## City Council Tables Water For Cross Reprimands Dog Catcher

In a regular meeting of the Groom City Council, the Mayor Pro-Tem called the meeting to order with the following members present: Mayor Pro-Tem, R.E. Cornett, Alderman Danny Ashford, Jr., Martin Hermesmeyer, Ronny Fields and Howard Britten. Absent was Mayor Greg Lamb.

Also attending the meeting were Jay Lamb, Steve Thomas, employees Debbie Anthony, Donnie Evans and Donna Burton. (All motions were voted unanimous unless otherwise noted).

Steve Thomas visited with the council in regards to getting City water to the Cross. They will be irrigating about 5 acres, using on the peak months about 15,000 gallons per day. There will be grass and lots of trees to water with an underground sprinkler system.

After much discussion, with Mr. Thomas the council informally agreed that the most economical solution would be by allowing Mr. Thomas to hook onto the city main, which is located near the north end of Bivens Street, with a meter and running his own 3 inch line. There by becoming an "out of city

limits" customer like several others water consumers. The landscaping will not even be started on until the Cross is put up.

Mr. Thomas stated that the city might want to consider developing the area near the Cross, anticipating businesses going up in the area in the next 5 years.

Howard Britten moved to table this so the city can come up with some cost figures.

Donna Burton, animal control officer, was asked why there were so many dogs running around town. She was also asked what was being done about it. Members of the council questioned her as to whether she was giving the job ample time. The council informally instructed Burton to issue tickets on all dogs found at large, and not to give any more warnings. The council felt that Burton should do this in an effort to assure that the law was being enforced equally, and without favor.

The Council was brought up to date on the ambulance. Judge Roselius has been in contact with Pantex (DOE). The ambulance will be ready for the city to pick up on June 7, 1995. The City will still have the option of turning

the ambulance back or keeping it. The city will be required to tag the vehicle and have insurance on it. And be responsible for any maintenance. After the city no longer needs the ambulance it will then go back to Pantex.

Jay Lamb showed the Council a copy of the grant proposal sent to the Meadows Foundation and a copy of the ambulance financial statement and reminded everyone of the Bar-B-Q fund raiser on

Sunday. TML is offering all City's a retiree supplement plan. Plan A & B will cover some charges after Medicare. The difference in the plans is that Plan B covers prescriptions after A \$250.00 deductible. There is not any cost to the city. The retiree is responsible

for the monthly premium. Danny Ashford moved to accept retiree insurance

Plan B. A resolution was adopted in support of actively pursuing expanded jet air service for the Panhandle, South Plains and Permian Basin of Texas and Eastern New Mexico areas.

A resolution was adopted recommending the leadership of the State of Texas support the streamlining and shortening of the State permitting

## ATTENTION DOG OWNERS

All dog owners in the Groom area are hereby notified that the City of Groom Animal Control Officer will begin a crack down of violations of the city animal control codes effective immediately. If your dog is running loose it will be picked up or a citation will be issued. This includes animals owned by residents who live outside the City of Groom, if their animal is at large in town.

No warnings will be issued! If you have a chronic problem with your dog getting out of your fence you should contact the animal control officer to explain what steps you are taking to keep the animal up.

A violation consists of any dog not restrained either by a fence or chain. This includes dogs who ride in the back of pick ups. These animals have a tendency to wander from the vehicle if it is parked for very long. These animals should be restrained either by a leash, or placed inside the vehicle. They should also have access to water. Animals who stay in their own yard but are unrestrained are also in violation and will be cited.

Penalties begin at \$25.00 and escalate at a rate of \$25.00 per offence. Also boarding fees and court costs will be charged. In other words, if your animal received his third ticket, you would be fined \$75.00 plus court costs.

These drastic measures are a direct result from people abusing warnings and their failure to act on those warnings. The City of Groom regrets the necessity of the crack down but is prepared to pursue these violations to the fullest extent of the law.

## As The Interstate Turns . . . .

On Monday, June 5th, an elderly White Deer woman backed into another White Deer woman on FM 294 in front of the Senior Citizens building. No injuries were reported. One citation was issued for backing without safety. Earlier that afternoon an Amarillo man was arrested for unpaid DPS tickets out of Potter County on I-40. The man was taken to the Carson County jail until he paid his fines.

On Tuesday, June 6th, an Amarillo man was arrested

on I-40 seven miles east of Amarillo for writing bad checks. He was transported to the Carson County Sheriff's office until he could post bond.

On Friday, June 9th, a man who's identity is still unknown was arrested for Failed to Identify and no Driver's License on I-40, five miles west of Groom. He was arraigned before Judge Tyler on Monday, June 12th.

On Sunday, June 11th DPS, the Gray County Sheriff's office and the Groom Ambulance Service investigated a one vehicle roll over involving an eight member family from Selma, AL. The female driver had fallen asleep at the wheel. Medivac 1 transported one patient while three were taken by Groom 1 and four more by the McLean Ambulance Service. I would like to take this time to commend the Groom Ambulance Service for taking care of eight patients half of which were children in an efficient manner leaving me free to direct traffic. I feel lucky to have them. After getting back from this accident a minor accident was reported at the intersection of Broadway and 3rd Street, involving two Groom residents. Minor injuries were reported. Citations were issued for Failed to Yield Right of Way at yield intersection and no seatbelts.

Remember your future Social Security benefits will be based on the earnings posted to your Social Security record, so be sure you use the correct number.

## WTAMU Team Impresses Corporate Executives

Clad in navy blue suits, starched shirts and one red suit, four West Texas A&M University students took the stage at the Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) International Exposition May 17-19 in Kansas City, Mo. The students endured a 25-minute oral presentation in front of 32 corporate executives serving as judges and a 5-minute question and answer session. After the competition, the scores were totaled, and the WTAMU group was named one of three Vavoline High Performance Award's Rookies of the Year.

"We teased Karen (a member of the WTAMU team) when she stepped out on stage, because she was the first student in hours of competition to wear

anything but navy," Jean Walker, WTAMU SIFE advisor and instructor of finance, said. "The team represented a phenomenal group of students who really impressed the corporate executives."

More than 500 students representing colleges and universities traveled to Kansas City for the competition. The teams were judged on the creativity of their educational programs, the documentation of results, their successes in using available resources, and the quality of their annual reports and oral presentations.

The WTAMU team won a place in the international competition after taking top-league honors and the

Rookie of the Year award at the regional SIFE competition April 12 in Memphis, Tenn.

At the Kansas City competition, the group received several favorable comments from judges encouraging them to continue the inaugural group.

"One of the judges wrote on the comment sheet, 'You've got an unbelievable thing going - don't let up. You definitely held your own with the best in the country,'" Karen Babcock, SIFE presenter and a senior business major from Groom, said. "There were so many experienced teams at the competition that we felt like that was a real compliment to us as a first-year team."

The WTAMU SIFE team presented programs throughout the year to community members, students and other educational groups including Texas Panhandle chapters of the Girl Scouts of America.

"All of our programs basically help others," Ramon Avilia, a junior accounting major from Happy, said. "With the Girl Scouts, we helped them gain their business-wise and money-sense badges."

John Marmaduke, president and chief executive officer of Hastings Books, Music and Video Inc., encouraged WTAMU to begin a SIFE team. Marmaduke has served as a judge at several previous SIFE competitions.

"People don't realize how difficult it is for a rookie team to compete against so many seasoned teams that have refined and enlarged their programs," Marmaduke said. "So, when the WTAMU SIFE team won the Memphis regionals, we were incredulous. We think the judges at the international competition were as impressed by the caliber of the SIFE team as by their presentation. They're an excellent group."

The other students who

served as presenters were Jason Markham, a senior management major from Monahans; Carrie Neal, a junior marketing major from League City; and David Terry, a WTAMU May graduate with a bachelor's degree in finance and economics from Canyon.

Other students who assisted with the presentation were Angie Lindmark, a junior psychology major from Amarillo; Jacy Martin, a junior management major from Amarillo; Leslie O'Donald, a sophomore accounting major from Canyon; Deann Stephenson, a senior general business major from Amarillo; Terri Thomas, a junior management major from Folcroft, Pa.; and Craig Waddell, a graduate student in interdisciplinary studies from Hereford.

## Carson Co. Sheriff's Report

The Carson County Sheriff's Department is currently holding six prisoners in the county jail.

One fugitive waived extradition and was taken back to Colorado earlier in the week to face felony charges there.

A New Mexico man was arrested by the sheriff's department on a warrant for Aggravated Assault stemming from an investigation in Conway. The subject was arraigned and posted bond on the charge.

The sheriff's department is investigating the burglary of a home near the Carson/Gray county line. A VCR and remote control were taken from the home. Entry was gained by breaking in the front door.

Our department is investigating damage to a tractor and attached machinery which was reported north of White Deer. The tractor had apparently been used without the owner's permission to pull out a vehicle which had been stuck in the mud. Deputies are following up on information from witnesses who saw a vehicle in the area.

The sheriff's department and Skellytown City Marshal responded to a fight call in Skellytown which involved nearly a dozen juveniles and adults. A baseball bat was taken from one of the juveniles and a loaded pistol was taken from the adult.

We are receiving an increasing amount of complaints and comments

about escalating problems with juveniles in all parts of the county. We have serious concerns in this area and we're placing a great deal of time and effort into juvenile matters, but all of the enforcement in the world isn't going to make

much of a dent without parental involvement. I believe parents should stand by their children even when they do wrong and work to help them to learn from their mistakes and to take responsibility for their actions, but the parents who make excuses or tell lies for their children are only fooling their kids and themselves. Problem behavior seldom makes a magical transformation to acceptable behavior at the age of 17. Legal responsibility becomes a painful reality. The simple fact is that you seldom get into trouble if you don't break the law.

We are finding an increasing number of 13-14 year olds and pre-teens out at two o'clock in the morning in the company of people who are not at all interested in being positive role models for your kids. 

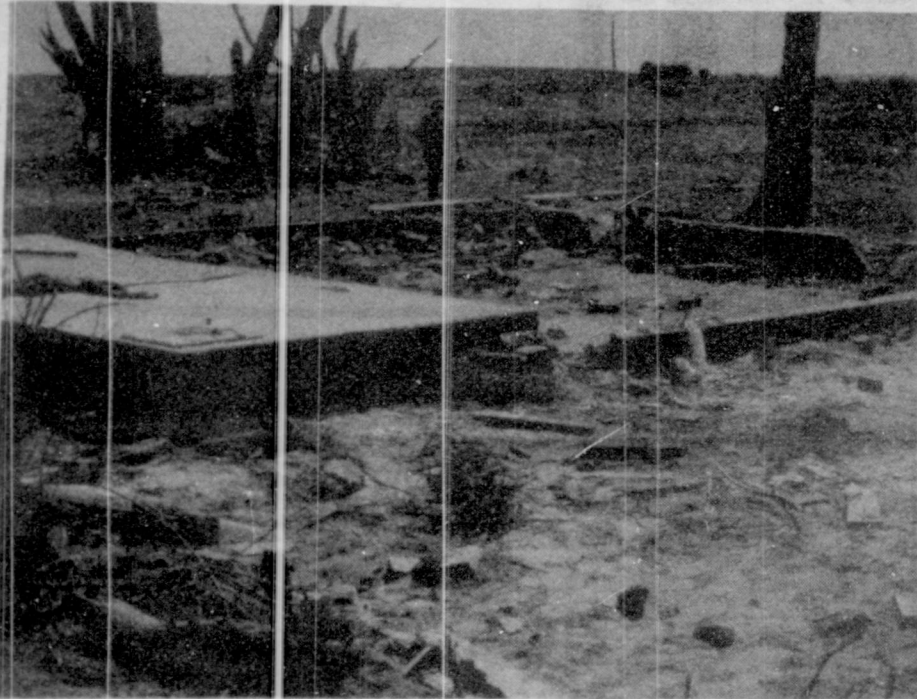

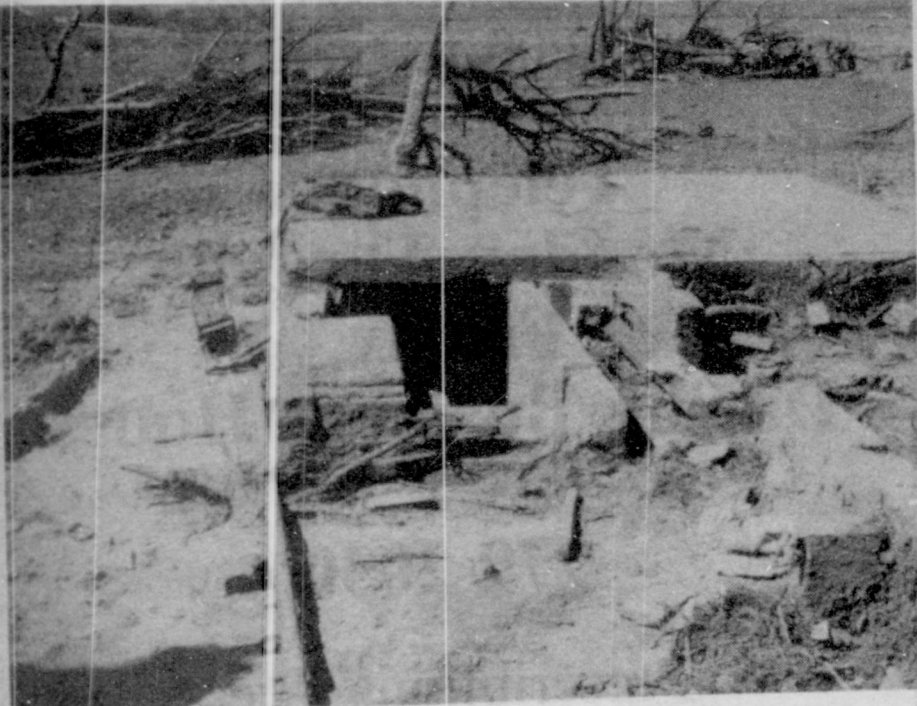

## Tornados Destroy Homes

### Wheeler Feed Lot Suffers Big Disaster Losses

June Suggs reports that one of the June 8 tornados touched down at the Wheeler feed lot and killed about 200 head of cattle. The tornado moved down the center of the yard, ripping up pens, demolishing the mill, the office structure and the three trailers where employees lived. As in the

stories of storm damage in McLean, good luck was evident. Two employees who attempted to flee in a vehicle saw that they could not escape and drove into the big hay barn. The funnel removed the roof of the barn, but left the Bronco, the men and the hay. A young hand, his

wife and baby rode out the storm in their car as the lot was destroyed around them. June says that although the office was reduced to rubble, a collapsing wall fell across her desk, protecting the shelf that contained the ledgers and vital business records.

On Thursday, June 8, 1995, tornados tore through the heart of the McLean/Alanreed area, leaving a path of destruction up to 1 1/4 miles wide and many miles long. The grisly sight of the wounded and dead livestock, randomly piled together and strewn over the pastures in the storm's wake, made residents aware of how lucky the community is to have miraculously escaped serious human injury.

However, the loss suffered by the families whose homes and possessions were destroyed is incalculable.

The Hommel family south of Alanreed is now homeless, as is the Marshal Hanes family of McLean. Ann and Charles Williams' home on Route 273 was

badly damaged and is no longer inhabitable. Three homes were totally destroyed on David and Dixie Jo Crocketts' property on County Line Road with two turned to rubble and one completely gone.

According to McLean Volunteer Fire Department Chief Clifford McDonald, many of McLean's emergency personnel and four vehicles, including the two ambulances were in Pampa assisting rescue workers there. Multiple tornados had damaged that city earlier in the afternoon. At about 6 pm the Donley County Sheriff's department contacted the McLean volunteers and informed them that yet another tornado was moving toward Alanreed. Chief McDonald reports that the Donley



**Former McLean Man Critical**

Mr. E.M. Bailey, a former resident of McLean, and former publisher of The McLean News, who was injured in the June 2 tornado in Friona, is now listed in critical condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Mr. Bailey, 68, was injured when his mobile

**Round-Up** --- outside on the benches and conversed with one another, reminiscing about other Panhandle weather stories and shared memories of McLean.

home was struck by one of a series of tornados that swept through Friona.

The house was blown apart by the pressure. Mr. Bailey's wife and 8-year-old grandson were thrown into the front yard, while he was buried beneath rubble and was later found by rescue workers. He suffered a crushed leg and internal injuries.

Bailey initially was taken to the hospital in critical condition, but later improved to serious condition, officials said. However, Bailey's condition has been downgraded to critical again.

**Tornado**

had followed the tornado from Clarendon, radioing information to McLean and then stopping to assist the Hommels. He credits the Donley County personnel's notification and McLean emergency volunteers' quick response with being able to warn residents a full 20 minutes before the tornado struck, thereby avoiding an even greater catastrophe.

Volunteer firefighter Linda McDonald remembers the helpless feeling she experienced as the emergency personnel raced back to McLean, not knowing as they neared home, watching the black,

rotating monster tornado, over a mile wide, advancing straight toward her town.

The McDonalds and David Tolleson were notified by radio that, just before the phones east of the city were knocked out, David Crockett had called 911 saying that a tornado was headed straight toward his house. After racing to the scene amid scattered debris, dead and wounded animals, and fallen wires, they saw no evidence of survivors. As they were examining the rubble that had once been the Crockett's residence, they heard cries for help from somewhere beneath the piles of brick. The volunteers began tearing through the wreckage with their hands until they found the cellar door. Inside, safe but shaken, was the Crockett family and Tory Bybee.

City of McLean worker Fred Smith radioed the good news to rescue workers that, although their home had been completely destroyed, the Marshal Hanes family had already

been taken to safety in McLean. A surreal scene comprised of the house's bare foundation, fallen trees and utility poles, soggy household debris, mangled tin and building material, an almost unrecognizable company pickup truck and dead animals was all that was left at the site of what had been the Hanes' home. As their family car and pickup had completely disappeared, they had to be taken into town by a passerby...

The city was without electricity for over 24 hours. An emergency generator was in operation from 8:30 pm on Thursday to Friday at 7:30 pm so that the pumps could operate and McLean would not be without water. Most businesses were either closed on Friday or open in

a limited capacity.

Puckett's Market was open at its regular time on Friday, allowing residents to purchase emergency supplies. Ken Carter, area supervisor, and Justin Puckett, son of the store's owner, brought a generator from Oklahoma late Thursday. They worked with store manager, Alta Mason, through the night so that doors could open at 8 am. All batteries, water and bread sold-out by mid-day and more were delivered.

Rescue workers from all over the Panhandle came to McLean's assistance. On Thursday night, the McLean Volunteer Fire Department prepared sandwiches for over 60 volunteers from Fritch, Spearman, Potter County and Pantex, who brought over a dozen addition rescue units to the area.

Dixie Jo Crockett, when asked to comment on the family's experience, revealed true Panhandle grit, "This is our home. We want to rebuild. We rebuilt on the same foundation after the 1970 tornado, and we know we can overcome all this. Everyone is alive and safe, that's what's important. And, this community has been wonderful."





