Jr. High Boys End Year With Trophy

The Groom Junior High Cubs basketball team closed out a successful season last Thursday and Saturday by capturing the consolation trophy at the Miami Junior High Tourney. The Cubs played their first game of the tourney against a fine team from Canadian who were undefeated coming into the tournament. The Cubs lost a hard fought battle 42-35. The Cubs overcame a huge 25-11 halftime deficit to tie the score 32-32 early in the fourth quarter. The Wildcats rallied to win but the entire Cub team performed valiantly against a very good team. Dewayne Gray led all scorers in this game with 13 points. Other Cubs scoring were Clay Ritter 11, Nicholas Anthony 6, Grant Weinheimer 3, and Garrett Britten 2.

The Cubs resumed play Saturday morning against the Allison Antelopes and won by a convincing margin of 42-22. All of the Cubs

saw action in this game and played well as a unit with crisp passing, good rebounding and defense and overall good team play. Nicholas Anthony led Cub scorers in this game with 16 points. Other Cubs who scored were Dewayne Gray 12, Grant Weinheimer 8, Russell Conrad 6 and Clay Ritter 2.

In the consolation finals the Cubs met the host team, Miami and handed them a defeat by a score of 42-32. In another well played game the Cubs displayed their trademark hustling defense and excellent team play. Nicholas Anthony led the scoring parade with 12 points. Others who contributed in the scoring column were Dewayne Gray 9 points, Clay Ritter 8, Grant Weinheimer 5, Garrett Britten 4 and Russell Conrad 4. Kori Brown Wins Scholarship

Kori Brown, a sophomore at Groom High School and FFA member, earned a \$6,000. scholarship in the San Antonio Junior Stock Show. Brown won Grand Champion with her Angus heifer. The daughter of Lonny and Susan Brown, Kori has been showing most of her life.

"I have won a lot of ribbons, buckles and trophies over the years," she said. "But this is something that I am extremely pleased about. I always knew that showing cattle would take me places, now I am beginning to realize just how far! I also know without the help, patience and love from my dad and grand-dad this would not be possible, and I want to thank them both for all the support."

Brown is a member of the Texas Club Calf Association and is currently listed as 26th in the standings and climbing fast, with points not yet in from several recent shows, such

as Reserve Champion heifer at the Fort Worth show. Members earn points for how they place in sanctioned shows. Points are accumulated on their placings and participation. If she places in the top 10 she will be honored at a banquet and awarded a coveted "Top Ten" jacket at the Houston Stock Show. Members also become eligible for scholarships.

Traditionally, heifers, unlike the steer at these shows, do not win a lot of money. While there is usually a token cash award, heifers are not sold at auction like the steers. Heifers are kept by their exhibitors to breed or sell at a later time. The stock show board at San Antonio has set a precedent for heifer shows by offering the \$6,000. scholarship for breed champions at their show. Exhibitors are hopeful that the trend will catch on at other major shows.



April Burton, a junior and FFA member also attended the show. She earned a Reserve Division Championship with her Chianina heifer. Burton is also a member of TCCA

and is ranked 7th in the Chianina heifer standings. She is also hoping for a "Top Ten" jacket.

District Attorney's Increases To Come From State, Not Co.

In a recent report on the Carson County Commissioners court, the Groom News reported that the commissioners had unanimously voted to increase District Attorney Randal Sims' office expenses from \$1,500 a year to \$2,000 per year and increase financial support from \$27,650 to \$40,000.

While this information was taken directly from the minutes provided by the court, it should be clarified. The Commissioners passed a resolution that requests and supports legislative action. It will not increase

the county taxpayers bill. According to District Attorney Randal Sims, the state legislature has not increased their support since 1982, while they have mandated increases in the operations performed by the D.A.'s office.

The Groom News works to bring you information in a timely manner and while

the article essentially expressed what we have stated here, it was taken from the raw minutes as we went to press. We regret if the story caused any confusion for our readers.

Letter To The Editor

The State of Texas has 144 elected prosecutors whose salary is paid by the state. State law provides these 144 prosecutors be paid from either of two appropriation provisions. If a prosecutor has a private practice in addition to his elected position, the state paid salary is pre-set at approximately \$86,000.00. If he performs his elected duties on a full time basis without a private practice, the state paid salary is pre-set at a higher amount. The pay increase associated with the district having a designated full time prosecutor comes from the State and not the county budgets.

Currently, 124 (85%) of these 144 officials are performing as full time prosecutors and being compensated by the state as such. That number is increasing. Of the 19 who are eligible to have a private practice in addition to their elected position, three have asked this legislative session

to be considered full-time: District Attorney's from the 50th, 88th, and the 100th Judicial District. A fourth is going to ask this session and another has chosen to make this election at the next legislative session.

For the two years I have been your district attorney, I have worked full time as such and foregone any private practice. Punishments have increased and the pending case load has been reduced. You, the constituents of the 100th judicial district have twice had the option of choosing between a candidate who wanted to be district attorney and maintain a private practice or one who would perform the elected duties full time. Both times the majority has chosen the full time candidate, myself.

I appreciate the opportunity to work for you. I invite anyone with questions to contact me or I will be glad to address any group.

3 Federal Land Banks To Join To Make One

PAMPA - Three Federal Land Bank Associations in the Texas Plains join together February 1 to become the Panhandle-Plains Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA).

The merger of the three member-owned lending cooperatives is the result of overwhelming approval last December by members of the FLBAs of Amarillo, Caprock-Plains in Plainview and High Plains in Pampa. It culminates two years of study and preparation by the boards of directors of the three associations.

The combined association has approximately \$135 million in loans outstanding to more than 1,300 farmers, ranchers and agribusinesses in 16 Texas Panhandle counties.

"These Federal Land Bank Associations have long been a part of the agricultural business economy in the area and by

joining together as Panhandle-Plains FLBA, we are really marking the start of a new era of agricultural financing for our customers," said Robert R. Williams, chief executive officer. "Our members reap the benefits of combining three strong associations into one that's even stronger, better capitalized and more diversified, without losing any of the local service and ownership. And, it allows us to centralize administrative functions thereby freeing up the lending staff to spend more time with customers."

The association is under the direction of a nine-member board of directors, comprising of three members from each of the former FLBAs. They include Larry E. Fairchild of Adrian; C.L. Edwards, Panhandle; Ervin J. Davis, Happy; Ronnie N. Hopper, Petersburg; Dean Turner,

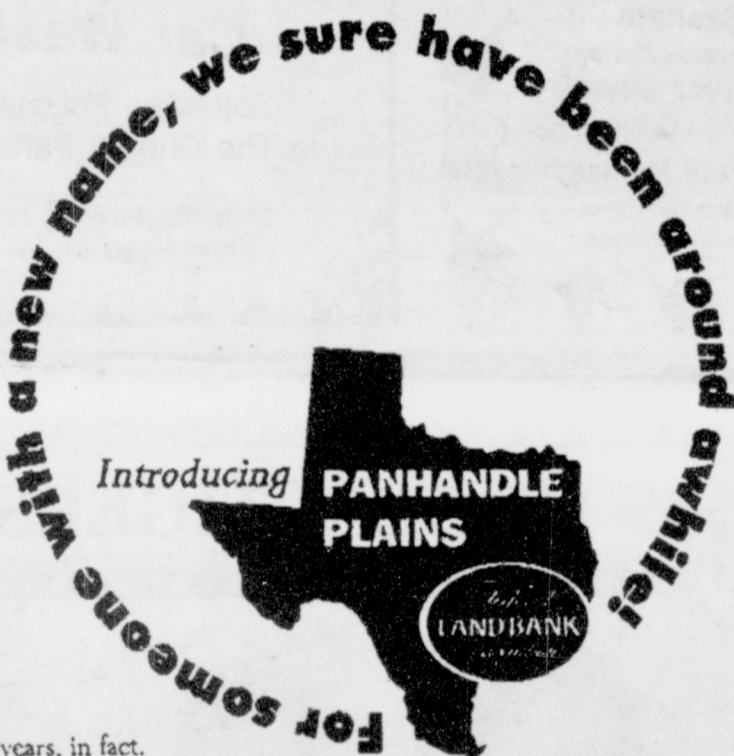

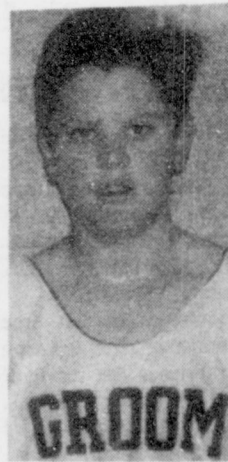
The Junior High Ettes end their season with a 9 win 5 loss record.
