pollution is the prime topic of conversation in the Capitol at the present.

After taking a look at the air pollution law just put on the books this year, members of the Texas Air Control Board (the Texas law permits 80 per cent as much air pollution as similar laws in some of the states).

Robert Hooper of Austin, the state's attorney told the directors that an exemption from the law supposed to apply only to agricultural plants (limiting air emissions to a maximum of eight per cent of the process weight of agricultural products) may exempt many industries.

He named the following as exempt: lumber mills, rice mills, grain elevators, paper mills, cotton oil mills, produce processing plants, cotton ginning plants, flour mills, oil mills, corn syrup plants, slaughter houses, wool processing plants, nut processing plants and possibly, rendering plants.

"We might as well fold up and go home," said Board Member LeBlanc of Port Arthur. "Maybe it would be easier for us to tell us what's left that can't control," he told Hooper. Some members observed that the law would have to provide 5,000 to 6,000 micrograms per cubic meter of air to get to the 80 per cent concentration—gins at best are not likely to exceed 40,000 to 50,000 micrograms.

Rep. Don Caviness of Austin, Sen. Criss Cole of Houston, authors of the 1967 Clean Air Act, say that the legislative intent was to exclude only cotton from state control. However, it may be necessary to amend the Clean Air Act in the special session to make it clear to industries that might want to be exempt.

TORNEY GENERAL RULES

Any applicant for a water well license in Texas must reside in the state for 90 consecutive days prior to his application, Atty. Gen. Crawford has said.

FOR MENTALLY RETARDED

Deputy Commissioner Charles D. Barnett says the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation has been allocated \$18,400,000 in federal funds for the mental retardation program, with another \$1,000,000 to be allocated.

Funds include grants-in-aid for care and grants for construction of new facilities.

COURT SPEAKS—Socony

Co., Inc., of Midland will be to bear the burden of a \$7.79 judgment for damages to equipment owned by two Mexican firms because the Supreme Court has affirmed an appeals court decision.

Damages resulted from an oil well fire which started while a well near Seminole, in Gray County, was being acidized.

High court also ruled that an applicant who is denied a beer license may appeal in district court, but someone who protested granting of the license has no right to appeal.

A motorist's failure to appear in court when convictions for traffic violations are rendered against him does not protect from Department of Public Safety suspension of his driver's license, Supreme Court ruled in a Midland County case.

A divorced mother temporarily committed to a mental hospital does not necessarily lose custody of her minor children, to the father, on her release. So says the high court in an Austin case.

Latter two verdicts both reversed lower court findings.

AMENDMENTS DRAWN—On Nov. 11, Texans will vote on six proposed constitutional amendments placed on the ballot in this order:

No. 1 Allowing counties to put all tax money in a single general fund.

No. 2 Permitting cities and other governmental units within hospital districts to levy taxes for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.

No. 3 Reviving the veterans' land program and authorizing \$400,000,000 in bonds.

No. 4—Authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills for law enforcement officers injured in line of duty.

No. 5 Providing for a \$75,000,000 state parks revenue bonds issue.

No. 6 Allowing state officers and employees to hold non-elective positions where there is no conflict of interest or where the state might benefit.

OIL ALLOWABLE RAISED—Texas oil allowable has been raised to 42.9 per cent of potential in the wake of the Middle East oil emergency.

At the same time, Texas Railroad Commission asked federal assurances that big oil producing states won't be left holding the bag of surplus inventories as they were in the 1957 Suez Canal crisis.

July allowable will be 3,412,042 barrels per day or 399,861 above the current level.

EDUCATION—About 400 experts, Texans and otherwise, are at work on 80 studies that will help piece together a master plan for education beyond high school in Texas.

Plan will be laid out in preliminary form next summer for a series of public hearings before finally adopted by the 18-member coordinating board of the Texas college and university system. Plan will chart the road ahead to 1985 for the public system of higher education.

SHORT SNORTS

Fear of scabies infection has resulted in massive visual inspection of cattle in the Panhandle and clearance to herds by the Texas Animal Health Commission and the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Armed with a \$225,000 federal grant, the State Health Department is promoting a statewide immunization program—primarily directed to pre-schoolers—against polio, measles, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus.

A second conference to assist local officials on the Gulf Coast in their hurricane preparedness planning has been scheduled by the Department of Public Safety for July 13 in Galveston.

Public hearing on rules changes in the state's grants-in-aid program relative to mental health-mental retardation is set for 9 a.m. July 18, in the House of Representatives.

Gray County Shows Increase in Savings Bond Purchases

Sales of Series E and H United States saving bonds are at an all-time high, according to George B. Cree Jr., chairman of the Gray County Savings Bonds Committee. Savings bonds sales during the month of May in Gray County totaled \$234,883. For the first five months of 1967 sales in this county amounted to \$379,071 which is 95 per cent of the yearly goal of \$400,000.

Total purchase of Series E and H bonds in Texas for the month of May totaled \$14,036,665—9.7 per cent increase over May of 1966.

Nationally, during May new purchases of E and H savings bonds amounted to \$438 million—a 22 year peak—and an increase over May, 1966, of 6 per cent.



"Always Close the Gate, Son"

Not long ago we heard a young man say, "Each day I work with my father I learn something that helps me." We admired him for saying it at the time, and later we kept on thinking about the many things we learned from my own father as we worked and visited together during his life.

Our "Old Homestead" seemed to have more than the usual amount of gates and I was always tempted to leave one down until we were to come back a bit later. Usually he would say, "Always close the gate, son."

It seemed there were gates everywhere; one for the horse pasture, the weaned calves, and one for the cows that calved in the spring and still another for those that were to offspring in the fall. There were heifers too young to run with the bulls, and so on and on.

But, it always seemed to be urgent and important that the pastures were kept separate. To me, it remained a constant temptation to leave one open. He would always remind me that his experience had been that it would take longer to un-mix the cattle sooner or later than I would save by leaving the gates open—that when we returned might be like locking the barn after the horse was gone.

This proved to be true with horses and cattle, and thinking back over it, we got a true lesson for our daily life. There are always those little gates here and there along life's road that if we leave open will cause a lot of trouble later on.

I thought of what a little gate it was to leave open when we hired man let me have some Bull Durham to smoke. Then later, when we smoked three packs of ready rolls per day, how hard it was to close the gate.

I thought of the good credit rating I inherited and how easy it was to leave the gate open to easy payments, and how hard it could be to close.

It is easy to find the gate to the creek on Sunday instead of one to church, and it is hard to find the road back later. We could name so many little gates along life's way that there is a temptation to leave down.

Thinking back over the years of my life I would want to tell my own boy to:

"Always close the gate, son."

NEWS OF CONSERVATION

Conservation irrigation, the use of soils and irrigation water in a way that will insure high production without the use of either, is becoming more important every year.

Irrigation, whether it is the sprinkler or surface method, rarely is as efficient as it should be. Low efficiencies frequently are caused by inadequate designs that do not provide for the application of water in accordance with soil conditions and crop needs.

Sprinkler systems are especially desirable on the sandy soils of the county and in areas where the wells produce small quantities of water. It is much easier to apply the desired amount of water without the unnecessary waste that often occurs with furrow irrigation. A properly designed sprinkler system will apply water no faster than the soil can absorb it so that there is no puddling or runoff and no erosion. Pipe sizes, lengths and nozzles should be chosen which will give the desired results and avoid excessive friction and pumping costs. With a properly designed system, the irrigator knows the inches per hour that he is applying. It is then easy to determine the time of set required to apply the exact amount of moisture needed.

It must be emphasized, however, that the best planned and designed system will not give the desired results unless it is operated correctly. To do this, the irrigator must know the capacities of the system his soils, and the requirements of his crops. The technicians of the Soil Conservation Service can assist in the planning, design and operation of an irrigation system which could help cut irrigation cost, and make each drop go just a little farther.

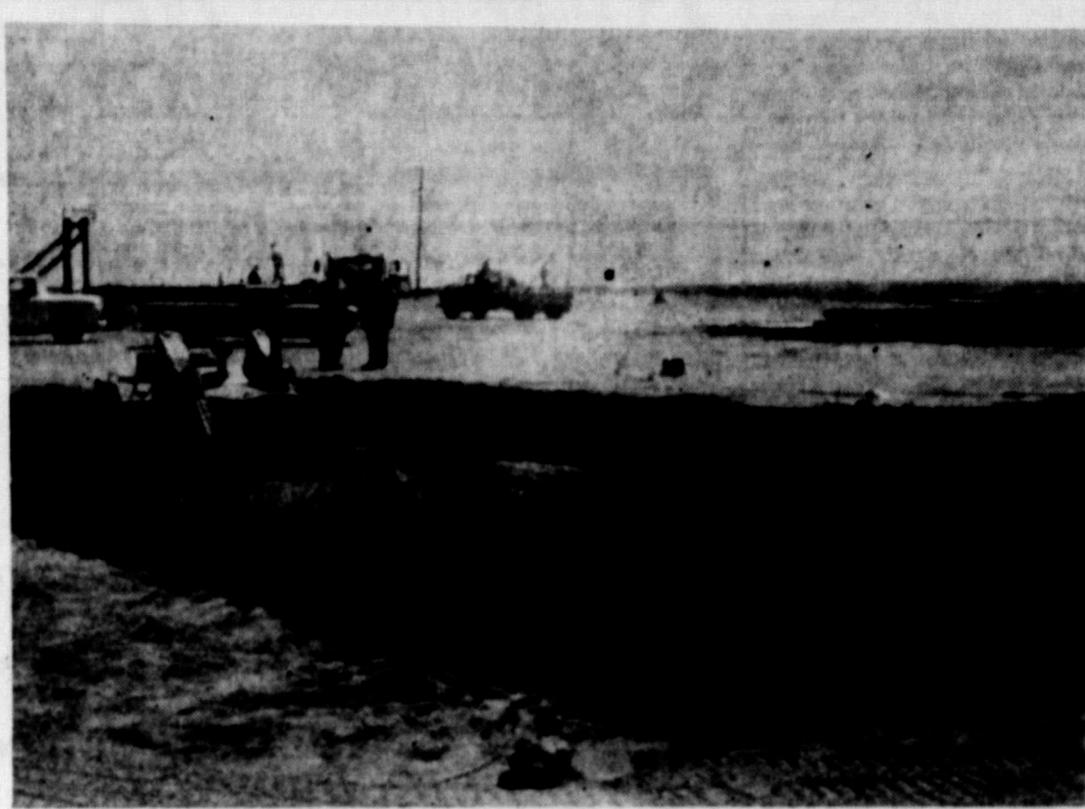

Upswing in Water Recreation Seen

The arrest reports, filed by game and fish wardens of the Parks and Wildlife Department for the month of May, reflect the increasing use of Texas' waters for outdoor recreation activities, according to J. B. Phillips, coordinator of law enforcement.

Pheasant Crop Looks Good Despite Hail

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel remain optimistic about the fall ring-necked pheasant crop in the Panhandle despite severe weather setbacks in some areas, according to Wildlife Biologist Phil Evans.

Despite weather losses, production of young has continued with above average regularity, Evans said.

He reported numerous broods of very young pheasant chicks along roadsides in irrigated areas north of Dalhart and Dumas in early June. Heavy hail swept across the northern Panhandle in late June, killing many of the birds.

One landowner, north of Hereford, reported 15 adult ring-necks killed by golf-ball sized hail. Much larger hail was reported in eastern Panhandle areas.

Held Over from last week
We are about to complete the last of 10 production guidelines on various agricultural enterprises in Gray County. We still have swine and beef cattle feeding to do. Here is a list of the enterprises that we have completed guidelines on to date: (1) grain sorghum, (2) small grains (3) hybrid sudan forage, (4) alfalfa, (5) range management, (6) beef breeding herds, (7) stocker calf operation, and (8) cotton.

These and the swine and cattle feeding guides should be received by all producers in the near future. If you should have been missed in the mailing of any of these guidelines, drop us a card and we will mail you any copy you desire.

Response to our stocker calf guide has been terrific. We have had calls from stock brokers from Merrill-Lynch for additional copies. We had one call from Southeastern Oklahoma for copies. Our section on the live beef cattle futures' market was commended by the vice president of the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. His advice was sought on the authenticity of the information.

For many years Ralph Thomas, former county agent, spent part or all of Tuesday of each week in the McLean vicinity. We have carried on with this policy which we think to be a good one. But at times we get hit with a series of activities that conflict with our Tuesday visit. Such is the case with us for the last three Tuesdays. 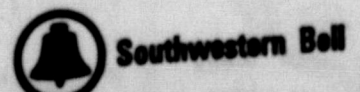
