County Election For Improvements Is Proposed

Gray County Judge S. R. Lenning Jr. and Bill Robertson, Highland General Hospital administrator, outlined plans last week for a \$1,100,000 bond election porposal to be presented to county commissioners for approval on Oct. 1.

Judge Lenning said \$850,000 will be asked for needed improvements at the hospital and \$250,000 for improvements at Perry Lefors airfield.

Improvements at the hospital would include a new service and emergency entrance and exit, a new cafeteria, central supply for the north wing, X-ray equipment, air conditioning of the old wing and over-all general improvements of existing facilities.

Burns informed the boys that there are 50,000 members in FFA in Texas and 450,000 members in the United States.


