


## SUCCESSFUL SEWMANSHIP

### Professional Tips for Achieving a 'Custom Look'

Home-made or custommade: the difference in the way a fashion looks is often only a matter of details. Assuming that you have learned all you can about fitting, that you follow pattern instructions to the letter, and that you stitch and press carefully. these tips from sewing experts at The Singer Company will help you achieve a "custom look" in dressmaking.

### For Shape and Drape

 Baste by Hand. That's what the couturiers in Paris do. Basting holds the layers of a seam so that when it is machinestitched, one layer isn't eased or stretched more than the other. To baste, work on a flat surface. Pin the seam edges together at the ends, notches, center and at several additional points. Hand-baste with a long fine needle and single strand of mercerized or silk thread. Take one stitch at a time, lifting the work from the table as little as possible. Machine-stitch alongside the basting, not through it.



• Interface for Firmness. Lapels, collars, necklines, sleeve ends, cuffs and other areas requiring firmness (or a rolled contour) should be interfaced. Lightweight interfacing may be stitched to the garment when the facing is attached. Hair canvas and heavy interfacings should be applied so that the machine stitching joining the facing and garment does not go through the interfacing. · Underline to Enrich the

"Hand". An underlining is sewn as one with the dress fabric. It improves the "hand"or hang and drape - of a garment, and it helps to keep the outer fabric from wrinkling or stretching. When you choose an underlining, drape the fabric over it to make sure it isn't so heavy or stiff that it will

overpower the fabric. For example, a soft, open-weave, sheer wool is best underlined with chiffon; a lightweight wool crepe or tweed may be underlined with one of the fabrics like Si Bonne or Undercurrent, specifically made for interlinings and available in a wide range of fashion colors.

· Line for Luxury. A lining differs from an underlining by being made separately from the garment and then being attached at strategic places, such as the neckline and armholes of a dress or blouse or at the waistline of a skirt. Many couturiers underline a fashion for body and then line it for a luxurious finished look inside the garment and for extra comfort. Lining fabrics may range from softest China silk to crispy taffeta.


### For Fashion's Sake

For fabrics like jersey, fine

silk, velvet or sheer wools where you do not want stitching to show on the outside, blind hems provide the look you want. This is most easily done by using the automatic zig-zagger on your machine. Mark, turn and press hem in the usual way. Baste a guide line 4 inch from the top of the hem edge. Place hem edge over the feed of the machine, turning bulk of the fabric to the left thus creating a soft fold. Adjust seam guide to rest next to the soft fold. Stitch so that the straight stitches fall on hem edge and the sideward stitches pierce the soft fold. Feed the fold against the edge of the guide. The end result will be an invisible-from-theoutside hem. A blind hem can be done by

hand, too. Pink the edge. Handbaste the hem in place about inch from pinked edge. Catch-stitch hem in place by hand, taking stitches between pinked edge and the skirt. Turn back pinked edge along guide line with left hand as · Buy the Best Buttons. Good



### **President Urges Citizen Effort** To Fight Crime And Delinquency

WASHINGTON, D.C. (MNS) - President Johnson has met with members of a newlyorganized anti-crime group to ask their aid in the fight against crime and delinquency.

Citing the need for combatting delinquency, as one method of cutting crime, President Johnson pointed out that "One out of every six boys in our land will go to juvenile court before his 18th birthday" and that "The rate of repeated crime is highest among criminals who began as juvenile

delinguents." The new citizen organization, the National Emergency Com-mittee, was established by the National Council on Crime and Delinquency. It is headed by H. Ladd Plumley, Chairman of the Board and President of the State Mutual Life Assurance Company of America, and a former President of the U.S.

Chamber of Commerce. Plumley, a distinguished leader in dozens of business and betterment groups, explained that the new Emergency Committee plans to seek citizen leadership, provide guidance to individuals and civic and social organizations who wish to fight crime, and raise funds to expand the work of the National Council on Crime and Delinquency.

The National Emergency Committee, said Mr. Plumley, has devised a series of volunteer projects which permit the private citizen or organization to assist the police, courts, and correctional programs. Labor, business, service organizations, and concerned citizens will be asked to participate.

Mr. Plumley urged people who wanted information on how to participate, to write to NEC. National Council on Crime and Delinguency, 44 East 23 Street, New York, New York 10010.

NCCD, the organization behind the new National Emergency Committee, is a 60-year old non-profit, private agency that works to prevent and control crime by offering technical know-how and fostering Citizen Action Programs, now active in 19 states. The President of NCCD is Sigurd S. Larmon, former Chairman of the Board of Young and Rubicam; the Chairman of the Board is Judge Caroline K. Simon of the New York Court of Claims.

Pampering your laundry goes a long way towards saving ironing time, says Miss Jimmie Lou Wainscott, extension county home

demonstration agent. The agent suggests the following ways to get good results from easy-care fabrics and pre-

vent laundry wrinkles: Wash in small loads-big loads can compress garments and wrinkle them.

Wash easy-care fabrics often. Don't wait for heavy soil to build up. Fresh soil and stains are easy to remove. The longer the delay in washing the harder it is to get out stains. Pre-treat greasy soil with

cleaning fluid, full strength liquid detergent or detergent paste. Work detergent into fabric and soak 10 to 15 minutes for color fast fabrics. Use cool or warm water. If

necessary to soil removal, you may use hot water for washing, but do not spin out the wash water until it feels cool to the hands Adjusting controls by hand-if necessary-can save ironing.

Wash only long enough remove soil.

Rinse in water that feels cool or cold to the hands (below 98 degrees F.) Shorten the water extraction time after wash and rinse cycles,

if not automatically done by your machine. When clothes are nearly dry, wash and wear settings which sary
