City Council Awards Bids

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week with all members present. Visitors attending the meeting were David Cory, CPA; Dwight Brandt, city engineer; Denny Babcock, president of the school board; Tony Treadwell, fire chief; Kenneth Sweatt, school superintendent; and Donna Burton, Groom News.

In their first order of business the Council opened sealed bids for seal coating streets in the west end of town. The three bids that were received were: G.W. James for \$37,008.15 with a 30 day work schedule. Lewis Construction for \$40,954.10 with 120 day work schedule; and E.D. Baker for \$36,470.07 and a 15 day work schedule.

After some discussion concerning last years work, the Council unanimously agreed to award the bid to G.W. James at \$37,008.15.

The Council turned the floor over to David Cory, CPA who conducted the City Audit. Cory took the Council through the audit emphasizing points along the way.

Cory stated, "The audit shows the City in good shape." "The computerization has made it a little easier."

R.E. (Bobby) Cornett moved for approval and the vote was unanimous.

Tony Treadwell, volunteer fire department chief reported on the status of the department.

"We have an increase in membership. We had

thirteen in 1993 and we have increased that to twenty in 1994. We have several junior volunteer members who are under seventeen. We have four members certified in the "Rope Rescue" techniques and ten in "Airpack" and "House and Fire Rescue."

He went on to say that the balance of members are planning to take training this summer for "Airpack and House and Fire".

"Our equipment is in really good shape. We have had eighteen calls in the last three months."

Treadwell's big concern was with the insurance that the city carries. The way this policy reads it has a \$50,000. per year maximum benefit for all the firemen

Groom School Board will have their work cut out for them to prepare for next fall's school opening with the recent resignation of Kenneth Sweatt, superintendent. day," referring to his recent acceptance of the superintendent's job at Childress I.S.D.

The School Board will also be looking for a head coach, a high school science teacher and a maintenance person as well.

Sweatt will begin his responsibilities in Childress July 1, 1994.

In other business, the Groom School Board of Trustees voted to approve the calendar for the 1994-95 school year. The calendar will include finishing the 1st semester before the break at Christmas, a feature that has been missing for several years. It will also include a week long spring break and a day off during basketball regional tournaments.

Rules for the prom were passed and will be much the same as last year, the one exception being that it will

end at twelve midnight.

Plans for the Senior Day were approved. The Seniors will travel to Dallas by airplane. They also have a contingency plan in case their last two fundraisers do not make enough money. In that event they have opted to go to Lubbock.

The Board approved the continuation of the highly successful summer math and reading program.

Stipends have been reinstated for UIL events beginning in next years budget.

Travel pay which has been 20 cents per mile for many many years has been increased to 25 cents a mile, which is still 2.5 cents less than the state standard.

Many other items were on the agenda, but due to press deadlines, we hope to have this information for you next week.

4,000 Affected By Cut Phone Lines

GTE experienced a major long distance fiber cable cut near Hedley, Texas at 2:45 p.m., Tuesday, April 5, 1994. Durwood Wilkinson, Brownwood district manager, stated the cut affected all incoming and outgoing long distance service to over 4,000 customers in Memphis and twelve other towns serviced from Memphis. The towns affected were: Memphis, Silvertown, Groom, Dodson, Lakeview, Quitaque, Claude, Estelline, Hedley, Panhandle, Turkey, Clarendon, and Wellington.

After the cut was located, GTE dispatched equipment and manpower immediately. The severity of the damage to the fiber cable prevented normal emergency restoration from working and required special fusion splicing equipment to be brought in to repair the cable. Additionally the fiber cut was in the bottom of a sandy creek where repair

had to be made in knee deep water and backhoe digging equipment had to be used to remove collapsing sand from the work area. These conditions caused major delays in re-establishing the toll circuits.

This outage affected only the customers ability to place or receive long distance calls. Local service within the towns was not affected.

GTE employees using mobile radio and cellular phones assisted local medical agencies with several emergency long-distance calls.

"GTE wishes to apologize for any inconvenience to its customers and to again stress the importance to all individuals who dig in road Right of Ways to contact the 1-800-483-1000 "Call Before You Dig" number before doing any work in a Right-of-Way," said Wilkinson.

Service to the area was restored at 3:13 a.m. Wednesday, April 6, 1994.

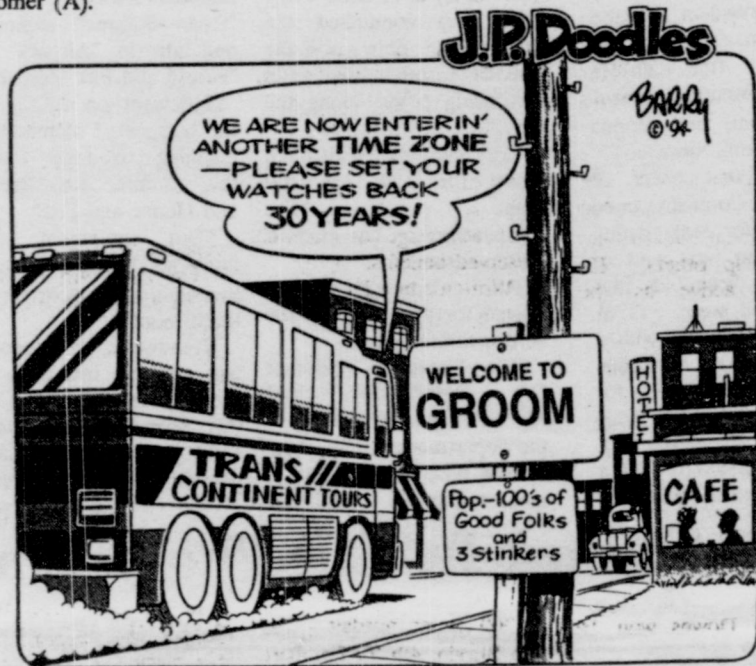

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Peeples Retires From Army National Guard

For SGT Rex Peeples the 8th day of April brings a close to 36 years of military service. SGT Peeples will reach the magic number of 60 years old on that date and begin to take advantage of the benefits he has spent the past few years encouraging others to pursue.

A 1958 graduate of West Texas State University, Rex was commissioned a 2nd LT thru the ROTC program. He served in the Army Reserve until the early 60's and moved to the Army National Guard. In 1967 he again moved to the Army Reserve where he remained until 1986.

With 28 years of service and having attained the rank of Lt. Colonel, Rex could have easily taken his 20 year letter and put the military behind him. Rather than get out entirely, he chose to come back to the Army National Guard and work to help others. He has been active as the Retention NCO for the unit. His efforts have been very beneficial to many

individual soldiers. The retention program he has established in the unit is the model for the entire Battalion.

In civilian life Rex is Superintendent of Darrrouzett, TX. He holds a Master's Degree from West Texas State University and has served as superintendent in the Samnorwood ISD, Groom ISD, and McLean ISD prior to coming to Darrrouzett. He is highly respected among his peers in the Superintendent business and is considered to be an innovator and very interested in the use of technology in education.

With the April drill SGT Peeples will trade his red ID card for that of a retired guardsman. In retirement he will go back to his rank of Lt. Colonel which he held for six years. We wish him well as he begins to take advantage of his well deserved benefits.

Nominees Selected For Citizen's Advisory Board

The first eight nominees of the Pantex Plant Citizens' Advisory Board (PPCAB) selected the remaining nominees for their board on Tuesday afternoon. The complete list of nominees for the PPCAB is: Pamela Allison, Sam Arkafic, Mavis Belisle, Willie Veverly, Lowell Cranfill, Louise Daniel, Beverly Gattis, Tonya Kleuskens, Coco Medina, Hermilo Martinez, Trish Neusch, Patrick Padilla, Ronnie Payne, Denise Price, Guyon Saunders, William Seewald, Alisa Sell, Doris Smith, C.E. Williams, and Jere White.

Individuals or groups and guarantees to approved lenders without regard to race, color, familial status, and handicap. Complaints of discrimination should be sent to: Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

The purpose of the PPCAB is to advise the Department of Energy (DOE) and the various regulating agencies on environmental, health, safety, and waste management issues at the plant. The membership selection process for the Board was developed by consensus at a public workshop in August, 1993. The membership selection process included a sixteen-member selection Committee picking the first eight nominees for the PPCAB. The first eight nominees were then responsible for picking the remaining members for their Board. The final step in the process is for the full slate of nominees to be presented to DOE. According to the August workshop, DOE can only deny the slate if it is not balanced or diverse.

In making their selections, the eight

nominees sought to include a wide diversity of interests, including stakeholders from the following categories: neighbor (within one mile of the perimeter of Pantex), area resident, regional resident, current Pantex worker, labor organizations, agricultural sector, environmental organizations, business, local government, and academia. Also, they worked to achieve ethnic, gender, and geographic diversity, in addition to

seeking a balance of views toward Pantex.

The eight nominees received over 120 applications and conducted over 40 interviews. They found their task of selecting only 20 nominees very difficult, given the high quality of the applicant pool. They would like to thank all members of the Panhandle community who expressed interest in serving on the PPCAB.

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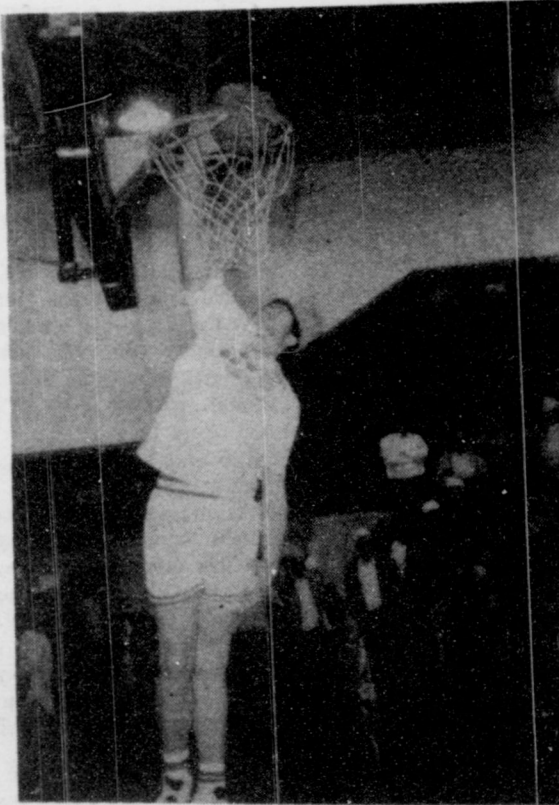

Notice Of Right To Nominate

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is accepting nominations for county Committee elections for the Carson, Hutchinson, Moore and Potter County Area Committee. This notice is issued to inform eligible voters of the right to nominate candidates by petition. Copies of the petition and instructions on its completion can be obtained from your local FmHA office.

Persons nominated should have an interest in a farm as an owner, tenant, or sharecropper within the County or area in which activities of the County or Area Committee are carried out. They must be citizens

of the United States or aliens lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence, and be well qualified for committee work. Spouses of those persons who meet the eligibility criteria are also eligible for nomination for election to the county committee. Nominations must be received in the Amarillo County Office, located at 3002 East 3rd, P.O. Box 31595, Amarillo, Texas, no later than May 15, 1994. FmHA committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, political affiliation, marital status, sex, and/or handicap.

Easement May Help FmHA Farm Borrowers With Loans

Temple - "Farmers with loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) may be able to put flood-damaged land under conservation easements in exchange for a reduction in their debt," George Ellis, FmHA State Director, said today. Use of the easements is not limited to flood areas, but it may be particularly helpful in such areas.

"Eligible lands may include wetlands, marginal

farmland, highly erodible land, woodland, wildlife areas, and several others," Ellis said. "In certain areas, there may be instances where farmland was damaged so severely by the recent flooding that restoring it may cost more than its agricultural value."

"In those cases, a conservation easement may be a solution. Under this program a voluntary easement can be placed on a portion of the land in

Ellis said the easements are for 50 years or more and can help rebuild soil conditions as well as encourage development of wildlife habitat.

"Not only can FmHA farm borrowers take marginal acreage out of production in this way, they also can materially reduce their farm operating costs," Ellis said.

Farmers who think they may be eligible should contact their local FmHA County Office for further information.

Easement May Help FmHA Farm Borrowers With Loans

Temple - "Farmers with loans from the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) may be able to put flood-damaged land under conservation easements in exchange for a reduction in their debt," George Ellis, FmHA State Director, said today. Use of the easements is not limited to flood areas, but it may be particularly helpful in such areas.

"Eligible lands may include wetlands, marginal

farmland, highly erodible land, woodland, wildlife areas, and several others," Ellis said. "In certain areas, there may be instances where farmland was damaged so severely by the recent flooding that restoring it may cost more than its agricultural value."

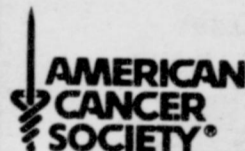
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Ellis said the easements are for 50 years or more and can help rebuild soil conditions as well as encourage development of wildlife habitat.

"Not only can FmHA farm borrowers take marginal acreage out of production in this way, they also can materially reduce their farm operating costs," Ellis said.

Farmers who think they may be eligible should contact their local FmHA County Office for further information.

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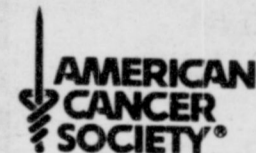

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Sheriff's Report

By Loren Brand, Sheriff
The Carson County Jail is currently holding six persons. The charges range from Possession of Methamphetamine to Parole Violation and Involuntary Manslaughter. With the cooperation of other area law enforcement agencies, our department has been attempting to reduce the jail population in Carson County by limiting the incarcerated subjects to the persons who would be considered violent offenders or a danger to the residents of Carson County. This population reduction is necessary due to the restrictions placed on Carson County by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards.

Sgt. Steve Hardin recently attended a class in Dumas which dealt with updated information on the current requirements which must be met to incarcerate prisoners.

One man was recently indicted for Felony Theft in regards to the theft of a hay baler from the Groom area. In addition, we have received substantial information on other suspects in area burglaries and we are pursuing further evidence in those matters. Our success in these cases is largely due to the cooperative information and efforts by the Randall County Sheriff's Department, Oldham County Sheriff's Department, Texas Rangers Company C and the Texas Southwestern Cattlemen's Association Rangers.

The State Fire Marshal's Office was called in to assist in the investigation of a fire which destroyed a great deal of property in the Webb-Bragg Addition of Carson County near Interstate 40. In addition to the property which was fire and smoke

damaged, the smoke limited visibility on Interstate 40 and two persons were hospitalized after being involved in a seven-car-pile-up on the highway. The cause of the fire was determined as accidental.

While the efforts of the many fire fighters, law officers and other persons who helped to battle the fire, our department particularly recognized the efforts of Sgt. Steve Hardin for his handling of the dispatching, recording and monitoring of the radio traffic and telephone calls which result from such an emergency; Sgt. Ray Davis for his supervisory efforts at the scene; and Texas Highway Patrol Trooper Chris Ray for his efforts in coordinating the activity of emergency units at the scene and for handling the traffic accidents on Interstate 40 in such a manner as to limit the potential of further injury or property damage.

The fire was brought under control due to the cooperative efforts of personnel from: the Pantex Fire Department, Potter County Fire Department, Panhandle Fire Department, Groom Fire Department, White Deer Fire Department, Skellytown Fire Department, Claude Fire Department, Texas Highway Patrol, Texas Department of Transportation and countless other volunteers. The American Red Cross provided refreshments to the firefighters and offered aid to fire victims.

As bad as the situation was, it could have been much worse if not for the assistance of such dedicated professionals.

Medicare & Hospice Care Benefits

When a Medicare beneficiary needs hospice care for a terminal illness, Medicare Hospital Insurance (Part A) may cover the cost of the required services. Home-care, inpatient care-when-needed-and-a number of other services may be paid for under the hospice benefits.

To receive this coverage, the patient must meet three conditions: 1) a physician certifies that the patient is terminally ill-with a life expectancy of six months or less if the disease runs its course; 2) the patient chooses to be cared for by a hospice instead of using standard Medicare benefits for the terminal disease; and 3) care is provided by a Medicare-participating hospice program. The approved hospice and the beneficiary's attending physician must jointly establish the plan of care.

Medicare will pay almost the entire cost of the following services if they are provided by a Medicare-approved hospice: physicians services, nursing services, drugs, including outpatient drugs for pain relief and symptom management, short-term inpatient care, including respite care, home health aide and homemaker services, physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech/language pathology, medical social services, counseling, including dietary advice; and medical supplies and equipment.

Medicare pays for: two 90-day periods of hospice care, one additional 30-day period, and an extension of unlimited duration, if it is needed. These "benefit periods" can be used consecutively or at intervals but, at the beginning of each period, the beneficiary must be certified as terminally ill. There are special rules when you change hospice programs, cancel and re-elect hospice care, and use your standard Medicare coverage for treatment of a condition that is not related to the terminal illness, even if you remain in the hospice.

Medicare - approved hospices in your area, contact your state or local health department, state hospice organization, or local Social Security office.

Or, call the toll free telephone number of the National Hospice Organization, 1-800-658-8898. Information about Medicare hospice benefits is found in the leaflet, "Medicare Hospice Benefits-A Special Way of caring for the terminally ill," available at your local Social Security office or by calling Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. Detailed information about the Medicare program is found in the "Medicare Handbook" available free by calling the Health Care Financing Administration's toll-free number 1-800-638-6833.

The total cost of the screening is \$70.00. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam, and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which (includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram. Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle

against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are: 1) Learn and perform breast self

examination every month. 2) Have a physical examination every year. 3) Have a mammogram according to recommendations by age: 40 - One baseline mammogram; 40 to 49 - A mammogram every 1 to 2 years; 50 and over - Yearly mammogram.

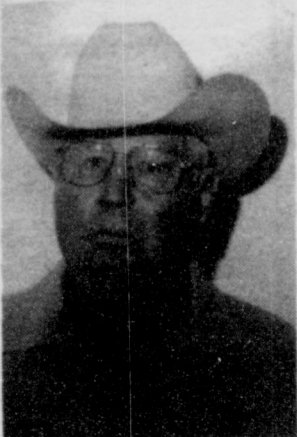

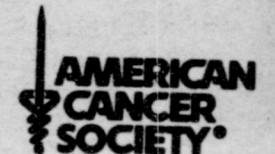



If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.


