Commissioners Approve Budget For Gray County

Gray County commissioners approved Monday a \$1,040,195.97 budget for 1968, which includes a tax cut of three cents per \$100 valuation.

This is a \$14,269.76 cut from last year. The drop was due to retirement of some hospital bonds in the 1967 budget.

The tax rate was decreased from \$1.28 to \$1.25.

The new budget includes a fund for air conditioning the county and district court rooms and major repairs throughout the court house.

Salary increases were approved for all salaried county employees not elected or appointed, justices of the peace in precincts 1 and 5, and a \$4 a month raise for each of Gray County's constables.

Justices of the peace in precincts 1 and 5 will have their salaries upped to what the other JP's are currently earning, \$5,011.20 yearly.

Also approved was a \$1,600 yearly raise for the district attorney.

Six men were appointed to two-year terms on the airport board, subject to their approval. They are Tod Simmons, George Cree Jr., Hershel Willis, Paul Bowers, C. H. Youngblood and Ray Chastain.

Road and bridge funds for 1968 were set at \$447,561.78. Permanent improvement funds 1968 were set at \$110,000, and aid jury funds will remain at \$5,000. There will be no funds for interest and sinking in the 1968 budget.

First Aid Course To Be in Pampa

Residents of McLean have been invited to participate in a five lesson American Red Cross first aid course being offered in Pampa at Pampa Junior High School from 7 to 9 p.m. next month.

Each lesson will be offered five consecutive nights with persons required to attend one session each week for four different weeks to receive a Parent Teachers Certificate and one lesson each of the five weeks to receive an American Red Cross first aid certificate.

The project is jointly sponsored by the Pampa Parent-Teacher Association of Pampa and the American Red Cross.

Dates and subjects are: Oct. 24, wounds, infections, bandaging; Oct. 25, shock, artificial respiration; Oct. 26-27, poisoning, fractures, dislocations, board splinting; Oct. 28-29, thermal burns, heat exhaustion, common emergencies; and Oct. 30-Nov. 3, transportation of the injured, standard first aid theory and review of skills.

Young People Are Hurt in Wreck

Again Thacker Haynes with the aid of good blocking by McCarty, ran for another 60 yard drive. McCarty then ran for the two extra points. McLean over the Pirates, 24-6.

The fourth quarter was a repeat of the third. McCarty hit Mike Darsey with a 22 yard pass and Mike took it across the goal line. The try for two extra points failed, leaving the score 30 to 6.

The Pirates, still scrapping, gained six points when Fullback Gary Smith ran for the touchdown and achieved it with 1:03 remaining in the game. Again they failed to get the extra points. The score was now 30-12, leaving the Pirates out in the cold.

Time ran out for the two teams, leaving the Tigers jubilant. They had scored their first victory after having suffered two defeats.

The Tigers will travel to White Deer Friday night for a non-conference game with the White Deer Bucks.

The state FFA president, Danny Burns, visited the McLean chapter on Tuesday, Sept. 27, from 8:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

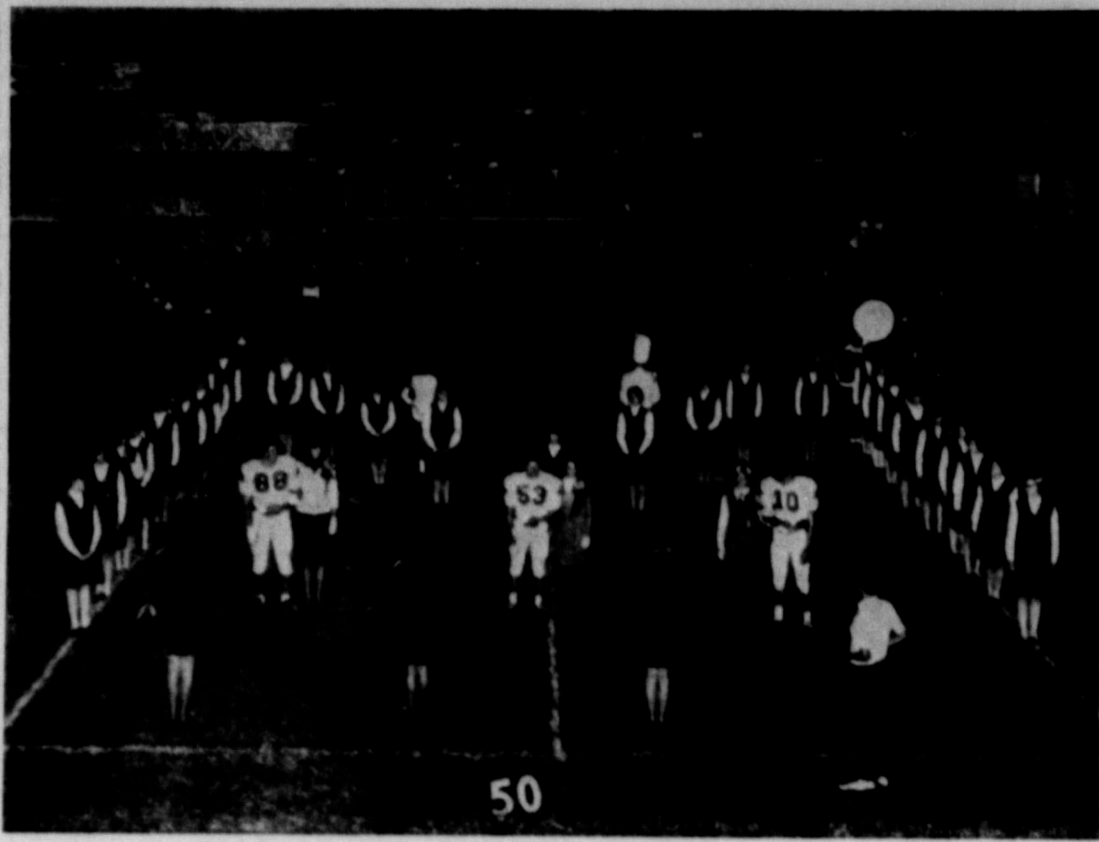
He talked to the boys in Agriculture 1, 2 and 3, and in FFA and told them about himself in order to let them know about him and see what kind of person he is.

Veterans in School Due GI Increase

Veterans now in school will soon receive automatic increases in their GI Bill education checks, Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration regional office in Waco, has announced.

The new amounts will be included in checks scheduled to arrive in November, the new rates becoming effective Oct. 1.

The rate increases were provided in Public Law 90-77 signed last month by the President. Single veterans taking full-time courses have been increased from \$100 to \$130, veterans with one dependent from \$125 to \$155, and veterans with two dependents from \$150 to \$175. An additional \$10 will be provided monthly for each dependent in excess of two.

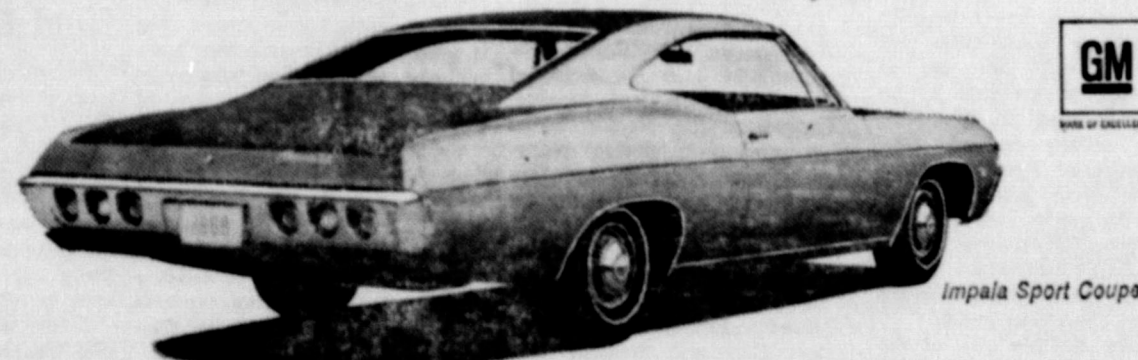

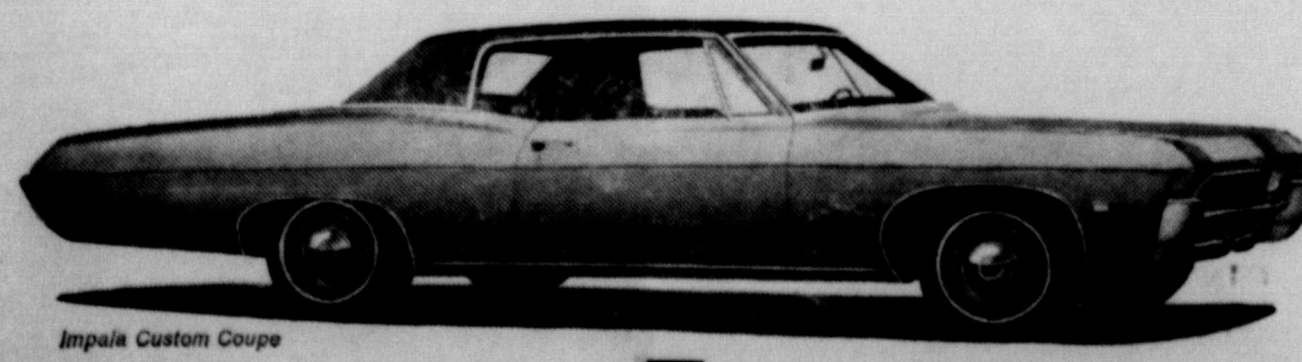

AFTER-SCHOOL SNACKS

They burst into the house, the hungry horde, and head straight for the refrigerator, or they yell at Mom:
"We're starved!"
"What's for snacks?"
"Can Johnny and I have a sandwich?"
What's a mother to do?
Do they really need snacks?
Is eating between meals good for them?
What can I give them besides sweets?
Will it spoil their appetite for supper?
Relax, Mom. It can't be as bad as all that. There are answers to your questions that will set your mind at rest and please the kids too.

Many Children Need Snacks
The after-school snack need not be a problem, because many, if not most, children do need the afternoon snack. Active children use up a lot of energy. Their small stomachs are not able to handle large quantities of food at one time. Between-meal snacks, if well chosen, provide the carry-over energy which may help to bring them to the evening meal less fatigued, and not too hungry to eat. The old idea that all eating-between-meals is necessarily poor practice has been greatly modified.
The after-school snack will not necessarily spoil the appetite for

the evening meal. The child should not have food during the last 90 minutes to two hours before the evening meal. If he gets his snack right after school, he is less likely to indulge in food or soft drinks just before mealtime.

Have Good Food Hardy
The after-school snack can and should be more than a sweet and a soft drink. In their place, these are harmless; in excess, they can crowd out more essential nutrients. The canny — I almost said sneaky — mother will tempt her children to eat what they should by having good and active snack materials handier than any other kind. She may even go so far as to have something like sandwiches ready; or ice cream or chocolate milk or a milk shake. In the sandwiches, thin slices of meat or cheese, peanut butter and jelly or peanut butter and cream cheese are popular with many children. Dry-roasted nuts are good too. As far as possible, children's known preferences should be respected; this saves a lot of nagging.

Shall Johnny Nextdoor come along with your Jimmy? Why not. Snacks in company are more fun than eating alone, and tomorrow they may both be snacking over at Johnny's. This helps mother, too, in knowing where the kids are and what they are up to.

The museum will be open Friday, Saturday and Sunday from 1:30 to 5:30 p.m. each weekend, and by appointment for a group wishing to visit it.

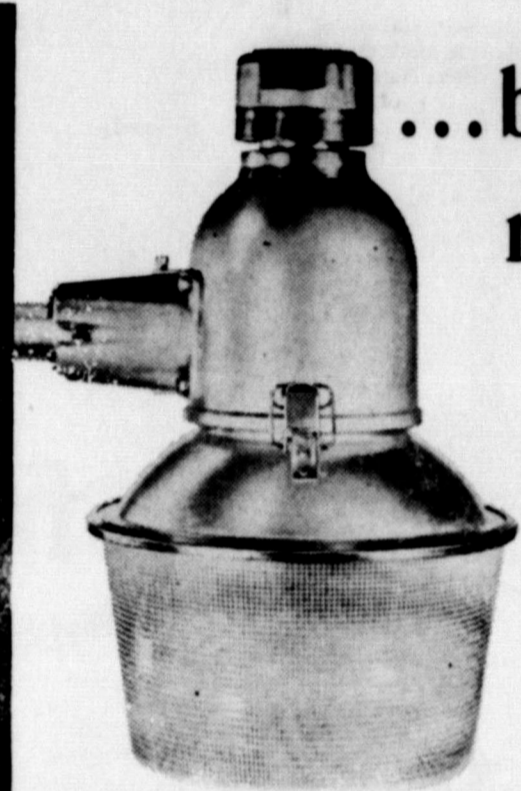

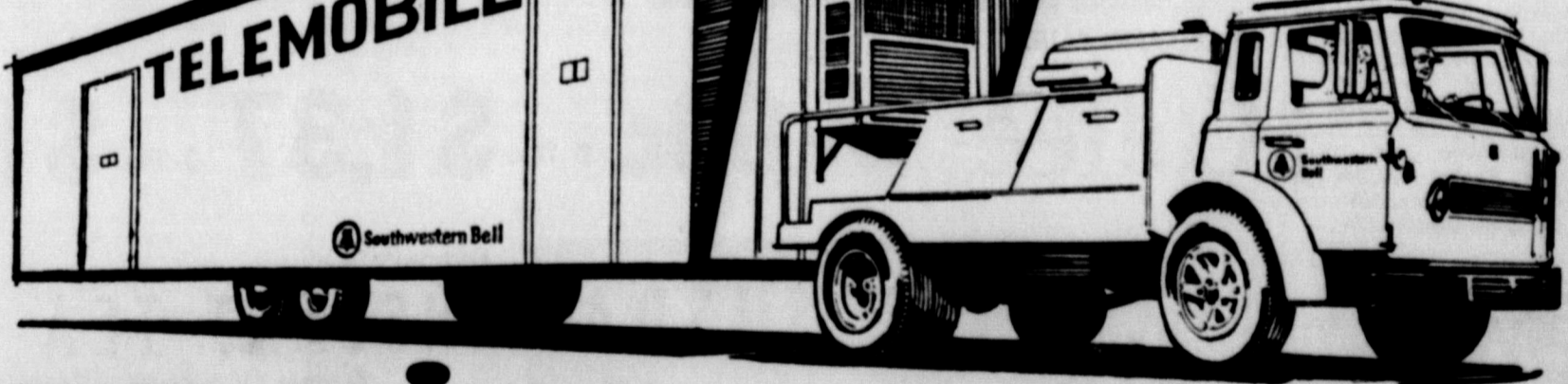

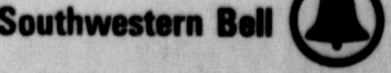
