The Groom basketball season is off and running. The Varsity and Junior Varsity teams have already played two games.

The season opener was against Memphis. The Junior Varsity girls ran neck and neck with the Cyclones throughout the game, losing by only one point, 25-24.

The Junior Varsity Boys played a tough game against Memphis.

The Varsity girls won



High Winds Cause One Car Rollover, Burns Twenty Acres

called out Thursday afternoon to Highway 70, one mile north of I-40. A Pampa woman was injured when she apparently lost control of her car in strong

Officials say that the car left the highway after it was hit broadside by a gust of wind that was estimated at about 70 miles per hour. woman's The Chevrolet Caprice veered into the soft shoulder. She over corrected causing the car to roll over one time, coming to rest on it's wheels.

Carol Lynn Thompson, 44 of Pampa, was thrown from the vehicle. She was found by a passer-by lying on the road. The car caught fire and was completely destroyed.

Emergency and law enforcement officials were called out from Gray County, Groom and

With the extremely dry conditions and the high winds, rescue and fire departments were very concerned about the fire. The gustly winds blew flames from the car catching the surrounding prairie on fire. Luckly, where the car come to rest, the area was slightly protected from the bottom of the shallow canyon. About 20 acres of grassland were burned before the vollunteer firefighter from three counties could rest easy.

Many of the firefighters were reminded of the fire in the canyons near Claude last spring. Officals stated that it was just pure luck that kept the fire from spreading further.

Thompson was taken to an Amarillo hospital and was in satisfactory condition late Friday.





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Winter Driving Hazardous, Take Precautions To Be Safe

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Winter driving is more hazardous than most people realize. There are more hours of darkness, often less visibility, and sometimes freezing temperatures with

ice, sleet or snow. These vehicle to drive safely. are real challenges for ability to drive."

"Safe winter driving, when it's all said and done, is largely the application of common sense to some basic driving facts," Snider added. "Drivers must be able to see all around their

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Make sure all ice and snow drivers and test a person's is removed from all windows. Don't be a "peep hole" driver. Keep windows from fogging by using the defroster. If necessary, stop and knock ice or snow off wiper blades to keep the windshield clear."

Too much speed on slippery roads is the mistake that breeds the most trouble. Adjust your driving habits to match the weather and road conditions. Trips on icy roads are going to take longer. Face the facts, don't be in a hurry. If the road is covered with ice or snow, start your vehicle moving slowly and gently. When stopping, apply your brakes lightly and much earlier than usual. Make your turns slowly and smoothly.

Most loss of control comes in the form of skids. Skids don't just happen, they are caused by the driver in most cases. To recover from a skid, back off the accelerator, stay off the brakes and steer your vehicle in the direction you want to go.

It is obvious that winter driving can pose problems for even the most experienced drivers. But as stated above, if we take our time, take it easy, make smooth movements and adjust speed to match conditions, we all can have a

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

For instance, disabled veterans can receive apparel allowances if they use wheel chairs, artificial limbs or any prosthetic device that can wear or damage clothing and, if they have a spouse in need of care, they can receive an allowance to pay someone to provide that care.

Few knew that the Bureau of Veterans Affairs any requests for bids on supplies or labor that are mailed to any other suppliers.

Other benefits the consumer found that were little know are:

A veteran (or dependent) dependents or survivors of can receive up to \$837 (40% in advance) if he or she will assist the VA in a work-study program while in remarried after the death or . an educational program.

Federal agencies are required to establish affirmative action plans to facilitate employment and advancement of veterans with any degree of disability. In fact some job classifications must be filled by eligible vets.

Disabled veterans can obtain extra compensation of hundreds of dollars per month in addition to their 100% disability if they have certain specified disabilities.

"Even though Congress and the various state legislatures have provided for money and services to be given to veterans and their dependents," Mr. Berko states, "unless the people know they are eligible and apply they will not collect anything."


McLean 2nd Grade Students Create Extinct Dinosaur

site of his grandmother's oil well, the first in the county, and former Cabot manager Dudley Steele reviews a short history of the carbon black industry. Included in the industrial development are some intriguing night shots of Celanese.

McLean Water Tested, Results Good

Samples of tap water from the McLean water lines were rea ntly tested by an independent testing lab at the Teledyne-Water Pik The results Company. returned great news for the people of McLean. 


