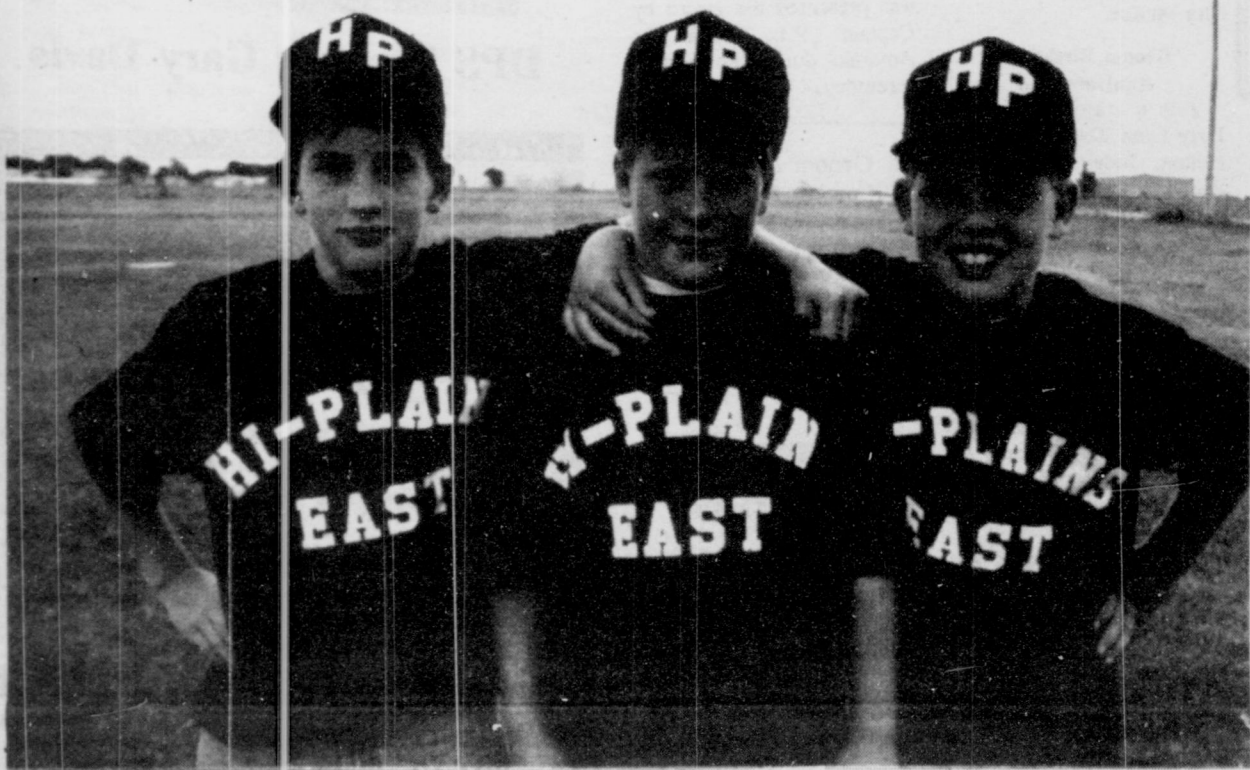

## Attebury Buys Wheeler Evans

Groom area farmers and residents were shocked last week to learn that effective July 1, 1995, one of Groom's 46 year old companies had been sold. Wheeler Evans Elevators has been sold to Attebury Grain Company. The acquisition includes elevators owned by Wheeler Evans in White Deer, Kingsmill, Pampa and the Corners. Owner Owen Laugherty of White Deer plans to go into the financial planning business in Pampa. Built in 1948, the elevators have marked the Groom skyline for 46 years. Ronny Fields had the distinction of hauling the last load of wheat accepted by the elevators. Of the six employees from Groom, two were

offered employment by the new owners. While Groom will miss Wheeler Evans, they celebrate the prosperity and growth of the Attebury Grain Company, which is rapidly becoming a giant in the industry. Bob Byrd, area manager, stated that they plan to use the Wheeler Evans facilities as needed throughout the peak seasons. "We are simply consolidating the facilities," stated Byrd. "Attebury has purchased all the grain contracts and storage liability from Wheeler Evans" "We welcome new customers, and invite them to come on by and get acquainted. We hope to have the chance to serve you in the future."

# Sheriff's Department Works 3 Fatal Accidents

The Sheriff's Department was called early Wednesday morning to assist in the search for a missing Carson County couple who were last seen flying their ultralight airplane Tuesday evening. Officers from Carson County, Hutchinson County, Potter County and Moore County took part in the search. The wife of the pilot telephoned for help after walking from the wreckage of the aircraft and she was able to guide the rescuers to her husband's location. The plane was located in Potter County in the vicinity of the Canadian River Bridge. Initiation of the Carson County search was made by Chief Deputy Lovell Kennard.

Sheriff's deputies are investigating an assault involving teenage suspects in White Deer. A handgun was taken from one suspect and the matter has been referred to juvenile authorities.

Statements taken by Deputy Larry Mendez lead to the filing of burglary charges on a Panhandle resident for the burglary of a local business. We are continuing to investigate the matter to determine if other suspects were involved in the crime.

A Skellytown man was arrested after Carson County officers were contacted by authorities from Pratt, Kansas regarding a possible kidnapping. The subject

remains in the Carson County Jail charged with five counts of kidnapping. He is currently awaiting extradition back to Kansas.

A woman reported missing from Tyler, Texas was located in White Deer. Tyler authorities were originally concerned that her disappearance was suspicious, but later determined that she had left the area voluntarily.

In Groom, a vehicle which had been previously reported as missing was located and the owner found to be safe. Our initial call on this matter indicated that this disappearance, too, might have been suspicious.

Sgt. Ray Davis assisted Potter County authorities at the scene of a double fatality accident at the intersection of FM 1912 and U.S. 60. The driver of the vehicle had failed to stop for the railroad crossing arms and his vehicle was struck by a train. The impact of the collision started the cab of the truck on fire and the driver and passenger died as a result of the accident.

The Texas Highway Patrol and Carson County Sheriff's Department were called to investigate a vehicle in which the occupants had reportedly pointed a firearm at another vehicle while traveling on Interstate 40. The suspect vehicle was located near the west side of the county and

a pistol was found in the trunk. Further investigation into the matter showed that the suspects had pulled off the road and attempted to hide the weapon after seeing the complainant drive to a business to call for help.

Our deputies and the Texas Highway Patrol were called to Conway to assist in the landing of the Medivac I helicopter for a possible heart attack victim. The Panhandle ambulance was the EMS responder. The patient was transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

County and THP officers were called to Conway to check on a suspicious person who was pounding on business windows and making obscene comments and gestures to patrons and workers at the business. Trooper Chris Ray located the suspects vehicle near Groom and had to pursue the suspect into Gray County before taking him into custody. The suspect appeared to be under the influence of controlled substances.

While enroute to back up Trooper Ray, Deputy Larry Mendez was the first officer

on the scene of a fatal car versus pedestrian accident on Interstate 40. Witness statements to officers indicate that the pedestrian had been a passenger in a semi-tractor trailer rig and had gotten into an argument with his companions. He apparently demanded to be let out of the vehicle and then was hit by another vehicle while he was standing on the highway. The victim was transported to Conway by the Groom ambulance and then was airlifted to Northwest Texas Hospital by Medivac I. The victim, a resident of Canada, underwent emergency surgery, but later died at the hospital. The accident was investigated by Trooper Gary Davis of Groom.

The Sheriff's Department assisted the Skellytown Ambulance Service with an elderly male who was thought to have medical problems. The man was placed in the custody of family members to secure further medical care.

Our department recovered a citizen's band radio and a radar detector

which we believe were stolen from Panhandle. The items don't match any reports on file with the Panhandle Police Department. If you have had a theft of a CB radio or radar detector please advise our department of the type and model (if known) of your missing property. We want to return the items to the rightful owner. Also recovered was a quantity of marijuana. Anyone wishing to claim ownership of the substance is asked to describe the container and the amount contained. You will not be able to recover your property, but we would like to talk to you.

Sheriff's deputies were called to a motel in Conway Friday night to calm a disturbance between the motel management and a customer. The customer was demanding a refund and the motel management refused to return the money.

Eleven persons are currently incarcerated in the Carson County Jail.

## County Commissioners Approve Salary For Jailer Dispatcher

Carson County Commissioner's, in regular session Monday, June 26th, approved a \$13,500 annual salary for Neal Sandlin, jailer/dispatcher for Carson County.

In other action, the Court granted approval to Norris Pest Control and Construction, Inc. to place a gas line under a county road in Precinct #3.

Discussion was held concerning the repair of county maintained hard surfaced roads. Judge Jay Roselius asked that each commissioner turn in written

specifications on the work that needed to be done, along with the amount (in feet). After this information has been completed, the project will be advertised for bid. If the bids are approved, the project will be carried out with the cost being paid out of the general fund.

Richard Edmondson, State Emergency Management Planner for the D.O.E., Pantex Plant met with the court. He discussed a possible Hazardous Materials workshop that could be

given to local responders. Wanda Hood, Emergency Management Coordinator, will obtain information about the workshop.

Regulations concerning Pit and Quarry Safety was discussed by the court. Commissioners were given information concerning the program and will take appropriate action as needed.

A Thank You card from the Carson County Square House Museum was read to the court, thanking the

county for a \$100 donation which helped with a reception. The reception was for an open house given for the Texas Association of Museum state meeting.

Judge Roselius gave an update on a Alert and Warning system for the D.O.E. Pantex Plant. The system is being considered by local, state and federal officials. This system concerns notification to the public in case of an accident at the D.O.E. Pantex facility which could possibly go "off site".

In final action, the court discussed setting up for the Fourth of July events which will be held on the courthouse grounds.

# As The Interstate Turns

On Wednesday, June 14th a Nixon, Texas man was arrested on I-40, five miles west of Groom for Burglary out of Nashville, IL and Forgery out of Guadalupe County, Texas. The man was transported to the Carson County Sheriff's Office where he was booked into jail awaiting extradition.

While looking in the subject, a retired US Air Force Captain drove the wrong way down I-40, four miles west of Groom, striking a truck tractor trailer in the eastbound lane. The man refused treatment and had been drinking. After having some rather interesting stories to tell the ambulance attendants, he was cited for Driving the Wrong Way on a Divided Highway.

On Monday, June 19th a man was arrested for outstanding DPS tickets on I-40 at Conway. He was transported to the Carson County Sheriff's Office until he could pay his fines.

On Tuesday, June 20th an Illinois man was arrested for Possession of Marijuana, less than two ounces, on I-40 five miles west of Groom. The man was released after posting a \$400.00 cash bond. That marijuana sure does get

expensive.

On June 21st three White Deer residents were arrested for theft by check warrants by Trooper Gary Davis. The husband and wife were booked into the Carson County Jail until they could post bond. The third individual heard we were looking for her and turned herself in. She was released upon paying the fine out of Gray County. Later that evening a White Deer juvenile was arrested on US 60 for DWI. The subjects parents and juvenile probation were contacted. I don't know about you but I'd rather go to jail than let my dad get woke up to come get me at the Sheriff's Office.

On Monday, June 26th, an unidentified truck tractor trailer pulled out of the J&N Fuel Stop parking lot striking the legally parked ABF Freight Systems truck tractor. No injuries were reported. The damage indicates it was struck by a white full size box trailer and the driver may not have realized he had hit anything. Anyone with any information should contact the highway patrol. No, there is no reward for any information. Nineteen hours later a Tennessee bull hauler was swept up in the high winds and struck the

overpass guardrail above FM295 on I-40. No injuries were reported. One citation was issued for no seatbelt. The interstate traffic was diverted for two hours as the wrecker crews and Department of Transportation had to cut away the guardrail which was imbedded in the trailer.

On Thursday, June 29th, a Ft. Davis, Texas man was arrested for \$245.00 of unpaid DPS warrants out of Abilene. The man was transported to the Carson County Sheriff's Office where his wife mysteriously came up with the money to get him out of jail. Later that afternoon a Lubbock horseshoer was delayed when he was arrested for unpaid DPS tickets out of Eastland County. The man was back on I-40 after he paid \$266.00 in fines.

Later that evening a 38 year old Cambridge, Ontario, Canadian man was struck and killed while lying on I-40, by a Clovis, New Mexico man, 8 miles west of Groom. Trooper Davis stated that the Canadian was a passenger in a truck tractor when he became violent. The driver of the truck stopped on the shoulder of the road. The man jumped out of the truck and ran into the eastbound lanes of traffic on

I-40. He fell in the left lane when the Clovis man pulled over to pass the stopped truck striking him. The man was rushed to NWH by Groom 1 to Conway where he was transported to Medivac for the duration of the trip. The man was pronounced dead on Saturday at 2:02 pm from his injuries.

On Saturday, July 1st a Missouri youth was arrested for Minor in Possession of Alcoholic beverage along I-40 adjacent to Blackwell Supply. He was fined \$160.00 by Judge Bill Hinson.

On Sunday, July 2nd, Trooper Davis investigated a one vehicle accident on FM 295, 2 miles north of Groom, involving a '93 Toyota Celica driven by a Pampa man. The 24 year old male reported no injuries. He was cited for failure to report accident and speeding, after using a little trigonometry to calculate his speed. Not bad for a Clarendon graduate.

Have a great week and drive careful out there. Remember Big Brother is watching.

E.M. Bailey, former owner of The McLean News, who was injured in the June 2 tornado at Friona, has been transferred to a Dallas rehabilitation institute.

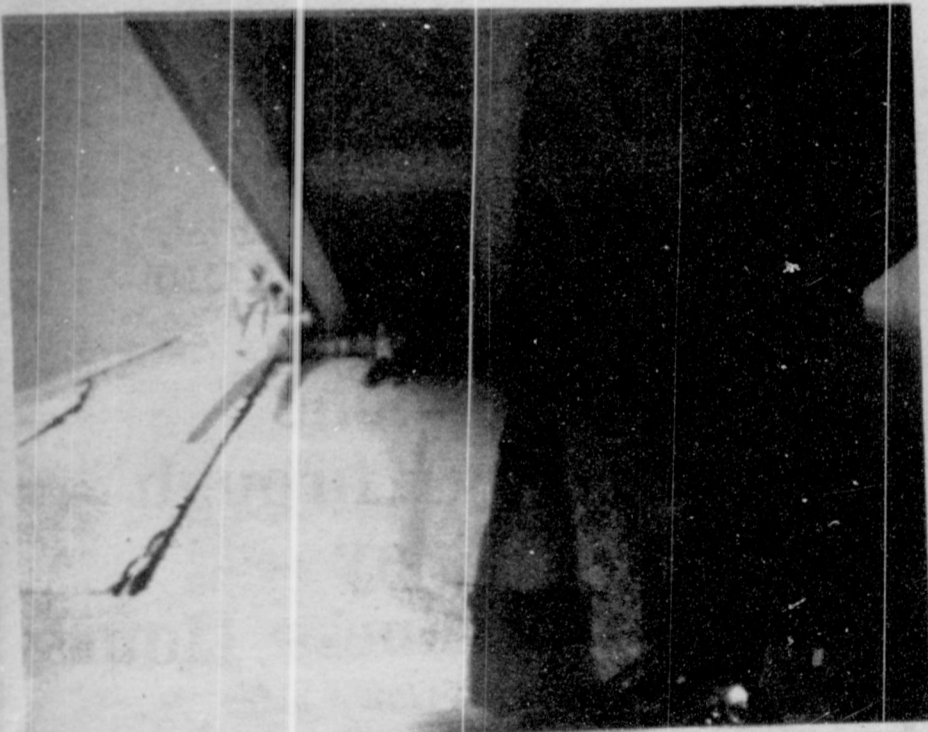

## Trew Tests Wind Towers

Delbert Trew recently, after more than a year of negotiations, signed a contract with Zond, a California company. The new equipment on his ranch near Alanreed may lead to a harvest of a plentiful commodity in the Texas Panhandle - wind.

Trew, has five test towers on the Trew Ranch Wind Lease as of the end of May. "All we're doing now is testing," Trew said. "If they decide to keep the lease, they'll pay an annual rental rate for the rest of the 30-year contract."

The company paid a "signing bonus" to test wind speeds for three years. After that, if they continue to test or begin putting up turbines to produce energy, Zond will pay Trew an annual rental similar to an oil lease, he said.

While smaller utilities have shown little interest, Trew said many large utilities are taking wind seriously.

The company is measuring various wind-speed levels across the ranch, Trew said.

The towers placement, which is crucial in wind energy production, cost about \$3,500 each, he said. Wind shear, the difference

in wind speeds at different levels, can be extreme. Trew said a 5 mph wind can build to speeds of 15 mph when it comes up out of a canyon over a ridge.

Each tower is made from 6-inch galvanized, slip-jointed pipe, 130 feet tall. The tower base and anchor sites are fenced for protection from livestock.

Test equipment includes a wind-direction vane and an anemometer - an instrument for measuring wind force and speed - at the 130-foot level, and anemometers only at the 90-foot and 60-foot levels.

Trew said an anemometer at Jericho, west of Trew's ranch, recorded an average wind speed of 14 mph for the past year.

The large turbines used by Zond start turning when wind speeds hit about 8 mph; they begin producing electricity at 9 mph, Trew said. At 10 to 12 mph, he said, the turbines will produce at full capacity. They're designed to shut themselves off if wind speeds get too high.

The computer at the bottom of the tower records wind direction and wind speed at each level hourly, 24 hours a day.

A wind farm usually

consists of at least 80 machines in one location. Trew said his ranch could support as many as 150 of the turbines, each costing \$500,000 to install.

The advantages for the area as well as the rancher is it increases the tax base for the county and the taxes are the responsibility of the company.

"We're hoping as we go along to acquaint people with wind power," Trew said. "It's nonpolluting and nondepleting and totally renewable."

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to offer a new service called Prepaid Calling Card (PCC) Service. A PCC would offer the customer the ability to place local and long distance (intraLATA, interLATA and international) calls from any telephone without the use of coins, credit cards, conventional calling cards, or operator assistance. A PCC would have a pre-established value, paid for in advance, that would decrease in value as calls were completed. The rates for interLATA and international calls would be determined by the Interexchange Carrier that handles the call. First year revenues from PCC are estimated to be approximately \$11 million. SWBT proposes that this application become effective on August 7, 1995.

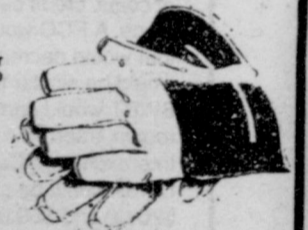

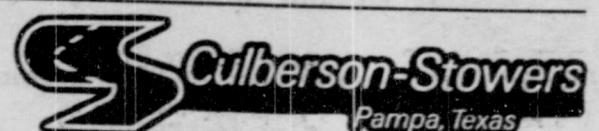
