## New Rules In Effect For UIL Basketball

As fans may have noticed at some of the early basketball games this season, UIL has made some rule changes for the 1993-94 season.

Some of these changes are: 1) A player who is bleeding, has an open wound or an excessive amount of blood on their uniform must leave the game. They may return to the game after the bleeding is stopped, bandaged, or the uniform has been changed. Time-outs cannot be used to keep the player in the game after an official has ordered a bleeding player from the game, however, if the official doesn't notice the bleeding, a time-out can be called and the player can stay in the game, after treatment.

2) A player must wear a shirt designed to be tucked in on the inside of his or her pants. The waist of

shorts must be worn above the hips. Players not conforming to rules will be removed from the game until the next substitution opportunity.

3) There can be no player control foul during an interrupted dribble.

4) The coach or captain, either one may designate the free thrower in technical foul situations.

5) During a free throw, a player occupying a marked lane space may move on release of the ball, but may not cross the free throw line until the ring or backboard is touched by the ball. After the shooter has position of the ball, opposing team members cannot wave their arms, yell or talk to the shooter to distract him or her.

6) Excessive swing of the arms or elbows is now considered a technical foul.

## Weather To Hamper Thanksgiving Again, Snow On The Way

### Hire New Librarian

A temporary part-time employee, Alice Stamps, at the Panhandle Library was hired to the permanent position of Secretary/Librarian during the Carson County Commissioners meeting on Monday, November 22. Her annual salary was set at \$14,300.

It was noted that overtime pay for county employees is based on a per week and per month basis rather than a daily basis.

A bid of \$13,123.75 from West Texas Ford Lincoln Mercury for the purchase of a new vehicle for law enforcement was also approved by the court.

A request from Laura Weise to close a road in precinct 4 was presented, but tabled until further information can be obtained.

Dixie Surratt was approved as a representative for the Carson County Child Welfare Board. She will attend local meetings and tend to other matters concerning that department.

The court was adjourned until December 13th at 10:00 am.

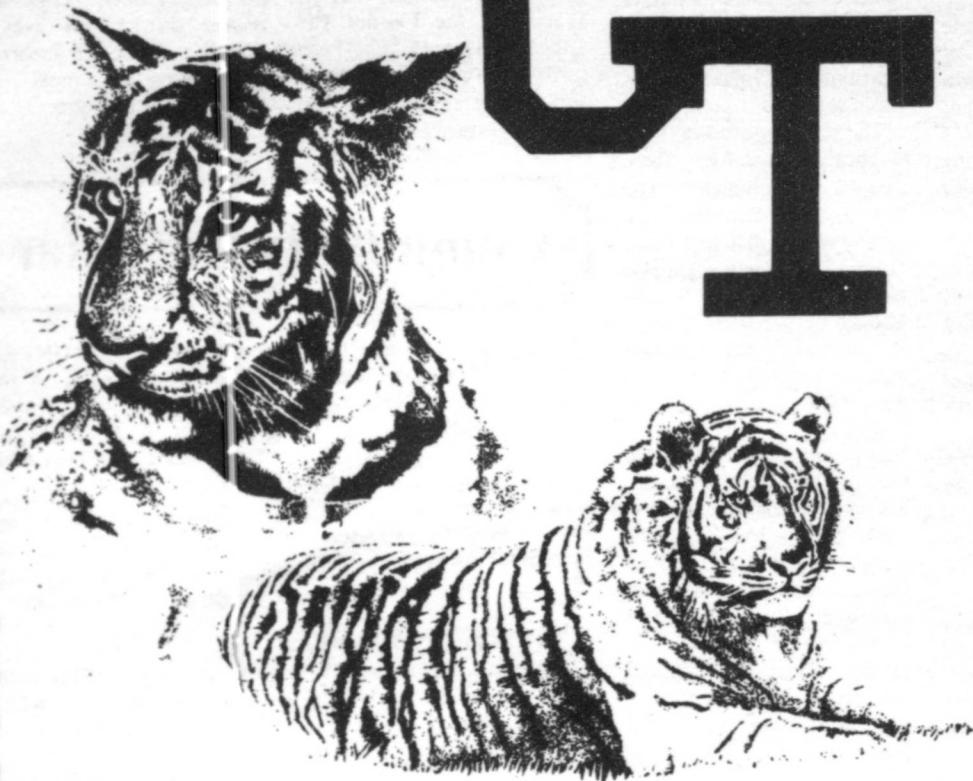

# As The Interstate Turns

On Monday, November 8th Trooper Davis stopped a truckdriver wanted in Scurry County, Noland County, Menard County and Lubbock County on DPS warrants. The man was unable to pay the \$1,000. in fines and was turned over to the Carson County Sheriff's Department.

On Tuesday, November 9th a man was arrested for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia on I-40 six miles west of Groom. Later that evening a Pampa man was arrested for unpaid DPS tickets in Carson County. The man was

released upon paying \$385. in fines.

On Wednesday, November 10th a Amarillo man was arrested for over \$300.00 in unpaid DPS fines out of Donley County. The man was taken to the Carson County Sheriff's Department until payment of fines.

On Thursday, November 11th two Phoenix, Arizona men were arrested for Possession of over a pound of marijuana. Both were transported to the Carson County Sheriff's Department until they could post bond. Later that evening Texas Highway Patrol was assisted by Sheriff Loren Brand and

## Carson County Sheriff's Report

During the past week the Carson County Sheriff's Department responded to calls of vandalism and burglary and reports of suspicious persons.

The Sheriff's Department received a report Wednesday of an individual who was threatening to harm himself and others in Skellytown. Our Department, assisted by the Texas Highway Patrol, entered the subject's residence and found that he had already taken his own life. The Skellytown ambulance crew had been called to the scene in the event any medical services could be rendered. The subject was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Sharon Harper and the matter was ruled as a suicide.

The Sheriff's Department and Texas Highway Patrol assisted in guarding an armored car from Amarillo which broke down on the interstate between Groom and Conway. The contents of the armored car were transferred to another vehicle and the matter was resolved without incident.

Nine persons are presently incarcerated in the Carson County Jail.

WELL REGISTRATION

Registration is required for all wells in the District that have not been previously permitted and shall be filed with the District on a form and in the manner required by the District.

Following adoption of this rule, registration shall include:

(a) all wells that produce or will produce water and all other non permitted uses;

(b) all wells monitoring the Ogallala Aquifer. Monitoring wells are also required to provide the District with at least one water analysis report from the well semi-annually.

**Hunter Education Class Set For Nov. 27 & Nov. 28**

A course in hunter education has been scheduled for Saturday, November 27th from 9:00 am to 4:30 pm and Sunday, November 28th from 1:00 p, to 4:00 pm in Groom, according to Fred Britten, Hunter Education Instructor. The class will be held in the Groom Community Center at 200 Broadway.

"According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's mandatory requirements, starting

September 1, 1989, those persons whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971 through August 31, 1973, must have successfully completed the course in order to hunt in Texas. Effective September 1, 1990, the age group affected will be those whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971 through August 31, 1974 - and so on. By September 1, 1993, all hunters born on or after September 2, 1971, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas. However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements," according to Mr. Britten.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in rifle, shotgun and bowhunting handling and safety; outdoor responsibility and ethics; laws and regulations; conservation; hunting traditions; wildlife identification; field care of game; wilderness first aid and survival," Fred Britten added.

Students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department. Those less than 12 years of age will receive a certificate of attendance, but must take the course again for proper certification.

More than 242,643 Texans have already completed the hunter education course which is mandatory in 39 states. The course cost is \$5.00. Students will need to have their social security number and a guardian signature if they are under 17 years.

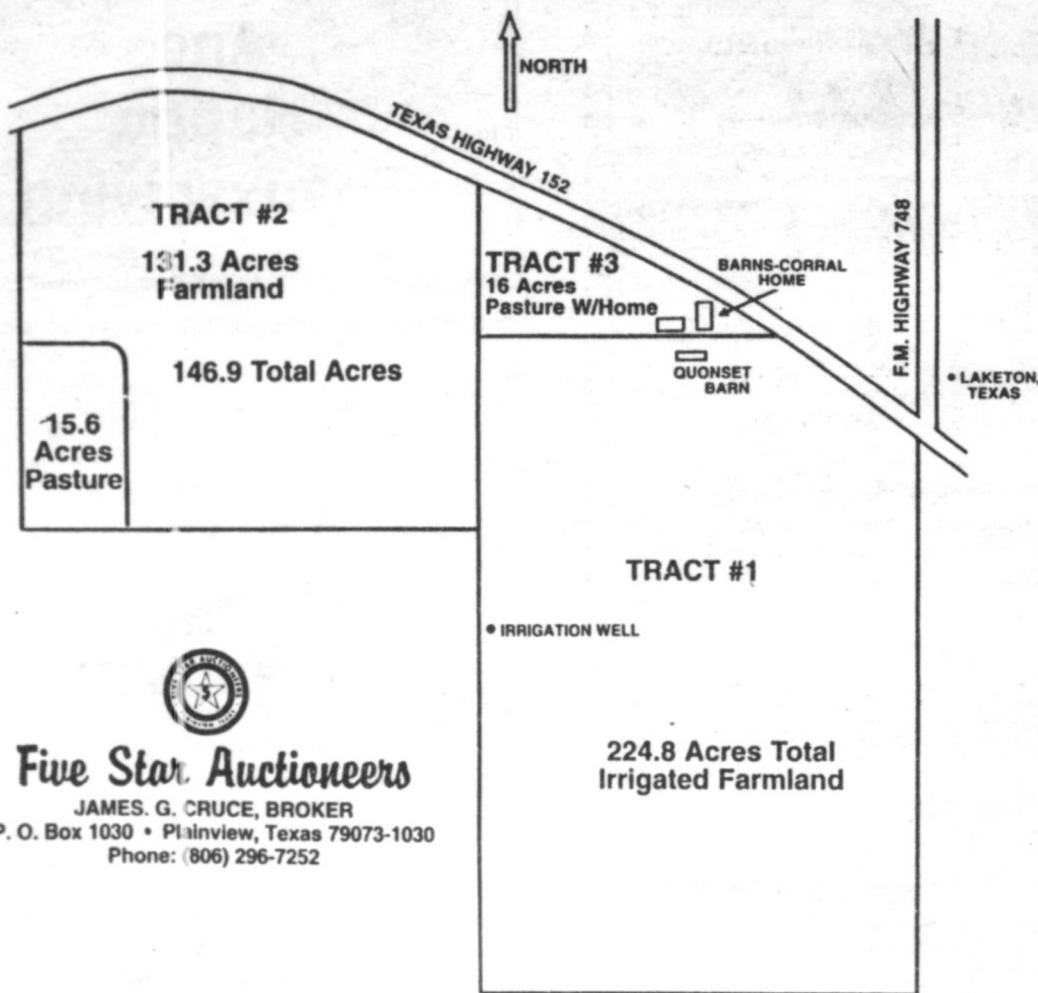

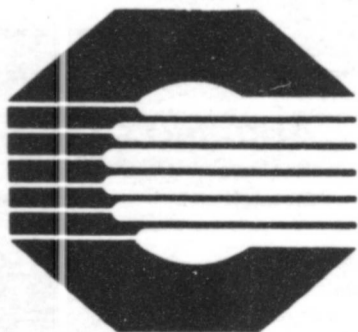

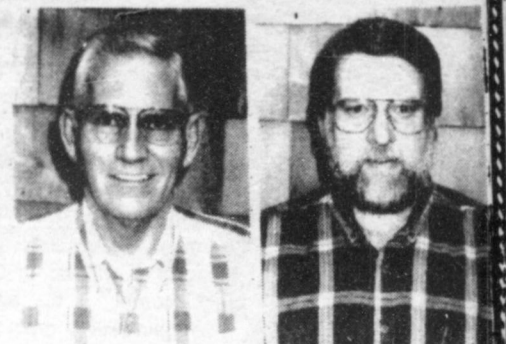

**Social Security Recipients  
To Get Benefit Statements**

Social Security beneficiaries will receive statements in the mail in January showing the benefits they received in 1993. This statement should be used to determine if any benefits are subject to Federal Income tax. To insure you receive the statement, make sure Social Security has your correct address. This is especially important for individuals who receive their benefits by direct deposit.

Most of those who receive the statement - Form SSA 1099 - will not have to pay taxes on their Social Security benefits because their total income is less than the taxable ceiling. If you receive Social Security benefits as your only source of income, you are unlikely to owe the Federal taxes on the benefits.

An Internal Revenue Services (IRS) worksheet - IRS Notice 703 - comes with the benefit statement. The worksheet shows you how to determine if your Social Security benefits are subject to tax. If, after completing the worksheet, you have questions about your tax liability, you should call the IRS toll-free number, 1-800-829-1040 and ask for Publication 915, which contains tax information about Social Security benefits.

Beneficiaries who file an individual tax return may owe taxes on some of their benefits if their combined income exceeds \$25,000. Married couples who file joint returns may have to pay taxes on some of their benefits if their combined benefits exceed \$32,000. Married couples who live together but file separate tax returns probably will pay taxes on part of their benefits. For income tax purposes, combined income is defined as the sum of an individual's (or couple's) adjusted gross income plus interest plus one-half of all Social Security benefits received for the year.
