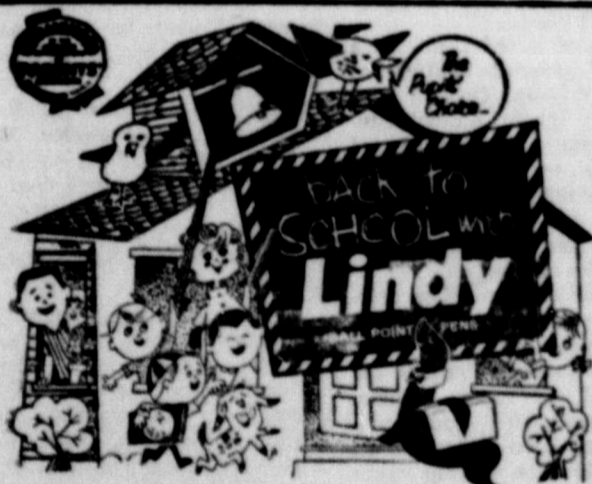

Research in tree improvement by the Texas Forest Service has produced a strain of pine trees that shows growth far in excess of the average trees. A plantation of ordinary trees grew 108 cubic feet in 10 years. In contrast, one planted with the selected strain grew 131 cubic feet in the same period, a difference of 23 per cent in growth. This study is but one part of the overall tree improvement program of the Service aimed at producing better quality trees for tomorrow's timber grower.

Social Security Benefit Payments

Social Security disability insurance benefit payments have now been made for 10 years, according to Travis C. Briggs, social security district manager.

In the same period, the number of disability beneficiaries in the 26 Panhandle counties has increased from 169 to 1,464. In Gray County, the number increased from 20 to 145.

The average monthly disability benefit today is \$38.00. Payments to disabled workers with wives and children average \$215.00.

To be eligible for disability payments, you must have worked in covered employment for at least five out of the 10 years immediately preceding the disability. Also, the disability must be severe enough to prevent substantial gainful work, and be expected to last for at least 12 months.

The names of all who make application for disability benefits are referred to the state vocational rehabilitation agency for possible service which may return the disabled to employment.

Those who have questions about social security should contact the Amarillo office at 1006 S. Adams.

Educational benefits for veterans who served after Jan. 31, 1955, were substantially increased by Public Law 90-77. Veterans already enrolled under the new GI bill will receive increased allowances effective Oct. 1 in their November, 1967, checks.

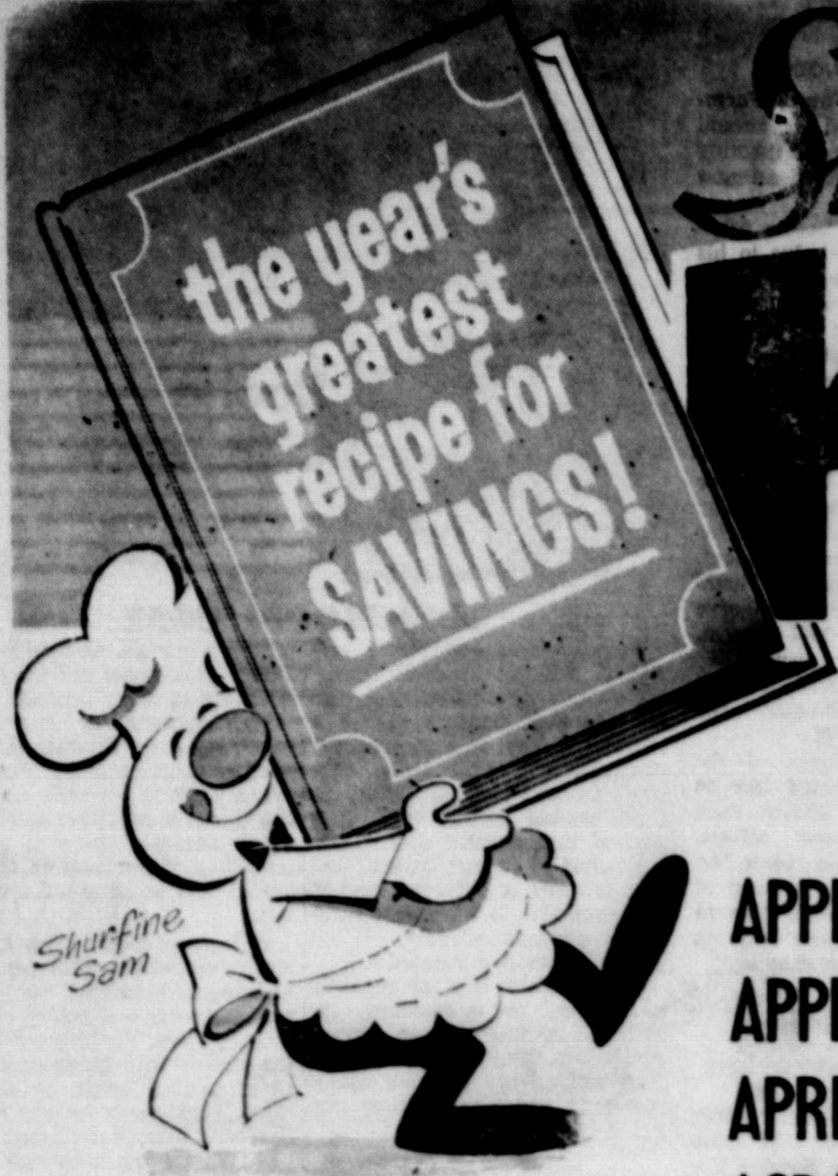
