Board Hires Ingham As New Superintendent

After several special sessions of the Groom School Board, Trustees have offered employment to Ben Ingham, currently employed by the Texhoma School System, as Superintendent.

A two year contract consisting of a \$48,000 per year with housing salary was negotiated. An additional \$3,600 will be paid should housing not be available. Ingham is expected to take over duties at Groom ISD sometime in July.

In other business: Elementary teacher Shawn Thrash offered her resignation.

Renee Weinheimer was offered employment as an elementary teacher at step 5.

A resolution was passed to participate in the State of Texas General Services Commission purchasing cooperative.

The Groom News hopes to interview these new school employees as soon as they are available.

Groom's Athletic Program will be welcoming two new coaches to it's staff this fall, Steve Lott and Mitchell Davis.

Lott was formerly with the Highland Park School System for 3 years. He has been named Athletic

Director and will be Head Football Coach, Head Boy's Track Coach and Junior Varsity Girls Basketball Coach.

Lott graduated from Texas A & M University in 1975. He was raised at Kaufman, Texas. His wife is currently attending West Texas A & M University working toward a teaching degree in high school History and English. They have two children, Greg, a seventh grader and Raymond, a Sophomore.

When asked why he wanted to come to Groom, he stated, "The challenge of changing the football program from 6 man to 11 man was very tempting. I knew that Groom has a tremendous amount of potential in the upcoming group of athletes. I watched them run at Lefors and talked to some of their opponents, before deciding."

Lott coached girls track at Highland Park and started the girl's program at Kaufman when they first began playing girl's basketball so he feels very comfortable with coaching girls J. V. Basketball.

Mitchell Davis will be Head of the High School Girls and Boys Basketball program. He will also assist in the High School Football program. His area of

responsibility will be line backers and receivers. He will also head up the High School Girl's Track Program.

Davis is originally from Garland, Texas and has been teaching in Hubbard, Texas. He attended Texas Tech University.

Davis is unmarried and will be living in the house owned by the school on Kirkman Street.

Coaches Shirley Fields and Larry Reid will round off the coaching staff. Fields will have Girl's Jr. High Basketball and track. Coach Reid will have Jr. High Boy's Basketball and Track as well as assisting with High School Football. His area of responsibility will be the offensive and defensive lines.

Pre - Season work outs will begin on August 3, 1994.

Council Approves Maternity Leave For Anthony

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week. Ronny Fields and R.E. Cornett were absent. Also attending were Charlotte Whatley, Jay Lamb and David Britten.

Britten and Lamb led the discussion with concerns of the ambulance department. Those being funding for additional training and insurance. They reported that a computer had been donated to them from Hoechst Celanese Chemical of Pampa. It will be used to post accounts receivable and accounts payable to insure faster, more accurate billing to the patient and the insurance company. The council recommended that they work up a budget and present it in the July city Council Meeting.

Greg Lamb is scheduled to attend the Mayor-Council Member convention in Amarillo on July 28 - 31, 1994.

Discussion was held concerning maternity leave for city secretary, Debbie Anthony. She told the council that she planned to use her accumulated sick days and vacation days, but that she would be short approximately 8 days. In an unanimous vote the council agreed to give Anthony the remaining 8 days paid for maternity leave.

construction and growth of the service sector in all major metro areas has statewide employment at an all-time high," Sharp said.

Texas cities received monthly sales tax rebates of \$11.4 million were 1.8 percent above the \$11.2 million of June 1993. Another \$158.4 million in quarterly sales tax payments went to the state's eight transit authorities, 6.1 percent above the \$149.2 million this time last year.

This month's city and county sales tax rebates include taxes collected on April sales and reported to the Comptroller in May by businesses filing monthly tax returns. The transit payments include sales taxes collected January through April and reported to the Comptroller March through May.

The City of McLean showed a healthy increase from last years \$930.76 to \$1,199.50. A net change of +28.87%. However, McLean is down for the year showing \$12,888.39 at this time last year compared to \$9,328.31, 1994 year to date. This is a decline of 27.62%.
