The coaches collectively


stated that they felt it went well and they felt that it gave the boys a chance to play an 11-man scrimmage and work out the rules.



The City of Groom was hit hard in 1981. We lost a Hospital, a railroad, and the Highway circle around town.

A job at the school eased me into retirement.

was at a Route 66 auditorium.

Fire Department is Reorganized By the 1967 Edition of the Groom News

I found out when I was researching some hing for the Girl Scouts of Groom that The City of Groom had twice nearly burned to the ground. I thought then we should have a honor roll of our volunteer firemen to honor them in some small way for their tremendous contribution to the safekeeping of our community. Below is an excerpt about some early

#### More Rt. 66 Memories

firemen.

A few weeks ago the Groom Fire Department was re-organized after many of the older members retired after years of service, some as many as 38 years. Among those retiring were: Sam Black, who had joined the department in 1928, and retired this year with the longest term of service. C.L. Culver, from 1934 -1967; Melvin Asberry, from 1935 - 1967, he was elected fire chief in 1938 and served until his retirement, a period of 29 years; Ted Friemel and Bill Cornett 1946 - 1967; Lee Crowell, 1947 -1967; Jack Pool, 1939 - 1948; Ben Franklin, 1929 -1960; Grady Stapp, 1942 -1952; Ernest Lamberson, 1951 -1967. All of the retiring members were given plaques by the city of Groom in recognition of their many years of service. Presentation of the plaques was mad by John Quirk, chief of the fire department.

Groom has one of the best records of any city in the Texas Panhandle for the past 40 years. The good fire record has meant thousands of dollars to local people in savings on insurance premiums over the 40 years period. The local fire department deserves much praise for its activities in fire protection as well as for the many civic projects it has supported.

Rt. 66 Responsible For Many Families Livelihood By Donna Burton

Al Homer like many others along old Route 66 used the Mother Road to make a living for his family.

"I started with Texaco in 1955, after working with the Magnolia Petroleum Co. beginning in 1939, when we fixed flats for 50 cents and sold gasaline for 25 cents a gallon." stated the former mayor of Groom, "it was

not uncommon then to have traffic backed up bumper to bumper waiting for service at the station we operated 24 hours a day.

Homer stated that he grossed \$90,000. in 1955 and that it soon esculated to \$600,000. per year.

Homer gave up his career at the Gas Station in 1973. His interest in the survival of Groom did not stop, as he eventually became Mayor and continued to watch Groom flourish, right up until that fateful day.

It all stopped at 1:15 p.m. on June 2, 1980 when Interstate 40 opened routing traffic away from Groom.

# **Local Shooters Participate In National Competition In Ohio**

Three local shooters from Carson County competed in the 1994 National Matches held at Camp Perry, Ohio, July 20-30. Those attending were Michael Lewis, Jeremy Lewis and Todd Gray.

These athletes competed during the smallbore three position and prone championships. Around 320 competitors attended this year.

During the three position phase Michael Lewis finished sixth in the Expert Intermediate Class.

Jeremy finished second in Sharpshooters Sub-Junior Class. During this time Todd Gray toured the military base and met new friends.

The fourth day the boys shot the prone phase of the match. Michael finished second in Expert Intermediate Class, scoring 6371 with 449 center shots, 6 points and 2 center behind the Expert Intermediate winner.

Jeremy finished third in sharpshooter Sub-Junior Class scoring 6320 with 363 center shots. Todd finished second in the Marksmen Sub-Junior Class scoring 6209 with 219 center shots.

These boys had a very

good time, saw many places, one of which was the Pro Bass Sports World in Springfield, Missouri. They saw the Arch in Saint Louis, Lake Erie (one of the Great Lakes), and the base at Camp Perry, Ohio. Everyone looks forward to the next trip to Chino, California.

LEWIS-FINLEY TEAM WINS SHOOTING MATCH

Michael Lewis of Groom and Joe Finley of Claude earned the right to compete in the National Match Whistler Boy Contest by being the top two juniors in the State of Texas. Once again they proved to be the best by taking the championship for Texas State Rifle Association.

The Whistler Boy Match is a shooting contest that is sponsored by the Director of Civilian Marksmanship and operated by the National Rifle Association during the national matches in Camp Perry, Ohio. It is made up of a two-member team and composed of shooting a three position match and a Dewar match for a total of 100 shots and possible perfect score of

2000 combined. The rifles must be the kind issued by the military for training and ammunition used is issued on the firing line so all competitors compete with similar equipment.

Michael and Joe with Will Finley represented the State of Texas and proved to do their best by winning. Joe shot a total score of 913 x 24 x's while Michael shot 909 x 21 x's for a total combined 1822 - 45 x's which was 38 points above the second place team who scored 1784- 38's. There was a total of 51 teams represented in the 1994 Whistler Boy match.

The only other teams from Texas were Carson County Sharpshooters composed of Jeremy Lewis and Todd Gray placing 14th with a score of 1678 - 29 x's and Armstrong County 4-H Shooting Club composed of Mandie Boothe and Nikkole Bryant placing 28th scoring 1540 - 12 x's.

The winners and coach were presented plaques with a picture of the original Whistler Boy Trophy and Gold Medallions.

Youths Compete In 4-H Rodeo

Four Groom youth competed in a two day Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo in Shamrock. On Friday in the 5 and Under Stick Horse Age Group Chantel Longway placed 5th in Barrels, Flags, and Goat Ribbon Race and took a 6th in Poles. In the 6-9 Age Group Brent Longway placed 5th in Barrels and Poles, 6th in Flags and 2nd in the Goat Ribbon Race. 


An Amarilo juvenile reported that he was assaulted while in White Deer. This matter is being investigated by our department and the White Deer City Marshal.





# Health Break Defines "Heat Syndrome" Symptoms

#### AN INTERESTING PROJECT

By Delbert Trew Years ago, while living in Perryton, I bought a 17 bed hospital. It was complete with the exception of the xray machine. The old Doctor had passed away and the family sold it to me. The oil boom was going strong, and I planned to remodel it into an office building. And as usual, I just couldn't bring myself to throw anything away. What could I possibly do with all

We would lay brick pallets on the ground, make 4'x4'x8' crates, fastened to the pallets underneath. We packed everything, including the sinks, commodes, beds, (and those 17 bedpans) and other furnishings into the crates, using sheets, towels, and mattresses, etc. for padding and filler. The kitchen utens ls, flatware, dishes, along with the nursery furnishings were even the light added, fixtures were removed from the operating room and packed with several boxes of surgical tools and equipment.

Box after box of medicines, supplies, and even office furnishings were packed into the crates. When all the lids were nailed down, steel banding strapped the crates to the pallets. A Houston trucking firm hauled 21 of these huge crates to Houston where it was placed on freighters bound for Lima. The freight costs were paid by the State of Texas, and

the hauling was donated. About six months later, we had given up on hearing anything about the crates. Then we received a very official letter from the Minister of the Interior of Peru, thanking us for the gift. He went on to explain that it had been given to a group of nuns, at a large church in the slums of Lima. They had dismantled the crates and built a leanto type building onto the rear of their church and medical treatment center. He said every item including the nails and strapping holding it all together were saved and put to use.

Humans normally adjust to excessive temperatures by complex cardiovascular and neurologic changes, which are coordinated by the hypothalamus gland. Heat loss offsets heat production to regulate the body temperature. It does this by sweating or dilation of surface blood vessels, which cools the body's surface by radiation, conduction, and convection.

Sometimes both environmental and internal factors can increase heat production or decrease heat loss beyond the body's ability to compensate. When this happens, heat syndrome results. syndrome falls into three categories: heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke.

Causes of heat syndrome may include excessive exercise, infection, drugs, high temperatures or humidity, lack of acclimatization, excess clothing, cardiovascular disease, obesity, dehydration, and sweat gland dysfunction.

Heat stroke often is seen in elderly people during excessively hot summer days, particularly when they are inside with windows and doors closed and have no air conditioning. stroke can cause such complications as hypovolemic or cardiogenic shock, cardiac arrhythmias and renal failure.

Signs and symptoms vary with the type of heat syndrome:

- Heat Cramps: Pain, muscle twitching and spasm, moist-cool skin, muscle

- Heat Exhaustion: Muscle cramps, nausea, vomiting, thirst, weakness, oliguria (scant urine output), headache, fatigue, elevated temperature, pale skin, mental confusion. giddiness, fainting, impaired judgement, and hyperventilation. If sweating stops, suspect an evolving heat stroke.

- Heat Stroke: Weakness, dizziness, nausea, vomiting blurred vision, temp. 105 degrees or more, red-sweaty-hot skin in early stages, gray-dry-hot skin in later stages, rapid pulse, confusion, delirium, seizures, collapse, unconsciousness.

For heat cramps, treatment consists of moving the victim to a cool environment, providing rest, and administering oral fluid and electrolyte replacement (such as Pedialyte). Treatment for heat exhaustion involves moving the patient to a cool environment, providing rest and administering electrolyte replacement. If the victim's condition does not improve, call 911 or go to the E.R.

immediately. If heat stroke is suspected, call 911. The therapy for heat stroke focuses on lowering the body temperature as rapidly as possible. The patient's clothing is removed, and

cool water is applied to the skin, followed by fanning Shivering with cool air. must be controlled with medications. Application of hypothermia blankets and ice packs to the groin and underarms also helps lower body temperature. Treatment continues until the body temperature drops to 102.2 degrees Fahrenheit.

These conditions may lead to life-threatening complications, so remember to drink plenty of fluids and stay out of the heat as much as possible. If you have questions about this or any other condition. please call McLean Home Health at 779-2485 or 1-






