Carson County Sheriff's Dept. Investigate Burglaries

By Loren Brand, Sheriff The Carson County Sheriff's Department is continuing to investigate a case of criminal mischief which involved several thousand dollars in property damage in Carson and Gray

Counties near Groom. We have greatly appreciated the assistance provided to us by persons having information on this crime and we would certainly welcome further information which ' might help us bring the matter to resolution.

Sheriff's deputies are investigating two burglaries which were reported on Friday. One burglary involved the theft of a VCR and cash and the other involved the theft of livestock. We are currently following leads on both burglaries.

The Sheriff's Department was called to Groom to investigate a report of a woman and child who had been abandoned on the interstate. Further investigation showed that the woman and child were

in the company of man with a vehicle and that they were simply trying to solicit funds from local residents. We are working with authorities in Oklahoma and New Mexico to prosecute these individuals.

The Sheriff's Department, Texas Highway Patrol and Panhandle Police Department assisted Amarillo authorities in an attempt to locate a stolen vehicle from Arizona. In addition to driving a stolen vehicle, the male and female in the car were suspected of having taken pornographic photographs of a young child in the vehicle. The matter is still under investigation.

Our Department has purchased a lap top computer for investigative purposes in an experimental program where we hope to increase our effectiveness in solving crimes. In addition to basic word processing capabilities, the computer will be outfitted with modem and scan modifications in addition to the Vin Assist Program which has been installed allowing us to better detect altered or falsified serial numbers on vehicles. The system is currently assigned to Deputy Jeff Oldham (White Deer) for evaluation. Residents of Groom can now anonymously call in crime tip information to 248-7346. The calls are recorded for regular review, but calls requiring immediate notification should still be made to 537-3511 or 9-1-1 in emergencies.





The Junior High basketball teams cleaned up with two victories Monday night in their match with Adrian.




Nora Belle Weddle Moore




