County Sheriff's Report

By Loren Brand, Sheriff The Sheriff's Department assisted the Texas Highway Patrol in the investigation of two separate fatality accidents on Interstate 40. An Oklahoma man was killed in a two vehicle collision Wednesday after his vehicle crossed the median and was struck by a westbound tractor-trailer. Later Friday night an Amarillo woman was killed near the Potter County line when her vehicle left the eastbound lane, rolled two and on half times and then came to rest in the westbound lane. Both victims were pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Phyllis Tyler.

Sgt. Ray Davis arrested an Oklahoma man after being notified of unusual behavior by a Carson County Precinct employee. The subject was found to be in possession of more than 9 grams of cocaine. He is currently in the Carson County Jail awaiting trial.

Deputy Jeff Oldham was called to Interstate 40 to investigate the bizarre behavior of a man driving a New York vehicle. The man was totally nude when he approached a woman at a convenience store in Groom after having followed her through several counties. The subject then went to a service station in Conway and proceeded to put fuel in his vehicle (once again, totally nude) and then left withou paying for the fuel.. Deputy Oldham located the subject just west of Conway and found him to be assaultive and, once again, totally nude. The man had to be restrained by several officers until he could be transported by ambulance to Northwest Texas Hospital for psychiatric evaluation.

We have ten persons currently incarce ated in the Carson County Jail. Of those ten persons, all are in jail for felony crimes and six are awaiting transportation. At our current rate of

transport, we are only allowed to ship one person to the Texas Department of Corrections per month.

We are investigating a burglary report in Fritch and theft to an Oklahoma vehicle that was left at an Interstate 40 rest area.

Our department has taken custody of cattle and horses in the White Deer The animals were area. taken in a seizure order from the County Attorney's. pending further office investigation of animal cruelty or neglect.

GRANDVIEW-HOPKINS BOARD MEETS

Board members of the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. met in regular session on Tuesday, May 10th at 8:00 After canvassing the pm. returns of the election held on May 7th, the board voted to accept the results. The oath of office was administered to newly elected member Gary Don Babcock, and re-elected

incumbents Charles Bowers and Marshall Hopkins.

According to local policy, the board reorganized itself. Marshall Hopkins was elected President, Troy Ritter will serve as Vice President, and John Mark Baggerman was chosen Secretary. Each officer will serve a one year term.

After approving minutes of the previous meeting and the bills presented for payment, the board approved the calendar for the 1994-95 school year. Students in the Grandview-Hopkins school district will attend school for 179 days next year, and one full day will be devoted to teacher inservice. School will begin on August 18, 1994, and teachers will report on August 16th. The last day of school will be May 25th, 1995.

The board also approved the hiring of accountant Billy Baker of Borger to conduct the audit for the 1993-94 school year. Mr. Baker also performed the

audit last year. In other business, the

board approved contracts with Region XVI for services for the 1994-95 school year, then moved on to a review of the budget for the 1994-95 school year. The proposed budget for the 1994-95 school year includes payments under Senate Bill 7 which would represent 61% of all taxes collected.

After considering the budget, the board passed a resolution to undertake an agreement with the Pampa ISD under Option 4 of Senate Bill 7. The agreement would allow Grandview-Hopkins to send local tax money earmarked by the state for redistribution to the Pampa ISD rather than to the state. A special election was called by the board for,

June 25, 1994, to allow voters in the Grandview-Hopkins ISD to approve entering into such an agreement.

On third and final reading, the board passed local policies concerning term contracts and employee complaints. The board also passed policies on second reading concerning special programs academic achievement, and relationships with other governmental authorities. On first reading, the board passed a policy dealing with school property disposal.

The meeting adjourned at 12:30 pm. The next regular meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, June 14, 1994.

The S.A. Cousins Remembered

The morning sun makes the bride's dress even whiter as she and the groom pose near the front porch. The black-and-white

picture doesn't do justice to the array of colors in the bouquet she holds, and somehow the photographer missed the top of the groom's head.

Maybe the groom didn't mind, because at age 24 he already was losing his hair. And 60 years later, that lone image of S.A. and Isabel Cousins is the only photograph they have from their wedding.

They had met about five years before when Isabel Baley was rooming at the Methodist preacher's house in McLean. After attending Clarendon College and Baylor, she was teaching school.

"The first time I ever saw S.A., he and Jack Crowe drove in the driveway, and they were singing, 'I Shall Not Be Moved,' just as loud as they could," she recalled.

Isabel, the same age as S.A., and her roommate Pearl Simmons were about to walk downtown. They ended up riding with S.A. and Jack, the preacher's son.

S.A., a McLean native, soon went back to school at Texas Tech, but now he had letters to answer. The young man with the deep visited the petite voice softspoken young lady every time he came home.

Dating was more formal When S.A. visited then. Isabel at her parents' house near Clarendon, he always put on his suit coat before knocking on the door -even in the summer heat.

In 1933, "on account of finances," S.A. came home and took a job at a little gas station (now restored as the first Phillips 66 station in Texas). "I was making \$50 a month, so we thought we ought to get married," he said.

Isabel still was teaching but had to quit because during the Depression, a woman couldn't teach if her husband had a job.

31, 1934, at the home of Isabel's parents, Edwin and Lula Baley, four miles west of Clarendon. It began at 8:30 a.m., while it was cool. S.A.'s stepfather, the Rev. J.W. Story, performed the ceremony with fewer than 10 guests in attendance. "We didn't have a very elaborate wedding, but it stuck," S.A. said.

The dress came from the Marizon store in Amarillo, and S.A. had his black suit tailored at Horace Brooks' drygoods store in McLean.

Six decades later, the couple still shares knowing glances when they go to a wedding and the ceremony reaches a certain point.

"We were excited, and Mr. Story knew it," Isabel said. "So he told us, 'Just listen for " . . .shall live," and when I say, " . . .shall live," then you say, "I will." And ever since, we've listened for 'shall live."

The couple took a 1929 Chevrolet to New Mexico to begin their three-day honeymoon. They spent nights in Clovis and Roswell before watching their first Shirley Temple movie in Lubbock the last night.

After living with relatives that summer, they moved into a house next to the
