

The Groom School Board met in regular session with all members present last Thursday night. Also attending the meeting were Superintendent Sweatt, Principal Judy Babcock, Clerk Joyce Hutsell, and visitors Curtis Downs, Gary Britten, Sharon Britten, Donald Burgin, Nila Burgin, Gary Friemel, Jay Lamb, and Debra Addy.

Executive session was called at 7:03 pm. The board reconvened to open session after almost 21/2 hours of deliberation.

A twelve month contract was offered to Kenneth Sweatt for the superintendent at step 8 on the long range finance salary scale. Ken Burger voted

### **Carson County Receives** Award For Safety Record

Carson County has received a safety award from the Texas Association of Counties for maintaining an excellent record of controlling Worker's seems to be on the rise and Compensation claims. 



Crime Victims Compensation benefits are available to innocent victims of violent crimes who suffer personal injury, to surviving spouses or children of a deceased victim, to a person who legally assumes the obligations or voluntarily pays the medical or burial expenses of a deceased victim, to a deceased victim's immediate family member who requires counseling and who resided in the same household as

the deceased or to an immediate family member requiring counseling because of the crime.

Victims of violent crimes have rights and the Carson County Sheriff's Department is interested in providing for these victims. If you have questions regarding your eligibility to file for compensation as a crime victim, please contact Lee Tice at 537-3511.

#### **Recipe Requirements:**

Only appetizer recipes will be considered. All recipes must be original. Previously published recipes, such as those published in magazines or cookbooks, will be disqualified unless the recipe has at least three significant

The meat must be primarily teef (51%), with other meat additions being acceptable. Recipe may use any whole cut of beef, hamburger, or variety meat. Beef items such as deli roast beef, corned beef and pastrami may be used. Use of leftover meat is also encouraged.


The Brush and Palette Club started the new year with a luncheon and an all day painting session on January 10.



The limit is set at 10 miliigrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water to be 11.73 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excest of Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply the possible produce "blue baby" symptoms. Parents are advised to find other sources of drinking water such as bottled water, for their infants under 6 months of age. All doctors and hospitals in the area have been notified of this situation. The city will offer to provide bottled water of acceptable quality to pregnant women and to infants under 6 months of age for cooking and drinking purposes.

I enjoy being a tourist and I like having tourists stopping in McLean. Sincerely,




area, as an exhibitor or just an interested party, let us know. We need experience and help. We also have been asked to have an arts and crafts show again. Let us know at the museum.


