Groom City Council Approves "On Call" Pay For Utility Workers

The Groom City Council met last week in regular session with a variety of items on the agenda.

Attending were Joe Homer, Don Case, Jimmy Britten, Mary Margaret Brooks, Ellis Stapp, and Jay Lamb.

Also attending were Tim Case, Donnie Evans, and Jody Ball.

The City Council unanimously voted to give city utility workers "On Call" pay for weekends that they are required to be available for emergency calls. Workers will be given an additional \$50.00 for each weekend that they are on call.

In other employee issues the council voted

to allow employees to carry over five vacation days from one year to the next. Formerly an employee had to use up all vacation time for the year or lose it.

The present year's budget was amended as follows:

In the general fund hospitalization was raised from \$3000. to \$3500. Office supplies \$2000. to \$2500. Operating funds from \$4700. to \$5000. Transfer out \$40,000. to purchase a C.D. In the waterworks account, gas and oil was raised from \$2600 to \$2800. The operating fund was raised from \$4700. to \$5000; and \$500. was applied to "other" categories.

Cox, Allen and

Company of Dumas were hired at a fee of \$2100. for the 1997 audit for the year ending Sept. 30, 1997.

The Council voted to give the mayor, mayor pro-tem, and secretary access to the safety deposit box and bank accounts.

An application was approved from Southwestern Bell for a new grain elevator service tariff.

The aldermen agreed to check into the cost of cellular phones for city vehicles rather than radios so that the employees can stay in contact when necessary.

City employees will be checking on prices of cable and posts to put a

low fence around the park, to keep cars from driving on the grass and walking track.

A discussion was held concerning late charges on water bills. The City secretary was instructed to contact the City attorney to see if water can be turned off if partial payment has been made. Discussion will proceed when more information is made available.

Residents on the south end and south side of Front Street will get a new waterline. The Council approved the work after West Texas Gas notified the City that they will be doing some

Commissioners OK Budget; 3% Increase For Judge Roselius

The Carson County Commissioners' Court met for a hearing on the 1997-98 Carson County budget prior to their regular meeting on Monday, September 22. Discussion was held on the proposed three percent salary increase for all elected county officials with the exception of the four commissioners.

Commissioner Kevin Howell of Precinct #4 went on record as opposing the three percent raise for the judge. He said that he felt that since the Judge was a member of the Commissioners' Court, and the rest of the court would not be getting a pay raise, that the judge should not take the 3 percent pay raise either.

Howell noted that the State Legislature had recently voted a \$5,000 annual increase to county judges for judicial duties, an amount to be paid in addition to the proposed salary increase.

"I felt like the state supplement of \$5,000. a year was already a pretty good step," he said.

Judge Roselius replied that he could appreciate Howell's feelings, but he said "people don't understand that a judge has two positions, an administrative role where I'm a part of the Commissioners' Court, and then a judicial role that has nothing to do with the Commissioners' Court. The \$5,000 increase from the

Tigers Lose To Chillicothe, 42-26

The Groom Tigers just did not come out as strong defensively against the Chillicothe Eagles, according to Coach Larry Reid.

"We did not execute

our defense as well as we are capable of," he said, "allowing Chillicothe to take the early lead. Our style doesn't mesh with their type very well either. It took some

time to make the adjustments."

Groom came back better prepared in the second quarter.

"I was really proud of the way the boys kept

trying right up until the final buzzer," stated Reid. The final score was Groom 26 and Chillicothe 42.

Groom rushed for 209 yards on 40 attempts. They connected on 5 of 9 passes for 79 yards and two touchdowns. They also punted four times for an average of 32.25 yards.

Jamie Shuck led the rushing with 9 carries for 66 yards. He had one fumble recovery and 11 unassisted tackles.

Josh Evenson carried the ball 5 times for 42 yards. He passed for 79 yards and two touchdowns. Evenson had two kick-off returns worth 37 yards. He had 4 punts averaging 32.25, 1 interception and 4 unassisted tackles.

Toby Burgin carried the ball 11 times for 40 yards. He had 8 tackles.

Wade Ritter carried the ball 8 times for 37 yards and one touchdown. He had two kick-off returns for 20 yards and 4 unassisted tackles.

Dean Fields had 7 carries for 24 yards and one touchdown. He also had 7 unassisted tackles.

He married Mondeleen Miles in 1949.



The couple will make their home in the Grandview Community.

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

Three Commissioners voted in favor of the judge's raise and Commissioner Howell voted against it. The voting was unanimous in favor of the other raises.

In the regular session, the budget was reviewed. The net requirements for the general fund come to \$2,052,624., and estimated projected revenue for the precincts is approximately \$989,024. After reviewing the proposed budget, it was approved as presented.

The court then proceeded to set the tax rate to fund the budget. After reviewing and discussing the amount needed, the court approved a tax rate of .3228/\$100 which is approximately 3 3/4 percent less than the present tax rate of .3613.

The court amended the

current budget in the amount of \$15,250. in order to pay for outside auditing performed by Brown Graham and Company during the current year.

The court also approved a county policy to pay \$35 per month to employees who have a cell phone and are authorized by their superior to use the phone in the performance of their official duties.

The court set the minimum salary for hourly employees at \$5.15 per hour in order to stay in compliance with the minimum wage law. The maximum hourly wage will be \$7.15 per hour.

The court approved a request from K&N Energy to lay a gas-gathering line across County Rd. 13 in Precinct #4.

No action was taken on a request from Amarillo Natural Gas to install a gas line across

County Rd. 11 in Precinct #2 until more information concerning the request is received.

The court adjourned until October, 13, 1997.

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

Requirement Changes For Handicapped Plates

Texas who apply for disabled person motor vehicle registration face new requirements effective September 1, 1997. These actions are the result of a new state law approved by the 75th Legislature earlier this year.

Beginning September 1, a first-time application for disabled person vehicle registration must be accompanied by a notarized written statement for a written prescription from a physician licensed to practice medicine in Texas. The statement or prescription must also include a certification of whether the disability is permanent or temporary.

A first-time applicant must also show a Texas driver license or personal identification card issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS). Disabled parking placards issued to persons with a permanent disability will now be valid for four years instead of five. Placards issued to persons with a temporary disability will expire after a period of time not to exceed six months and can only be renewed when the request is accompanied by a physician's statement or

prescription.

A citizen who renews a placard will complete the top portion of the application and surrender the expired placard to the county. A notarized statement or written doctor's prescription is not necessary to process a renewal unless the citizen does not have the expired placard, there is no receipt for the expired placard, or the county tax office cannot find a record indicating that the placard had been issued. It will be necessary to show a Texas driver license or DPS-issued personal identification card before a placard renewal can occur.

Another law that takes effect September 1 allows for the issuance of more than one set of disabled person license plates to citizens who own more than one specially-equipped vehicle. A specially-equipped vehicle is one that is equipped to be driven by an individual who has lost the use of one or both legs.

Persons who have questions about the new requirements for disabled person motor vehicle registration should contact their local county tax office for information.


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


McLean Board of Trustees Approve '97 Tax Rate of \$1.45 per \$100 Valuation

The McLean School Board of Trustees set the 1997 tax rate at the board's regular meeting September 16 in the school business office. The new rate for the year is \$1.45 per \$100 valuation. The rate is an increase of 2.11% over the 1996 level.

Following a short executive session, the board approved several minor items of business, including an approval of school board policy update 56, approval of a name change on the interlocal agreement from EPCO, and approval of the financial report.



That "Horrible" Discipline of Spanking

[Editor's Note: Cunningham is a 1932 McLean graduate, he was also principal for two years and superintendent for 2 years.]

We read extensively from those who were not spanked, but little from those who experienced this "horrible" treatment.

Let me note at the beginning, I am for

corporal punishment when it is administered by a concerned and caring person and is never done by anyone while he is angry.

I was associated with the educational process for 40 years. I was a teacher, principal, superintendent and dean

of students. I firmly believe the instructors or teachers can only polish the gem sent to them by the parents. How the mold comes can be improved upon, but the disposition set by child and parent in the preschool years is the strongest with which to work.

Question: Is it coincidental that when prayer was taken out of schools and the paddle was taken from principals and suspension substituted, the construction of schoolhouses slowed, and the building of prisons increased?

We had little or no problem with children who came from homes where they had discipline and wanted their children disciplined at school. In most cases, their academic level was above the average.

Here is an example where that outdated method of child rearing was used.

There was eight children in the family. They lived on a marginal farm. All had to work hard to provide a modest living. They never begged, borrowed or stole to supplement their income.

Five of the children became teachers with master's degrees or above. One earned a

degree in computer science and headed a large electric company. Another became a very successful cosmetologist, the other graduated from a business college and went on to have a very successful business of his own.

All were Christians, and law-abiding leaders in their communities.

They were all spanked when growing up and were advised if they were spanked at school they would get another spanking when they arrived home.

They were never spanked in anger, and their mother told them it hurt her as much as it did them when she had to punish them. Years later one of the children said when he saw tears in his mother's eyes, he knew what she meant, and because he loved her so much he felt he had been punished twice.

From this eight, 15 more children were born. Two became teachers, one in high school and

one in a university. Two became dental technicians; four became computer specialists who traveled over the nation and beyond. Another became a real estate broker after teaching awhile. One became a successful banker after he finished college. One is a dentist and another is an oral surgeon.

One, the baby of the family was denied the benefits of discipline; his mother wanted to rear a perfect child who went through his life without being spanked or corrected. She spent much time to and from school on both levels explaining why her child was unusual and did not fit the school pattern.

He never did. He

failed in three marriages, failed in college and, at 54 years of age, has not found the pattern his mother thought he should fit.

Punishment alone is not the answer, but if it takes a spanking to keep them in line, let it be. Don't suspend them, keep them in school. It makes no sense to suspend a student for playing hooky or laying out of school. That is exactly what he wants.

Let the schools be in charge. Support them in their efforts to help our students prepare to make an honest living. We need to use good judgment in discipline as well as instruction.


