We were able to complete these two projects with the help of federal grants. Carson County has one of the lowest tax rates of any county in the State of Texas. In the seven years I have been commissioner, our tax rate has stayed virtually the same. It has always been my goal to keep our tax rate as low as possible so that it will not be a burden to the taxpayers of this county.



We are currently housing ten prisoners in the Carson County Jail. Eight of those prisoners are being held for felony offenses.

Deputy Jeff Oldham secured not only the arrest of a burglary suspect, but a written confession which implicates an accomplice in a rural burglary investigation. Warrants have been issued for the second party and we anticipate that both subjects will be in our jail within the week.

Deputy Larry Mendez took custody of property stolen from a Carion County business and is pursuing information which we believe will lead to the arrest of the thief. Deputy Mendez is comparing information on this crime with similar burglaries we've had in our county to see if we can locate other stolen property.

Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard and Skellytown City Marshal John Corley were called to investigate a report of domestic violence in Skellytown.

The Sheriff's Office is also investigating the actions of a New Mexico man who believed to have fraudulently taken money from a church youth group. A warrant has been issued for the subject's arrest and we will bring the subject to Carson County after he's taken into custody by New Mexico authorities.

Origins Of **Holiday Customs**

Why do we send cards at Christmas time or put up a tree? There are many traditions we take for granted during the holiday season, and it is interesting to learn how some of them originated.

The ancient Druids can be thanked for the custom of hanging mistletoe at Christmas. In the rituals of the Druids, mistletoe was cut down with a golden sickle in November. The mistletoe would be divided up among the people, who took the plant home to hang over their doors. The Druids believed that the plant could work miracles of healing, protect against witchcraft, and make the land fertile. The origin of the custom of kissing under the mis letoe is not known, but it may have been inspired by the plant's supposed powers of fertility.

The Germans originated the custom of placing a tree in the home at Christmas time. There are several legends to explain the custom. One credits St. Boniface, a missionary to Germany during the 8th century. According to the legend, one Christmas Eve the saint chopped down a sacred oak which had been used as a site for human sacrifices. As the oak fell, a fir tree miraculously appeared in its place. Another legend says that on the night Christ was born, all the trees in the forest bloomed and bore fruit, even though it was the middle of winter.

Martin Luther, a German, is thought to have first decorated the Christmas tree. The story goes that Luther, walking under the stars one night, was inspired to bring home an uprooted fir tree and place candles on its branches as a reminder of the heavens.

The custom of sending Christmas cards probably

originated with an Englishman, Sir Henry Cole, who commissioned John Horsely to design a card in 1843. The card featured a family celebrating the season, with two smaller motifs depicting charitable acts; "Clothing the Naked" and "Feeding the Hungry." The card was lithographed and sold in 1846, and thus the Christmas card was born.

Whether originating in legend or real life, the customs of Christmas enrich the season for us all.

Of all the preparations for Christmas, probably one of the most delightful is the trimming of the tree.


How did this charming custom begin? Some suggest that the tradition dates back to pre-Christian beliefs in the magical powers of evergreens. The ancient Romans, for instance, decorated their homes with greenery for the festival of Saturn, or Saturnalia. This important feast was celebrated during December.

The association of trees

Christmas became defined during the Middle Ages, when miracle plays were performed, often in church, to teach stories from the Bible.

In the miracles plays, an evergreen tree was used to depict the Garden of Eden. with apples hung from the boughs to symbolize the forbidden fruit eaten by Adam and Eve.



cakes and sugar cookies, or making maple sugar candy. Sister would be helping mother in the kitchen, while Brother kept the wood box filled with wood.

Dad would go into the woods and chop down the Christmas tree, bringing it home triumphantly on a sled. The tree was placed in the parlor, with real candles decorating it, as well as strings of popcorn and cranberries that had been strung by the children. Popcorn balls wrapped in tinfoil and paper cones filled with homemade candy also decorated the tree.

The Christmas season actually began much earlier in the old days, for most gifts were handmade and so had to be worked on months in advance. The boys often made wooden objects, while the girls might embroider handkerchiefs or aprons. Mother, of course, kept her needles busy as she knit or crocheted garments for the whole family. Dad would whittle whistles or animals, or make a hobby horse or wooden doll.

On Christmas Eve, at the old country church, the tree was the biggest you'd ever seen, ablaze with candles.

Nearby someone held a tenfoot pole that had a wet sponge tied on the end, should a fire start.

The bells would ring out

over the countryside bringing families in their sleighs or bobsleds, eager to worship the new-born King, What a delightful, jingling sound the bells on the horses would made, as they trotted through the snowy countryside. the bobsled or sleigh would be filled with hay, and the youngsters would snuggle under lap robes and gaze at the stars above, or hop on one of the heavy runners for an exciting ride.

A Christmas play would be performed at the church by the children, and afterwards Santa make an appearance, rewarding the youngsters with goodies.

After hanging their stocking over the fireplace on Christmas Eve, the children would go to bed, happy with anticipation. They slept in big, fluffy beds, with feather ticks and feather comforters. If it was an especially cold night, Mother would wrap a hot iron in flannel to warm their

On Christmas morning, the youngsters would dash downstairs to find their stocking filled with nuts, apples, peppermint canes, hard ribbon candy, tin horns and a real orange in the toe of each stocking!
