Young Drivers As Well As Illegal Vehicles

The Groom Highway Patrol office has received several complaints of youth under the age of 16 driving a motor vehicle. Some of these young men and women can't see over the steering wheel. If you are in operation of a car you must have in your possession a valid Drivers License or permit. Failure to comply will meet with a citation being issued.

Other complaints received concern people driving unregistered motor vehicles around town. Some Safety Inspections in the window have been expired since

December 1992. As of today your safety should have 9/3 or over anything under 9/3 is expired. There are several trucks with no muffler or defective mufflers, get them fixed. Upon moving to Groom and establishing residence you are required by state law to change your license plates and drivers license to Texas with a correct address within 30 days.

Another serious matter is that on September 15th Trooper Davis had to arrest a Groom man for Assault with a Motor Vehicle. This is the second time this year a Groom resident has

assaulted someone else with a car. This is a criminal offense and will be dealt with accordingly.

The Groom Highway Patrol Office will be assisting the Carson County Sheriff's Office with the investigation into the sale of alcoholic beverages to minors. Any Groom youth in possession of an alcoholic beverage will be issued a citation and instructed to contact Judge Bill Hinson with a parent.

Meadow Humbles Groom Tigers

About 60 fans traveled to Meadow last Friday to support the Tigers.

In Groom's first possession, a series of running plays and a short pass set up a 1-yard run by Bart Britten to give Groom an 8-0 lead after Tom Lambert's point-after kick. Tiger defense then held the Broncos to a 4-play series.

The first quarter ended with Groom on top at 8-0.

Early in the second quarter, Seth Ritter and Bart Britten alternated carrying the ball to set up a touchdown run by Harold Cave, giving Groom a 14-9 lead. Meadow responded with a touchdown on the kick-off return and kicked the extra points to alter the

score to 14-8. In their last possession before the half, Meadow scored again and took the lead by two points, 14-16. Defensively, the Tigers had a strong first half, led by Robbie Evenson and Tom Lambert.

Midway in the third quarter, Harold Cave, Bart Britten, and Seth Ritter carried the ball through a series of plays, but the Tigers were unable to convert the drive into a score. Late in the quarter Meadow scored, ending the quarter at 14-22.

Early in the fourth quarter, Meadow increased their lead with a touchdown, 14-28, but Tiger Spirit was high and Bo Burgin passed to Seth Ritter for a touchdown. Tom Lambert's point-after kick was good to bring the score to 22-28. In their last possession of the game, Meadow was able to score against the Tigers defense, making the final score Groom 22, Meadow 35.

The Tigers rushed for 199 total yards on 41 carries and passed 13 times for a total of 65 yards; the Tiger defensive team recovered a Meadow fumble and made 17 solo tackles.

Commissioner Britten Votes No To The 1993-94 Proposed Budget

Carson County Judge Jay R. Roselius presided over the Monday morning session of the Carson County Commissioner's Court with Commissioners Tracy Kotara, Choc Smith, Jerry Strawn and Mike Britten in attendance. Carson County Clerk, Sue Persons, recorded the following actions of the Court:

Minutes of the previous meeting were read and corrected. Commissioner Strawn and Commissioner Britten voted against the proposed 93-94 budget.

All claims were approved. The Court approved a proclamation proclaiming September as Fair Housing Month and also approved the section 3 affirmative action plan.

B.K. Paris, who is removing tornado debris in the northwest portion of the county reported progress of the removal. He reported the debris would be totally removed in the next day or two.

The Court amended the Sheriff's current budget \$4,212.

The closing of a road in Precinct 1, was discussed. It was pointed out that a formal petition to close the road would have to be presented to the Commissioner's Court in order to be considered.

Judge Roselius informed the Court of a Pantex Plant Citizens Advisory Board (PPCAB) being organized.

Applications to select the board will formally be taken in the next few days.

Individuals interested in being part of the selection or a member of the board should contact the County Judge's office. "We need Carson County residents involved in this selection committee as well as the

Advisory Board."

The Court reviewed a case involving an indigent resident in the county who is in need of proper housing. Action is being taken.

The Court discussed the disposition of three used vehicles in the Sheriff's department. These vehicles will be sold by auction.

Don Case Resigns From City

Groom City Council met in a special called meeting Monday night to accept the resignation of long time employee, Don Case.

Case has been employed as Public Works Superintendent for the past twelve years. His resignation was submitted to

Mayor Greg Lamb effective September 16 allowing two weeks notice.

Mayor Greg Lamb stated, "We are in the process of taking applications and looking toward a smooth transition."

Mr. Case was not available for comment.

Grandview-Hopkins ISD Purchases Attendance Credits

The School Board of the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. convened in regular session at 8:00 PM on Tuesday, September 14, 1993, in the school cafeteria. The meeting was called to order by President Marshall Hopkins.

After accepting the minutes as read, the board canvassed the results of the School Finance Election of Saturday, September 11, 1993. All 34 ballots cast in the election were cast in favor of purchasing attendance credits from the state. The board voted unanimously to accept the results of the election.

The board then voted unanimously to set a tax rate of \$1.20 per \$100. in property evaluation for the 1993-94 school year. This tax rate will allow the school district to fund the education program of the school as well as send

approximately \$344,000. in revenue to the state for purchase of attendance credits.

In other business, the board heard reports from the superintendent on district investments, progress on the establishment of a Foundation for the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D., and the contents of Update 44 from the Texas Association of School Boards.

The board then approved the substitute list for the 1993-94 school year and the calendar for teacher appraisals. After the third and final reading, the board approved a series of local policies.

There being no further business, the board adjourned at 9:40 PM. The next meeting of the board will be on Tuesday, October 12, 1993, at 8:00 PM in the school cafeteria.

Carson Co. Sheriff's Report

We are currently housing ten prisoners in the Carson County Jail. We have eight prisoners charged with felony offenses and two with misdemeanor offenses. We had three arrests for Possession of Marijuana, two for Public Intoxication, one for Assault with a Motor Vehicle and one for Possession of Methamphetamine. Our department is currently investigating a case of animal cruelty involving horses in the White Deer area. We are also working with authorities in Pampa and Amarillo in an effort to locate persons who have been stealing large dogs from the area. It appears that the focus of the thefts is on german shepherds, doberman pinschers and labradors. It is believed that the perpetrators are stealing the animals and selling them for medical research. The suspects are believed to be driving a white mini-van with the rear seats removed and cages installed. In Amarillo, one male and one female suspect posed as animal control officers. The Sheriff's Department was called to assist the Texas Department of Corrections at the prison farm north of Panhandle when a TDC inmate injured his back and had to be transported by ambulance for medical attention. Deputies responded to prowler calls on the west side of the county and checked on reports of persons driving on the wrong side of the road. The Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol were called to Interstate 40 near Conway to check on a complaint of "Strange Voices" that were being heard inside the cab of a truck. No unusual inhabitants were found in the cab and they were sent on their way after being checked for intoxicants.

Background Information Regarding Formation Of A Pantex Plant Citizens' Advisory Board

Introduction

In August, 1993 the Governor's Office, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and the Department of Energy (DOE) sponsored two public workshops to respond to citizens' requests to establish a citizen's advisory board regarding operations at the Pantex Plant. During these two meetings the community provided detailed advice and reached consensus on the scope, purpose and membership selection process for a Pantex Plant Citizens' advisory Board (PPCAB). It was agreed that the first step in establishing this Board should be to choose a sixteen member Selection Committee. This Selection Committee will be responsible for nominating the first eight members of the PPCAB.

People wishing to serve on the Selection Committee should complete the accompanying application. To assist in the application process, below please find a summary of the PPCAB membership selection process, a brief description of the level of time commitment requested of those serving on the Selection Committee, and a draft mission statement for the PPCAB.

Process for Selecting PPCAB Members

Approximately 120 participants in the August 26 public workshop worked together to develop the following membership selection process for the PPCAB.

1. A group of six people will select a sixteen member Selection Committee. The six include: the Office of the Governor; the Office of the Attorney General; Beverly Gattis, Serious Texans Against Nuclear Dumping (STAND); Judge Jay Roselius, Carson County; Guyon Saunders, Panhandle 2000; Doris Smith, Panhandle Area Neighbors and Land Owners (PANAL).

The sixteen member Selection Committee will include two persons with diverse perspectives from each of the following categories. In addition, the six will attempt to ensure that there is ethnic, social, and cultural diversity among the sixteen Selection Committee members.

- area resident
- regional resident
- current Pantex worker
- labor organization
- agriculture sector
- environmental organization
- business community
- local government

Members of the group of six may not select themselves to serve on the Selection Committee.

2. The sixteen member Selection Committee will nominate eight PPCAB members by consensus. They may not select themselves or members from the original group of six listed in step 1.
3. The first eight PPCAB members will nominate the remaining members of the PPCAB. They may select one or more of the local residents from the initial group of six or from the sixteen people who served on the Selection Committee.
4. A final list of PPCAB nominees will be submitted to DOE. DOE shall accept the list of nominees unless it determines that the list does not ensure a sufficient diversity of viewpoints or an appropriate balance of affected interests.

The purpose of the application is to select individuals to serve on the sixteen member Selection Committee. It is anticipated that the Selection Committee will have a one to two month life span during which time members will participate in approximately three to four meetings.

A diverse group of Panhandle citizens, working in an open-meeting process, has proposed a draft Mission Statement of the Advisory Board to be used during the PPCAB's membership application phase. This draft mission statement will be subject to refinement by the PPCAB, within the confines of applicable federal laws and the consensus decisions reached at the public workshops.

Managing Livestock Stocking Rates On Rangeland

Fact 1: Nearly half (45%) of Texas ranches do not make seasonal adjustments to their livestock numbers. Continuous overstocking can cause rangeland vegetation overuse, especially during drought.

Fact 2: Only 20% of Texas ranches use quantifiable techniques to monitor the impact of stocking rate decisions on their range resources. Without monitoring techniques, ranches have no measurement of their past or current range conditions and trend.

Fact 3: 36 percent of Texas ranches obtain all or part of their grazing from leased rangeland. Of those leasing grazing land, 75% have short-term (5 years or less) contracts and most agreements (78%) contain no limitations on animal numbers grazed.

Manipulation of livestock stocking rates represents the single most important management decision affecting the ability to provide for sustainable financial and resource bases for the ranch. Rangeland managers constantly face the problem of balancing animal demand (both wild and domestic) with an uncertain and fluctuating forage supply.

Often stocking rate adjustments are made during or following a crisis situation, such as drought. When crisis adjustments are made, the owner/operator is usually left at the mercy of livestock markets, a depleted forage base and/or costly

Therefore, timely adjustments in livestock numbers before crisis conditions occur should help in ranch sustainability if adequate planning was already in place.

Teaching the "how to's" of adequate planning and successful stocking rate management are major objectives of an upcoming educational symposium to be conducted in Amarillo on October 11th.

Topics to be discussed will be:

- Why Stocking rate decisions are important.
- Managing stocking rates to achieve a) range resource goals, b) livestock production goals, c) wildlife goals and d) financial goals.
- Managing stocking rates to prevent adverse environmental impacts.
- Rancher approaches to adjusting stocking rates.
- Techniques for improving stocking rate decisions.

The symposium will utilize recognized authorities in each topic with ranchers and experts discussing techniques one can use to improve stocking rate decisions.

in the TCFA Team Challenge. The Team Challenge is part of the TCFA Junior Fed Beef

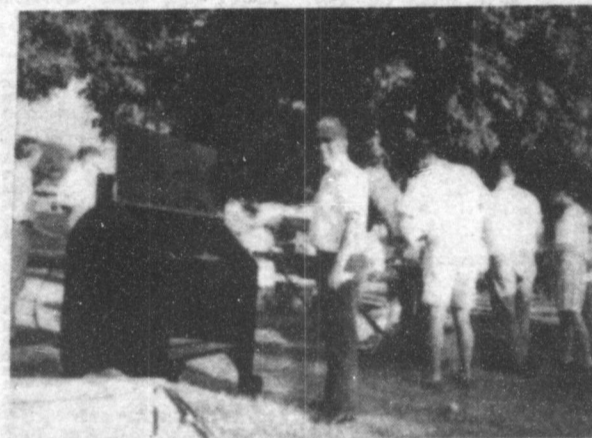

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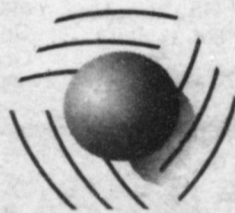
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
