About 2,500 people turned out to attend the Dedication and Blessing of The Cross of Our Lord Jesus Christ on Saturday.

A diverse group of people attended the event. Members of just about every Christian faith attended as well as a colorful group of "Bikers For Christ."

Reverend Bob Kaps opened the ceremonies by singing "Standing on Holy Ground". Kaps is a non-denominational preacher for the "Bikers For Christ".

Other musicians who performed were III Con Fe, 1st Impressions, Clay

Collins, T-Shaw and Paulette Jones.

The moving performances by Melanie Britten and her accompanist, Debbie Ollinger, of Groom, and Pampa performer Joe Martinez were especially meaningful to the crowd.

Nancy Koons handled the M.C. duties for the event.

Mayor Greg Lamb of Groom and Charles Emery of the Texas Knights of Columbus welcomed the visitors.

Bishop Leroy Matthiesen led the introductory rite.

Katrina Thomas, daughter of Steve Thomas, builder of the Cross, read passages from the book of Galatians in the Bible.

Father Ray Crosier, pastor of Immaculate Heart of Mary Church of Groom, gave the gospel reading and the homily.

Bishop Matthiesen offered the concluding prayer and blessing.

The highlight of the evening was the performance of Dana, a

performer in gospel music, who originally was from Ireland. The lighting of the Cross was special with Dana singing "We Are One Body" along with the crowd.

Plane Crash Claims Life Of OKC Man

Rescue units were called out Sunday night from Groom, White Deer and Panhandle around 7:45 p.m. when a report came in as to a plane crash.

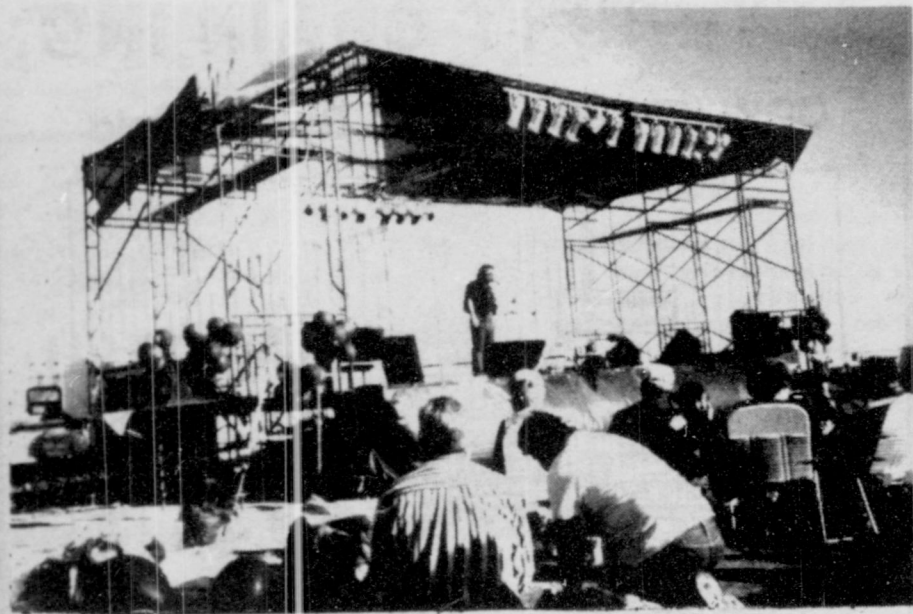
The crash was witnessed by travelers along I-40 as well as Jerry and Nadine Thornton of Groom, who were working in a field nearby. The plane went down in a maize field seven miles west of Groom, just north of I-40.

Reports at the scene by Sheriff Loren Brand said, "The wreckage was severe, burning both the plane and pilot, the only occupant in the plane, both being burned beyond recognition." "There was gasoline burning when we got there, but there is no indication of an explosion, there was no charring," Brand further explained.

Authorities identified the pilot as 47 year old, Howard Don Chumley of Oklahoma City. He was enroute from Amarillo to Guthrie, Oklahoma. The plane left Amarillo at 7:26 p.m.

Craig Howard, a local pilot and crop duster, told the Groom/McLean News that he speculated the pilot

DPS Report . . .

As The Interstate Turns

On Wednesday, September 13, Trooper Gary Davis investigated a three truck collision on I-40, seven miles west of Groom. All three trucks were traveling east on I-40 when the first truck slowed down due to construction. The second truck struck the first one in the rear. The third truck then swerved around the back right of the trailer of the second truck striking its trailer. No injuries were reported. The drivers of the second and third trucks were issued citations for following too closely. To describe this another way, they weren't paying attention, it looked like a train wreck with lettuce on the highway.

On Saturday, September 16, the Highway Patrol responded to a one vehicle roll over on County Road O, north of I-40. All three girls had minor injuries. The 1990 Ford Ranger was traveling north on County Road O when the driver attempted to brake and went into a skid on the dirt road. The driver over corrected causing the vehicle to roll 1 1/4 times. Citations were issued for unsafe speed and no seatbelt.

Earlier that evening a Shamrock resident was arrested on I-40, one mile east of Groom, for a parole violation. The man will be a new resident until he is extradited. The man grabbed four novels out of the library before going to his new fully furnished room. Do you think he's been through this before?

On Monday, September 18, two Amarillo males were arrested on US 60 at the Panhandle City Limits, for outstanding Amarillo Police Department warrants: no drivers license, no insurance, possession of drug paraphernalia and failing to identify. Both subjects were taken to the Carson County Sheriff's office where they pled guilty to all their charges. Sheriff Loren Brand and Panhandle Lt. Suzanne Pinkering assisted with the arrests. Both subjects are under further investigation for related gang activity. The moral of this story is don't drive without a license and don't lie to the police. They tend to ask a lot more questions and find more wrong when you do.

County Employees & Elected Officials Receive 3% Raise

Carson County's 1995-96 budget, including a three percent pay increase for all county employees and elected officials, was officially adopted by the commissioners in a special session held Monday, September 18, 1995.

The 1995 tax rate of .3433/\$100 valuation was also set during that session.

Both motions were made by Commissioner Jerry Strawn. Although the official minutes of the session failed to indicate whether or not the motions were unanimously approved, it was recorded that both motions carried.

Minutes of the September 11th regular commissioner meeting recorded that:

- Commissioner Howell informed the court that he was looking into acquiring a used pickup as a replacement. The court acknowledged his request.

- Judge Roselius asked commissioners to make note of any county road signs that need to be replaced in their precincts. Replacement signs would be provided.

- Judge Roselius informed the court that Carson County has been declared eligible for S.B.A. low interest loans. This is because Carson County is a contiguous county to Gray County which suffered damage due to high winds and a tornado on June 8, 1995. Interested individuals can contact the County Judge's office for further information.

- The county received notification that High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 has filed an application for planning grant assistance with the Texas Water Development Board.

- A letter of thanks from Greg Lamb, Mayor of Groom, concerning the loan of an ambulance from Pantex to the city was read to the court.

Jay Lamb, former president, and head of the new ambulance fund committee, stated that the new Type 7 Moduvan Ambulance has been ordered from Wilcoach Company.

"We purchased will purchase a 1996 model. We also will have to buy a new gurney. It is required but was not included," said Lamb.

The Ambulance Department had also

applied to T.D.H. for an ambulance. This grant application has been amended to change it to be used for supplies and equipment. Should it be approved the department would most likely purchase a defibrillator and radios.

February 1st is the target for the new ambulance to arrive.

The department has also acquired jumpsuits for each Ambulance Department volunteer to wear when

making emergency runs. The suits have reflective tape on them for safety and are monogrammed with each person's name.

Jay Lamb, Charlotte Whalley and Brent Stephens, also, attended a Trama Symposium last weekend in Amarillo, in the continuing effort to bring the very best in emergency

care to the residents of Groom.

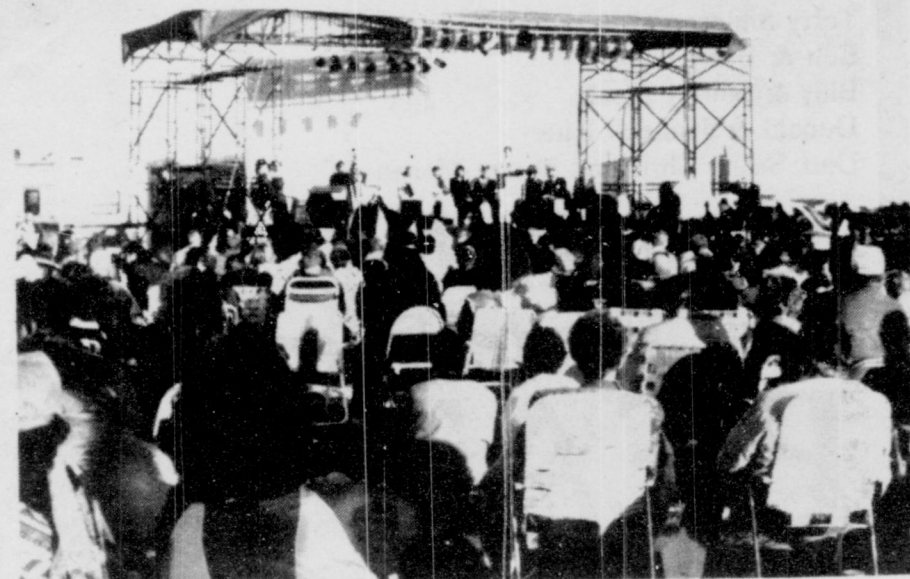

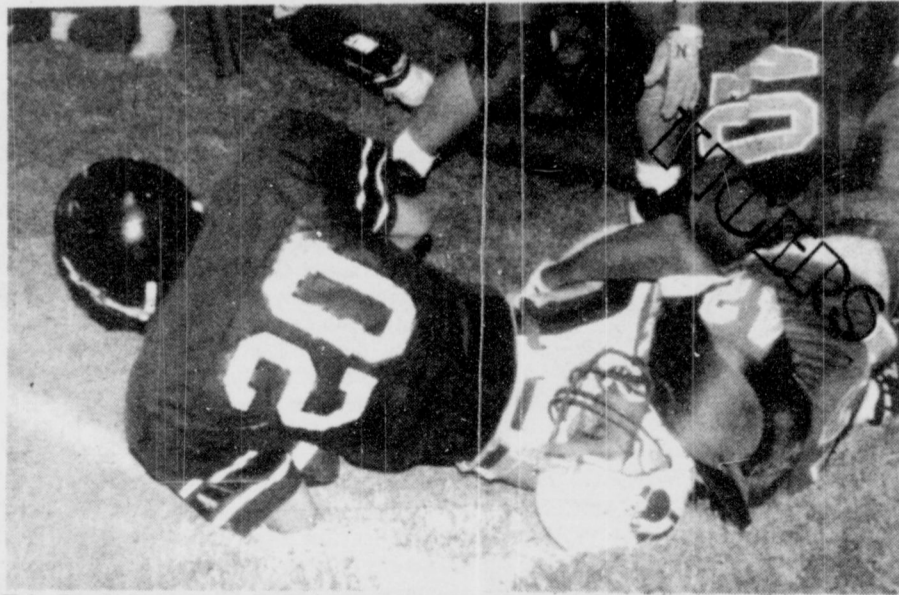

Nadine and Jerry Thornton witnessed the crash saying they heard the loud revving of the engine just prior to the crash as

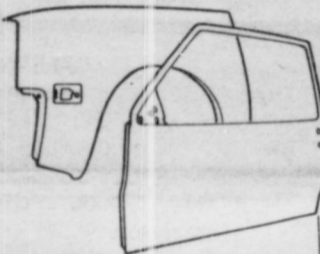
Howard explained earlier and then saw the burst of flames.

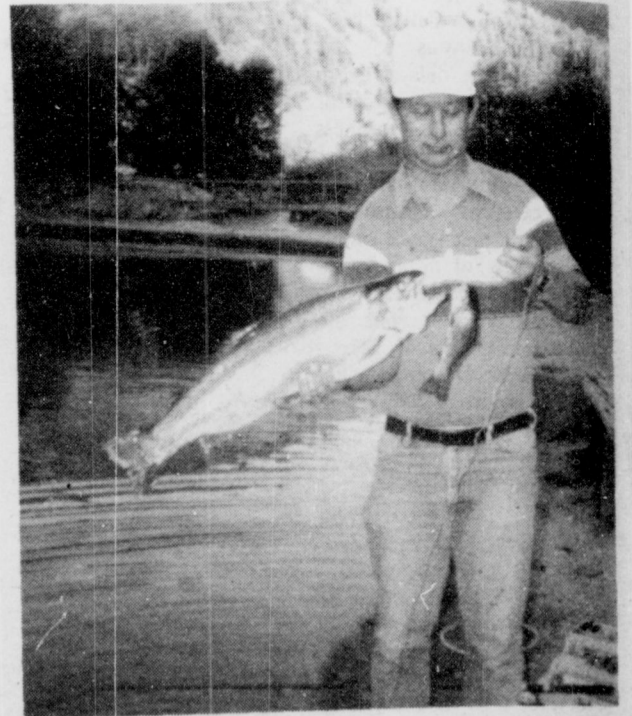
exploded.

"See You At The Pole" started right here in Texas a few years ago, and has since become a nation wide event.

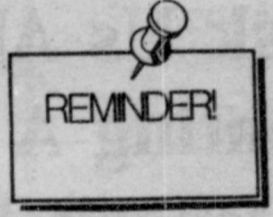
Tigers Lose to Owls, Miami Up Next

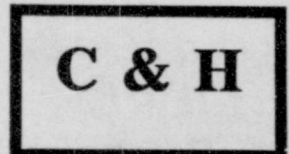

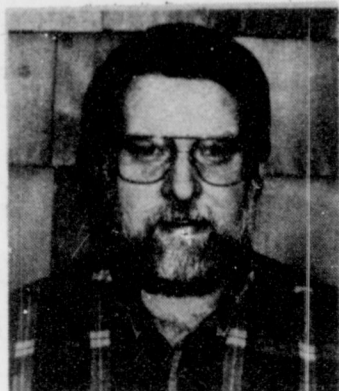

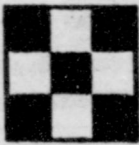
