

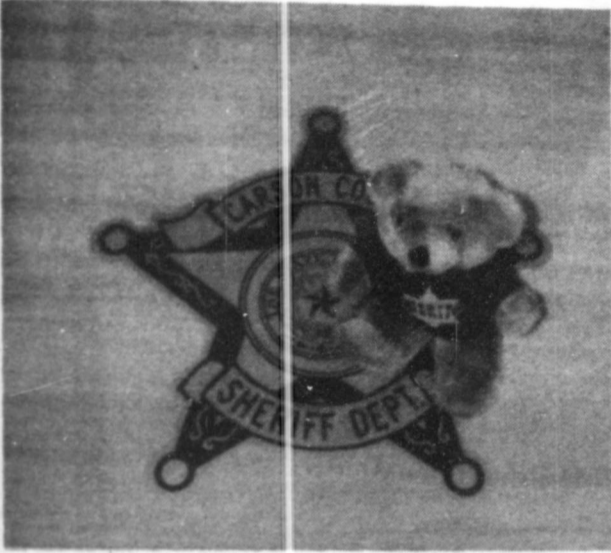

Sheriff's Department Has New Officer

While our department has tried to focus on victim's rights, we've felt that something was lacking in our ability to help youngsters who have been victimized criminally or traumatized by their exposure to domestic violence or other events.

In an attempt to fill this void, we have purchased "Deputy Teddy" trauma bears from the National Sheriff's Association. These bears are cuddly little creatures that will give children something soft and comforting to hold on to

when it seems that the rest of their world is falling apart.

We have seen a record number of young victims of sexual and physical abuse in Carson County this year. The amount of time necessary to properly investigate these cases and prepare them for prosecution is considerable, but I want to be certain that we don't forget that the victims are our main consideration. Certainly, Deputy Teddy isn't the solution to all problems of the young victims, but we'd like it to be a start in the right direction.

Water Commission Loan Approved For PGWCD

The Texas Water Development Board approved a \$750,000 loan from the Agricultural Water Conservation Board Program to the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3.

The District will use the funds to make low-interest loans to area farmers and ranchers who will use the funds to purchase more efficient water conservation equipment. In the past, the District loaned \$650,726 in funds from the Agricultural Water Conservation Bond Program to farmers and ranchers in their District.

Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District No. 3 is located in Carson County, however the jurisdictional area includes parts of Armstrong, Donley, Gray, Hutchinson, Potter, and Roberts counties covering a 3,672 square mile area in northwest Texas.

Local Seats Open In Primary Election

Persons interested in filing for public office in either the Republican or Democratic primary elections to be held March 8, 1994, may do so beginning December 3, 1993 and ending at 6:00 p.m. on January 3, 1994.

One U.S. Senator and all U.S. Representatives will be elected. Almost all state elected officials will also be decided in 1994. Applications for any of these offices must be filed

with the State Chair of either the Republican or Democratic Parties.

Locally, Carson County voters will elect a County Judge, a District/County Clerk, a County Treasurer, County Commissioners for Precincts 2 (Smith) and 4 (Kotara), all three County

Justice of the Peace positions, and Sheriff, unexpired term. Also the County Chairs of both political parties and all

precinct chairs will be elected. Applications for all county and precinct offices may be obtained and filed with the Republican County Chair Jeri Osborne or with the Democratic County Chair Jackie West. Persons interested in filing for a Precinct Chair may obtain

an application and file for that office at any time from October 4, 1993 until 6:00 p.m. on January 3, 1994.

Persons interested in filing for any of these offices are encouraged to do so. Government is only as good as the people who serve in the offices of government.

Board Canvasses Election

The Groom Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session last week. Members Don Lyles and David Britten were absent. Also attending were Kenneth Sweatt, superintendent; Joyce Hutsell, business manager; and a visitor Curtis Downs.

The returns from the recent roll back election were canvassed. With 7 for and 99 against; reported by Election Judge Flora Glen Hammers the board accepted the canvass and the tax rate of \$1.25 per \$100 valuation will stand.

Carson County 4-Her's To Enter Food Show

Twenty-three 4-Her's will participate in the Carson County Food Show on November 13, 1993 at the War Memorial Building in Panhandle.

Judging will begin at 10:00 a.m. and the Awards program will begin at 12:30. The Awards program will include tasting dishes and presentation of Awards, which is open to the public.

Community Service Restitution Favored

The 100th Judicial District Court, through the Adult Probation Department, has begun implementing mandatory community service for individuals convicted of criminal activity in Carson County.

District Judge David M. McCoy said, "I think it's time the criminal started to pay his debt to society and to realize that, at least in the 100th District, crime doesn't pay."

According to McCoy, a strong advocate of the program by retired District Judge John T. Forbis, all

felony offenders will be required to work a minimum of at least 200 hours community service within the first 18 months of any probation that is granted to them. A failure to complete the work as required can result in revocation of probation.

"We have an extremely strong and effective probation department and system which is continually looking for ways to serve not only the needs of the probationer but the community as well," Judge McCoy added. "The

Controlled Burning Of Crop Residue Discussed

Public Information

I have had numerous questions the last several days concerning the "Controlled" burning of Crop Residue by local farmers. I have visited with

State and local officials which handle the compliance of this type of burning, and are now passing the information on to our residents.

Historically, farmers have

practiced burning their fields to dispose of crop residue. Because this practice has increased in the last few years, it has affected more people. The Texas Air Control Board (TACB) and

the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) have received an unprecedented number of complaints concerning health effects, traffic safety visibility problems, and general

nuisance conditions caused by this type of burning. Schools have been disrupted and nursing homes have been affected.

The rules of the TACB contain a general prohibition against burning. However, an exception may be authorized if there is no practical alternative. Exceptions may be granted for Crop Management purposes in rural areas. In any event, burning may not cause a nuisance condition or cause a traffic hazard or interfere with normal road use and must be conducted under the following stipulations:

1) Burning shall be commenced only when the wind will carry the smoke away from any city, town, residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial area, navigable water, public road, or landing strip, and shall not be conducted when a shift of wind is predicted;

2) Burning must be a least 300 feet from any adjacent properties which have residential, recreational, commercial, or industrial use;

3) Burning shall commence after 9:00 a.m. and be completed on the same day as soon as is reasonably practical prior to 5:00 p.m.;

4) Burning shall not commence when wind speed is predicted to be less than 6 m.p.h. or greater than 23 m.p.h.;

5) Burning shall not be conducted during periods of actual or predicted low-level atmospheric temperature inversions;

6) Burning must be outside the corporate limits of a city or town; and,

7) Heavy oils, asphaltic materials, items containing natural or synthetic rubber, or any material which may produce unreasonable amounts of smoke must not be burned.

In conclusion, individuals planning to burn outside of the city limits should call the local Air Control Personnel, #353-9251, in Amarillo, inform the Air Control Personnel a day before you plan to have a "controlled" burn. You should give them your location and any other information you feel is important. This is done so Air Control Personnel will be informed and will not respond if called after the initial notice.

The Sheriff's Department and local fire departments should also be notified so they will not make unnecessary responses. Responses which are costly and time consuming.

If your choice of disposing of Crop Residue is burning, Be Safe, and follow the above procedure.

NOTE: The Texas Water Commission (TWC) and the Texas Air Control Board (TACB) have merged to form the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission (TNRCC). For the first time, environmental issues in Texas, whether land, air, or water, will be addressed by a Single Comprehensive Agency.

The issue of crop residue burning will be addressed by TNRCC and new rules probably will be established at a later date.

Immunization Clinics Offer Vaccines

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for November. Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

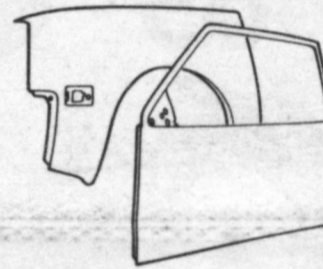

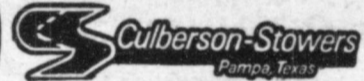

Turkey dinner was enjoyed by over 200 people on November 2, 1993.

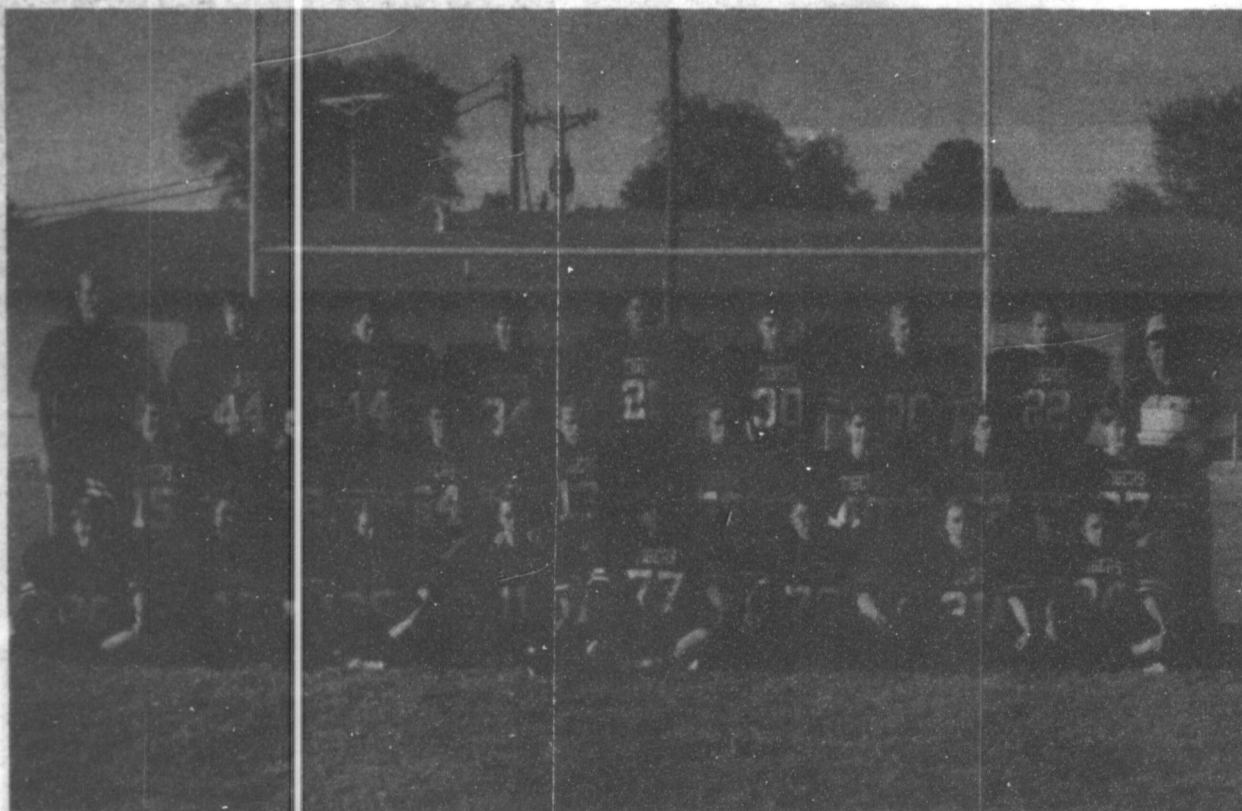

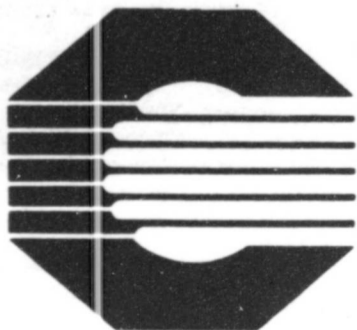

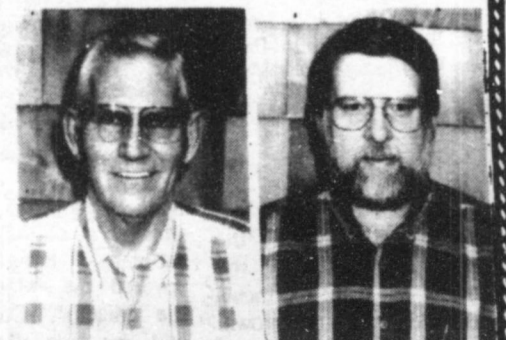

By Monday, the 8th, most of you may have picked up one of our Good News Letters to follow along with our activities.

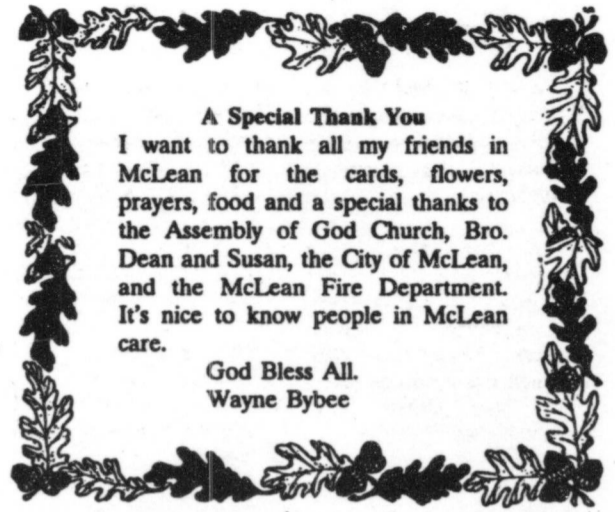
Monday was Ruby Myers' birthday, Thursday (today the 11th) is Eula Morrow's birthday.

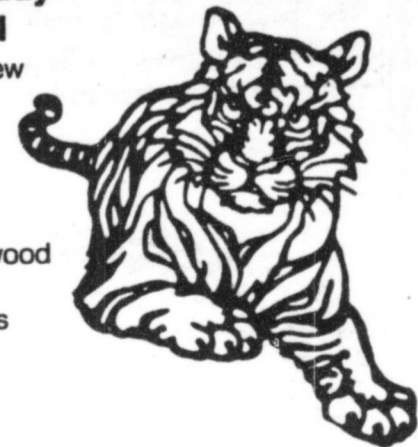

Carter, Northcutt, West, Dickey, Trevor Scruggs, Derek Glass and Lee Bolton contained Pirate Dusty Helfer until the final 20 seconds of the first half, when he broke through the curtain for an 8 yard touchdown. A fumbled snap for the PAT kick ended the half with McLean ahead 20-6.

Jonathan Bailey's mother, Kathy won a porcelain encased rose raffled by the Senior Class during the halftime break.

Lefors received the second half kickoff and Helfer broke a 63 yard run up the middle to tighten the score 20-12. McLean blocked the extra point attempt to kick by Chris Chadwick.

Three Tiger fumbles, all lost to Lefors during the third quarter were finally capitalized with a 57 yard touchdown by Helfer, with Chadwick's kick tying the score at 20-20. Casey Carter took a left end run, cut back and streaked through for a thirty yard McLean score. The high snap from Monty Joiner went through Toby's gloves and 26-20 was the narrow lead as the northwest winds picked up to send the

temperatures into the teens. Northcutt's 25 yard run after stout defensive efforts, put the Tigers on the Pirates 9, when a Seth Brown field goal just missed as the third quarter ended.

Over 60 vehicles were camped around the stadium in view of the ball game, and every one of them was occupied as only 34 Pirate fans were counted, wrapped in blankets, faces to the winds, in the visitors bleachers.

Seth added two more and 48-44 tipped the seesaw towards the Tigers with 1 1/2 minutes left in the Gray county Six-Man Bowl.

Keith Franks took the kick-off and was caught on the three yard line by Northcutt, but Helfer hopped in, the kick missed and McLean trailed 50-48.

McLean gained 14 1/2 yards in four plays and Lefors took over, ran out the clock and left town with a two point victory.

Helfer had 322 yards from scrimmage, Northcutt had 276 yards from scrimmage plus 80 yard kick-off return and 27 yards passing for a total of 383 yards.

Carson County Commissioners Meeting

County Buys Truck, Trailer And Insurance

Carson County Commissioners, in regular session Monday, Nov. 8, acknowledged a request from Parker and Parsley to construct a meter house in Precinct 4, agreed to pay added salary expenses in the Sheriff's department, approved the purchase of equipment, accepted an insurance bid and okayed a data processing contract.

After a discussion concerning overtime pay for law enforcement personnel, the commissioners agreed to pay for an additional eleven hours of time to personnel in the Sheriff's office who were approved.

The purchase of one-half interest of a belly-dump trailer by precinct 3 from Precinct 4 at a total cost of \$12,000, and the purchase of a used truck by Precinct 1 (by bid unless one can be obtained for less than \$15,000) were both approved.

A bid from A.J. Weiser and Co. for property and liability insurance was accepted for the total cost of \$22,542.

The court approved a data processing contract with Pritchard and Abbott for 1993-94 at a cost of \$13,000.

Wanda Hood was recognized by the court for receiving status of Certified Emergency Manager (C.E.M.) from the National Coordinating Council on Emergency Management. This award is the highest honor of professional achievement given by the council.

The annual Christmas party for county employees was set for December 20th and county employees will be off work on December 24th and 27th for the holidays.

Commissioners canvassed the November 1993 election returns and adjourned.
