Both Groom varsity teams are still leading the district despite the boys loss to Kelton on Friday night.

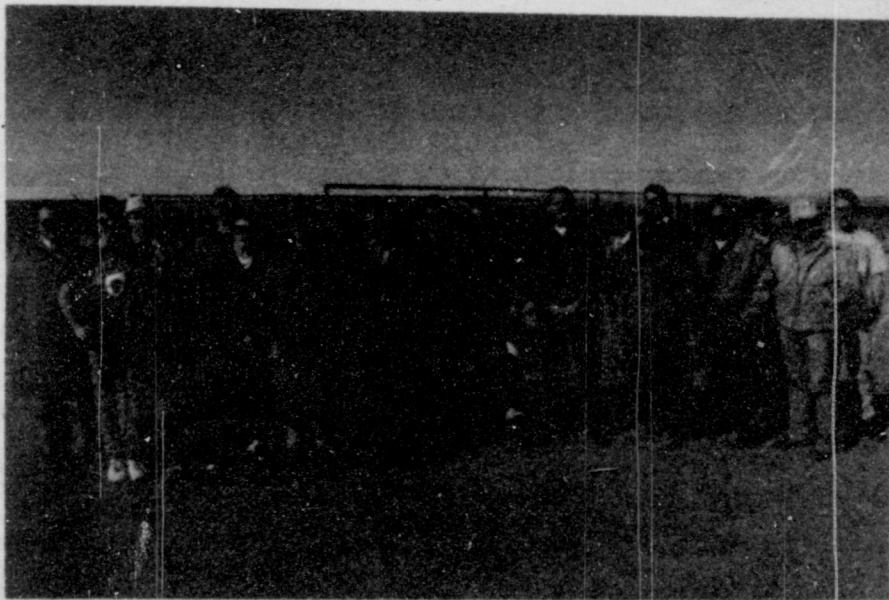
"We are still in front," said boys coach Jay Lamb. "Kelton has lost two of their district games."

Carson Co, Sheriff's Report

There were sixteen persons booked into the Carson County Jail over the past week. Eleven persons remain incarcerated at this time. Ten of the sixteen arrests involved drug-related charges. We are beginning to see more incidents involving crack cocaine and similar materials than we have encountered before.

Deputies were called to Fritch to investigate the

unlawful entry of a vacant house. When the officers arrived two adults were taken into custody along with two minor children. Because the mother had endangered the children by exposing them to the elements with no regard for their safety, we called the Department of Human Services and initiated an investigation to determine whether the mother should be allowed to retain custody of the children. DHS placed the children with other family members pending the outcome of this investigation.

Sheriff's deputies and the Santa Fe Railroad Police detained and questioned a subject who had been seen trespassing on a train which was passing through Carson County. It appears that the subject may have attempted to enter a sealed railroad car.

The Sheriff's Department was called to the scene of a building explosion which occurred during early morning hours south of Skellytown. Because of the early hours, no employees were at the site and no injuries were reported. Skellytown Fire Chief Mike Tice and the Fire Marshal from the Borger Fire Department were called to assist in the determination of origin of fire. The initial investigation showed that the fire started in a wall locker and that spontaneous combustion was the probable cause of the fire.

One person was arrested after damaging private property south of Borger with a motor vehicle.

Deputy Jeff Oldham of White Deer is currently attending training in Midland for operator certification on the intoxilyzer breath analysis instrument.

The Sheriff's Department was also kept quite busy this week with domestic disputes and calls for assistance and then it snowed . . .

6,756 volunteer hours were worked in 1993. The Museum and Historical Committee worked with the youth of the county as well as the local Chamber of Commerce and the area committee's. Historic preservation was promoted in 1993 by historical

DPS Report... As The Interstate Turns

On Monday, January 10th a California man was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia on I-40, ten miles west of Groom. The man was taken before Judge Hinson where he pled guilty and paid a fine of \$200.00. Further investigation revealed the man was wanted in New Jersey for drug trafficking. They would not extradite from this far away. New Jersey was advised of the man's route of travel and destination.

On Tuesday, January 11th, Trooper Davis arrested a man for possession of an altered vehicle and unauthorized use after it was determined he had switched the VIN Plates on the pick up he was driving. The man was taken to the Carson County Sheriff's Office where he was placed in jail until he could post bond.

On Tuesday, January 11th, Trooper Davis

investigated an accident 13 miles east of Groom on I-40. The Jeep was towing a U-haul trailer when it hit an icy road patch and they jack-knifed, sliding off the road. 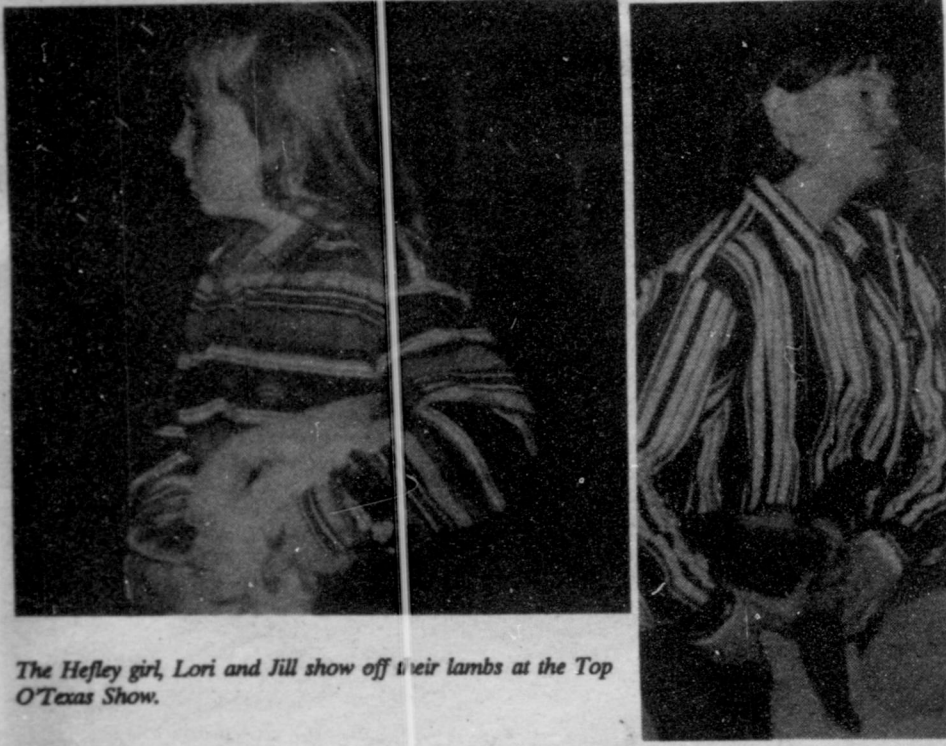
