Carson County Commissioners Postpone Purchase Of New Law Enforcement Cars

Dave Nicholson met with Carson County commissioners Monday, morning, November 13, and asked for maintenance work on County Road T in order to channel water away from his home. Precinct 4 Commissioner Kevin Flowell acknowledged that he was aware of the situation and would respond as soon as The Court also advised Mr. Nicholson that the Soil Conservation Service might be of assistance to him.

Pending a request, with drawings, tentative approval was given for boring County Road 17-2600 in Precinct 4 to install a sewer line connecting the White Deer sewer system. The request was made by Rodney Miller of White Deer.

The intent to purchase two new law enforcement vehicles has been postponed to a later date, according to Judge Roselius. "Cost and availability are the questions at the present time," he said.

Commissioners passed an order concerning licensing of exempt county vehicles. The order is in reference to Article 670 M-1 and Article 670 M-2, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes.

County Tax Collector Roslyn Watson was granted permission to relocate the tab substation in Groom from Howard Britten's location to the Groom City offices. The move will take place immediately.

Appointment of Frank Simms to another term on the Carson County Appraisal District Board was approved.

Tracy Lowrey, Extension Agent-Home Economics, submitted a written report

to the court pointing out various community service projects that have been carried out by the Carson County 4-H members.

Commissioners also canvassed the November 7th Constitutional Amendment Election returns.

Carson County Agrees With the Rest Of Texas On Vote

Carson County voters went with the state in deciding the outcome of all but one of the 14 amendments in the recent vote.

On Proposition 1, Education Bonds, 335 Carson County voters voted in favor of the amendment while 203 voted against it.

Proposition 2, the Lodge Tax amendment, was defeated locally with 300 votes against and 237 for the proposal.

Proposition 3, the Ag Bonds amendment, passed statewide. Locally, 321 votes were cast for the amendment and 210 against.

Proposition 4, the Home Equity amendment, also passed. Locally 296 voters voted against the amendment and 224 voted for it.

Proposition 5, the Veterans Loans amendment passed with 307 county votes cast for the amendment and 222 votes against it.

Proposition 6, the Senior T a x a m e n d m e n t, overwhelmingly passed on election day. In Carson County, 441 votes were cast for the amendment and only 97 against the proposal.

Proposition 7, the SSC Bonds amendment, won approval both locally and statewide with county voters voting 391 to 139 for the amendment.



Proposition 12, Minerals Tax amendment, also won approval with 357 votes cast for the amendment and 169 against it.

Proposition 13, the Boat

Tax amendment, was defeated statewide. In Carson County, 377 negative votes were cast compared to 141 in favor of the amendment.

The final proposal, Proposition 14, the Veteran's Tax amendment, won approval with 366 in favor and 166 against the amendment.



Letter To The Editor

Skinner Trial Costs Extra \$250,000 In Fort Worth

Dear Editor:

I secured an itemized copy of the expenses for the change of venue for the Skinner trial. If you want to ruin your day, get one and see how our District Judge Sims spent Gray County's money.

This trial cost about \$250,000 MORE in Fort Worth than here in Gray County. To put this in perspective, Gray County has about 125 employees. You could give each one a raise of \$2,000 per year. The golf course, which residents use cost county has used all of the excess Highland General

Hospital Fund and the Commissioners had to raise taxes just to pay for ONE TRIAL which was, for all practical purposes, an open and shut case.

We paid two lawyers for the defense, at a total of \$152,949.76. At \$150.00 per hour, that's 1019 hours, which equals 20 hours per week for a year. Most of this expense was incurred over eleven months. Another \$5,324 was also

paid for legal expenses.

There was also \$18,000. paid up front to the lawyers and was charged off as present, I understand a full accounting of this money

has not been turned in to the county.

Hotel expenses amounted to over \$42,532. There was also a check to Judge Sims for \$1,406.00 for special expenses. This is just a sample of the miscellaneous expenses, which totaled \$14,948.15.

There are some other interesting things about the expenses. The 31st Judicial District pays a court stenographer \$40,000 plus, in salary to keep court records. He can also bill the county for work done. This came to \$28,436.00 for this one trial. Also, the District Judge appoints the





You had worked for weeks crocheting an afghan for a very special gift and cover them all. Can you


certain off-color yarn to finish? Or the bobbin ran out of thread on the last inch of the seam of the new dress you were planning to wear that night?

You live twelve miles from town, the dry ingredients of the cake you are making are already mixed, you reach for the last cup of buttermilk you saw in the refrigerator a few



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



county auditor who audits all these expenses. This is a state law. It looks like a conflict of interest to me, since the judge can fail to reappoint an auditor who questions his expenses.

I would like to remind

the counties of Wheeler, Hemphill, Roberts and Lipscomb, that you might be just a murder away from the same thing happening to you. Another reason, besides money, that keeps lawyers from running against an incumbent, is fear. If he

can't beat him, then he would have to practice law in his court and may fear a backlash.

I would challenge any county or individual that's had a bad experience with Judge Sims, to make it known. Maybe we can have

a recall election or, at least, get another lawyer interested in trying to beat him in the next election.

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
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
