

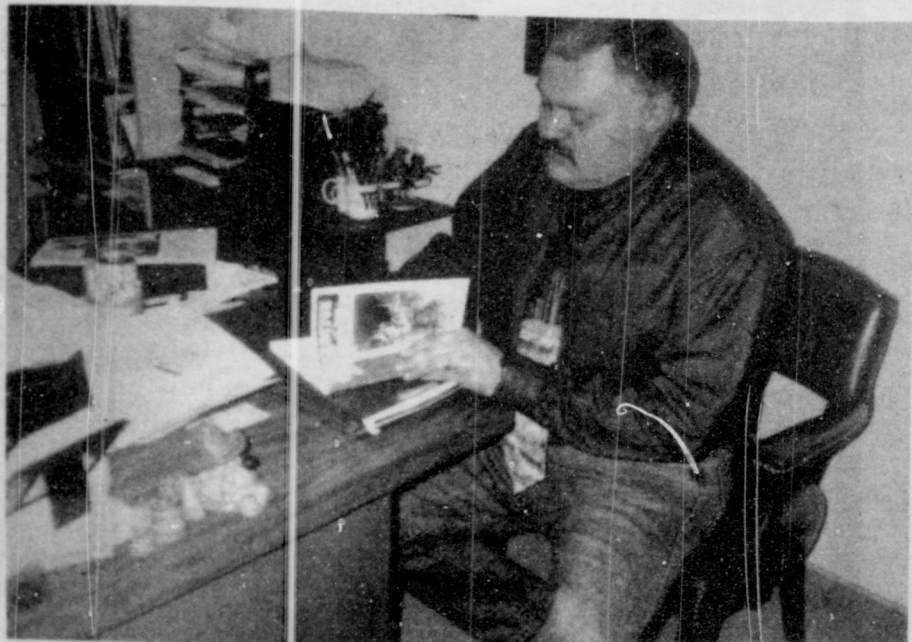

Immunization Clinic Set For January 24 At Groom

Groom School is sponsoring an immunization clinic to be held on January 24, 1994, from 10:00-12:00 and from 1:00-4:00. Parents are encouraged to make arrangements for their children to obtain the required immunizations during this time. Students requiring immunizations need to be picked up by their parents and transported to the Groom Clinic. Only in cases of extreme hardship when the parent cannot be present, will the students be transported and the parent will be asked to sign an authorization slip permitting the immunization of their

child. It is strongly requested that all parents whose children need immunizations make an effort to attend the clinic with their child. The fee for immunizations will be based on income and family size with charges ranging from 0-\$15 per child, according to the Public Health Department. Those students needing immunizations should have received a notice over the Christmas break.

Texas State law requires that all students born after September, 1978, have 2 MMR immunizations on or before their 12th birthday. Students may obtain the

second MMR at the clinic regardless of age if the parent desires. This opportunity is provided for the benefit of the student and the parent. Normal Public Health Department charges apply.

Preschool age children are welcome to receive immunizations during the clinic hours of 2:30-4:00. Parents are asked to bring child's immunization record with them to the clinic for recording given immunizations.

Groom School Board Offers Administrative Contracts To Sweat, Babcock and Hutsell

The Groom School Board met in regular session with all members present last Thursday night. Also attending the meeting were Superintendent Sweatt, Principal Judy Babcock, Clerk Joyce Hutsell, and visitors Curtis Downs, Gary Britten, Sharon Britten, Donald Burgin, Nila Burgin, Gary Friemel, Jay Lamb, and Debra Addy.

Executive session was called at 7:03 pm. The board reconvened to open session after almost 2½ hours of deliberation.

A twelve month contract was offered to Kenneth Sweatt for the superintendent at step 8 on the long range finance salary scale. Ken Burger voted against the motion, Dennis

Babcock, Don Lyles, Adela Kotara, Tony Treadwell, David Britten and Gary Davis were for the measure.

An eleven month contract was offered to Judy Babcock at step 10 in the long range finance salary scale. Tony Treadwell voted against the measure. Dennis Babcock, Don Lyles, Adela Kotara, Ken Burger, Gary Davis and David Britten were for the measure.

Joyce Hutsell was offered a twelve month contract also at step 10.

All members voted for the measure except Ken Burger who abstained from voting.

A presentation was given concerning recent TAAS testing results. The results

were unanimously approved.

The board again, adjourned into executive session to discuss 1994 personnel assignments at 9:37. They reconvened at 10:52. No action was taken.

A policy regarding family and medical leave was adopted.

The board also passed a resolution to proceed with repairs of the school owned house at 307 Wilkerson Avenue that was damaged by fire on December 27th.

Carson County Receives Award For Safety Record

Carson County has received a safety award from the Texas Association of Counties for maintaining an excellent record of controlling Worker's Compensation claims.

Carson County has saved approximately \$38,670 in Workers' Compensation costs in 1993, according to the state association.

The award was acknowledged by county commissioners in their regular session on Monday, January 10.

Senator Steven Carriker Files For Re-Election

Thirtieth District State Senator Steven A. Carriker has filed in the Democratic Primary for re-election to the office he has served in since 1988.

At the age of 43, Senator Carriker is among the youngest members of the Texas Senate and the only member of the Senate to make his living as a farmer. He is a graduate of the University of Texas and his wife Kathy, a Texas Tech graduate, is a public school

teacher. They have three children: Jake, a student at Southwest Texas University, and Karen and Stephanie who attend elementary school in Roby.

Senator Carriker has been active in health care issues and was responsible for the 1989 law that has helped create over 170 rural health clinics in communities that had lost or were in danger of losing their health care facilities entirely. His

Tice Named Victims Liaison

Lee Tice has been named Victims Liaison for Crime Victims Compensation with the Carson County Sheriff's Department. Mrs. Tice will assist eligible crime victims in filing their claims with the state. She will also be responsible for tracking the progress of cases under consideration.

Crime Victims Compensation benefits are available to innocent victims of violent crimes who suffer personal injury, to surviving spouses or children of a deceased victim, to a person who legally assumes the obligations or voluntarily pays the medical or burial expenses of a deceased victim, to a deceased victim's immediate family member who requires counseling and who resided in the same household as

the deceased or to an immediate family member requiring counseling because of the crime.

Victims of violent crimes have rights and the Carson County Sheriff's Department is interested in providing for these victims. If you have questions regarding your eligibility to file for compensation as a crime victim, please contact Lee Tice at 537-3511.

The Great Beef Appetizer Search

Recipe Requirements:

Only appetizer recipes will be considered. All recipes must be original. Previously published recipes, such as those published in magazines or cookbooks, will be disqualified unless the recipe has at least three significant changes.

The meat must be primarily beef (51%), with other meat additions being acceptable. Recipe may use any whole cut of beef, hamburger, or variety meat. Beef items such as deli roast beef, corned beef and pastrami may be used. Use of leftover meat is also encouraged.

Non-beef flavor enhancers (e.g. pork bacon, anchovies) may be used.

Recipe can contain no more than 12 ingredients, excluding salt, pepper and water.

Avoid labor intensive preparations. Ideally the recipe should be made a few hours ahead of serving time with minimal last minute preparations.

Rules:

- 1) To be eligible, contestant must be a member of Texas CattleWomen.
- 2) Recipe must include: name of recipe, number of servings, list of ingredients with specific quantities (standard U.S. measurements) in order of use, and complete preparation directions including cooking time and temperature.
- 3) To enter, send your recipe(s) to The Great Beef Appetizer Search, 8310 Capital of Texas Hwy. N. Ste. 440, Austin, Texas 78731. Recipes should be typed or legibly written on an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper (one side only) and include name, address, telephone number (home and work).
- 4) Entries must be postmarked by February 15, 1994, and received by February 22, 1994. Entries will not be acknowledged or returned.
- 5) Recipes will be judged by a panel of food professionals.
- 6) Prizes will be awarded as follows: Five recipes will be chosen and served at the TSCRA convention in Ft. Worth (March 27-30). Winners may choose one of the following prizes valued up to \$200: Attend a cooking class of choice, select an assortment of choice beef cuts, enjoy a weekend getaway or a dinner for four prepared by your favorite Texas chef.
- 7) Once submitted, recipes will become the joint property of Texas CattleWomen and Texas Beef Council and can be used for promotional purposes.

The county personnel policy handbook was also discussed. Two amendments were made: 1) delete Election Day as an official county holiday and add Columbus Day; 2) county employees will be allowed to keep fee paid for jury service.

In other business, the 1994 grievance committee was appointed (four people will be contacted to serve), a bid of \$7,608 from A.J. Weiser Co. for county auto liability insurance was accepted, and County Tax Collector Roslyn Watson reported that 85% of county taxes have been paid to date.

Senator Carriker has passed six bills reducing taxes and protecting taxpayer rights. Among those bills reducing the oil severance tax, abating property taxes, and protecting retirees from illegitimate income taxes levied by other states.

Senator Carriker has also just completed a four year term on the Texas Sunset Commission where his work resulted in the abolition or consolidation of ten agencies and a savings to taxpayers of 54 million dollars.

"I am proud of the confidence the people of the Thirtieth District have placed in me and am glad to have the opportunity to continue to represent them," Senator Carriker said.

Nine persons were received for processing at the Carson County Jail this past week. There are currently five persons incarcerated in Carson County. One subject is confined for unpaid fines regarding game violations, one for possession of a controlled substance, one for violation of parole, one for DWI and one for involuntary manslaughter.

Our department responded to an incident of domestic violence in Fritch and secured an individual near Panhandle for evading arrest.

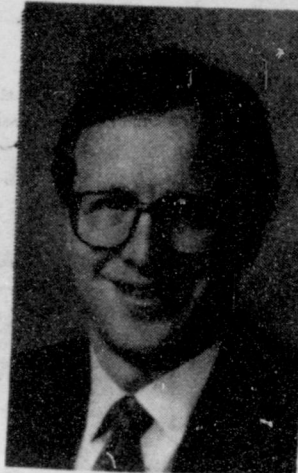

The limit is set at 10 milligrams of Nitrate (as nitrogen) per liter of water. The amount of Nitrate (as nitrogen) in the water to be 11.73 milligrams per liter.

Adults and children over the age of 6 months need not be concerned about drinking water from the tap. An excess of Nitrate intake by an infant under the age of 6 months may reduce its available oxygen supply the possible produce "blue baby" symptoms. 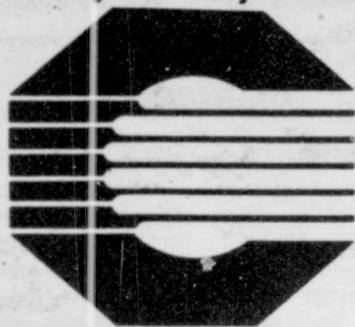

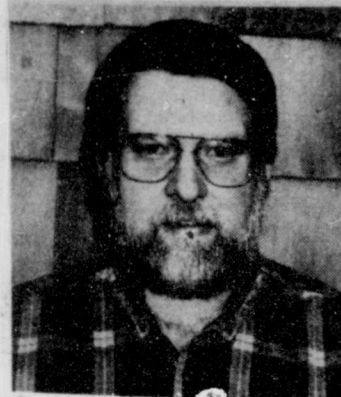

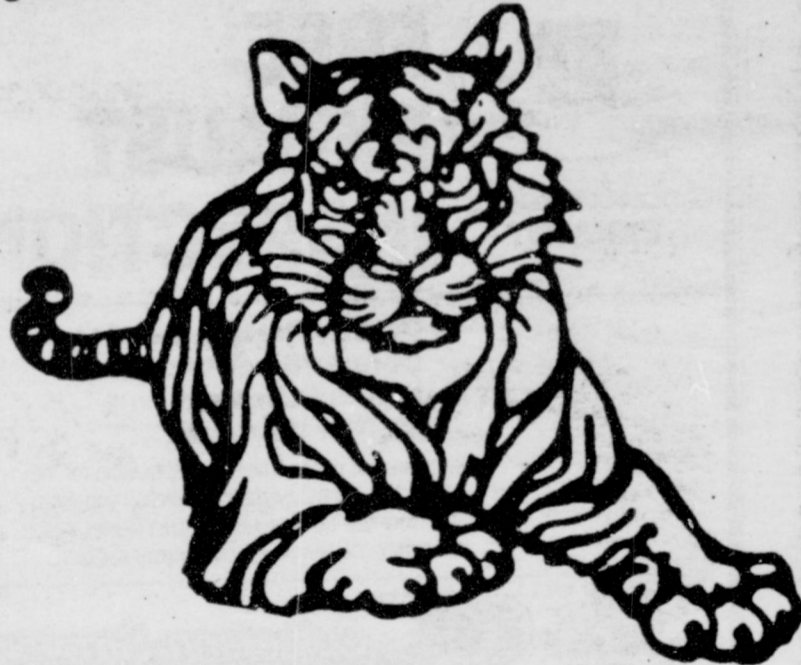
