Chris Ollinger also had a great evening, with an interception for a 21-yard touchdown, 7 unassisted tackles and a fumble recovery.

Josh Evenson controlled the passing game completing five throws for 62 yards. He had three unassisted tackles and a 24-vard punt return.

# School Approve Budget

(Editors Note: The Groom News is proud to bring to it's readers a comprehensive look at all the local taxing entities' recently recently approved budgets. This week's feature will the City and The County School. and Appraisal District will be run around the last of September.)

The City and School of Groom have worked very hard this year to keep taxes leveled off in an economy that seems to raise them at the drop of a hat. It should be said that budgets are only a guideline for expected The fact expenditures. that an entity can go over budget or stay under budget should not be a good or bad reflection on them, but simply a sign that something happened or didn't happen that the group had or had not (which ever the case) anticipated.

"We could very well come in \$100,000. under budget," stated Business

Manager Joyce Hutsell. "If we get very lucky and nothing that we have not expected breaks down, wears out or requires replacing. We also allow for also allow contingency funds, such as, for instance if the basketball teams were to get to go to the State finals, money may have not been allocated for sending 22 students to Austin. Therefor travel cost, meals, etc. would be amended to the athletic budget."

While the City of Groom does not have as many variables as the school system, it, too, must allow for unexpected expenses.

"If lightning were to strike one of our wells and we had to replace the motor, that would be an expense that we probably would not have anticipated," stated City Secretary, Mary Sue Lyles.

In depth budgets are considered opens records and anyone may look them over by asking at Business the School Office or at City Hall, however for the purposes of this article, totals for each cost center have been lumped together with a brief explanation of what type of expenses go into that cost center.

\*Data Processing 4,668 Includes state required software or hardware programs needed for many state and federal reports and contract services.

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# Carson County Sheriff's Report

There were 22 persons incarcerated in the Carson County Jail during the month of August. There are currently 11 persons in iail.

This past month our deputies have assisted at two fatal traffic accidents (one in Carson County one near the Armstrong/Carson County line on U.S. Our officers have handled a variety of calls from mental health commitments and attempted suicide calls to the routine calls of suspicious persons on Interstate 40 and cattle on the roadway.

We are still in possession of the cremated remains of a California man. plastic container holding his remains was left in a dumpster on Interstate 40 at the rest area. One family member wants the remains returned to California and another wants the container to remain in Texas. We are waiting for written authorization from one of the family to give us authorization

to release or inter the

Deputy Fred Herrick was called to investigate an intoxicated female who was laying in the roadway on U.S. 60 near the FM 2373. As the investigation progressed the female stated that she had been kidnapped at gunpoint in Amarillo and had then been assaulted and left

in Carson County. The woman was taken by ambulance to Amarillo where the Amarillo Police Department joined in the investigation.

\*\*Total Revenue expected for 1997-98 is \$1,424,822. The School Board is anticipating a deficit of \$134,183. The budget was purposely planned like this in order to reduce the schools fund balance and keep taxes down. The Board expects to end the year with a fund balance of \$445,471.

Groom ISD expects to professional collect \$721,950 in taxes. and Approximately another other schools, tuition, interest, rent etc. This accounts for 55% of the total budget. The state of Texas pays 41.5% of from '96-'97. the balance and the

City of Groom Budget The City of Groom's includes budget is set up very much the same. It is organized by accounts. There is a General Road Fund, Works Fund, Fund. Water Economic Development, and Community Center Fund.

The General Fund contains most of the office operating funds,

and animal control officer, summer program ambulance and fire departments, insurance, benefits, election costs and much, much more. While space will not allow a complete list, this year's budget is set for \$77,250, \$5,500 less than that of last year's budget. Major decreases have occured in salaries, insurance, and telephone fees. This fund starts a balance of \$45,000 and expects to generate a total of \$134,000 in funds.

In the Road Fund, supplies, repairs, expenses grant expenses expect to total \$58,000. 73,000 is collected from This fund get it's money from sales tax and interest on investments. \$64,000 has been budgeted, down \$13,300

The Water Works Federal Government pays account contains salaries of two workers, as well as their benefits and insurance. It also uniforms, training vehicle expenses, waste management costs, utilities, repair costs, and much more. This year's budget is set at \$151,750; down \$3,650. Revenues this account come from water, sewer and garbage payments, meter deposits and

funds for salaries of the secretary machine fees. Residents will pay a total of \$165,500; \$2,700.

Economic The Development Fund, as you may recall, is a newly created fund to track the 1/2 cent sales tax that was passed a couple of years ago. There is little activity in this administrative fund unless the Groom Economic Development Corporation finds a special use for it. Expenses are few,

containing balance of \$1,500 for office supplies, postage, travel and schooling. fund balance of \$28,600 down by is expected by the end of the budget cycle.

The Community Center Fund entails all expenses and income related to the use of the Community Center. It includes office supplies, repairs, utilities, and insurance. The Council expects to spend \$12,150 on it next year. In the plus column, they anticipate a fund balance of \$19,560, mostly due the

Columbia will pay for the use of the health clinic.

For total city expenses, the Council is expecting \$300,650.

Total revenues tabulate \$429,340.



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# PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1997

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a person to hold the position of municipal judge in more than one municipality.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow a person who holds the office of municipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person rece wes compensation."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 43 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the maximum annual increase in homestead appraisals for each year since the most recent tax appraisal. The amendment would also permit the legislature to allow the governing body of a school district to elect to apply the law providing for the transfer of the age-65-and-older school property tax freeze to the person's new homestead, if the move to the new residence homestead occurred before the law took effect.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to limit increases in the appraised value of residence home-teads for ad valorent taxation and to permit a school district to calculate the school property tax freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderly person or the surviving spruse of an elderly person in accordance with the law authorizing the transfer of the school property tax freeze to a different homestead regardless of weether that law was in effect at the time the person established the person's homestead."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize counties, cities, towns, and other local taxing entities to grant exemptions or other forms of ad valorem tax relief on property on which approved water conservation initiatives have been implemented.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to permit a taxing unit to grant an exemption or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property on which a water conservation initiative has been implemented."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

use Joint Resolution 104 proposes an

amendment to update the Texas Constitution by deleting duplicate numbering in its provisions and removing certain of its obsolete portions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment eliminating duplicate numbering in and certain obsolete provisions of the Texas Constitution."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to allow the Supreme Court of Texas to hold sessions at any location in this state. Currently, the court is limited to holding sessions only at Austin, the seat of state government.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the supreme court to sit to transact business at any location in this state."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the current provision which provides that the board of the Texas Growth Fund may not invest money in a business unless the business has disclosed to the board whether it has any direct financial investment in or with South Africa or Namibia.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing the Texas growth fund to continue to invest in businesses without requiring those businesses to disclose investments in South Africa or Namibia."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to create the Texas Water Development Fund II as a fund separate and distinct from the Texas Water Development Fund. The amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to administer the fund and issue general obligation bonds for purposes of the fund under guidelines set forth in the amendment.

The amendment would also allow the Board to use loan repayments coming into the fund after the end of the fiscal year to make bond debt service payments, and would provide certain conditions for the flow of funds for repayment of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the authorization to the Texas Water Development Board to transfer existing bond authorizations for water supply, water quality, flood control, or state participation from one category of use to another category to maximize the use of existing funds and relating to more efficient operation of the bond programs."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment which would authorize home equity lending, in which a loan could be secured by a lien against the borrower's homestead. The amendment would also establish several provisions providing for consumer protection in the home equity lending process.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The amendment to the Texas Constitution expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender, with the homeowner's consent, may place against a homestead."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to authorize a property tax of five cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts which are located in Harris County. The constitution currently authorizes a property tax of three cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts regardless of what county they are in.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire prevention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment to permanently dedicate monies from the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Fund (and its auxiliary fund) so that they are used only for assisting victims of crime and not for any other purpose. If an episode of mass violence occurred, however, money from the funds could be used to assist victims of the mass violence if all other sources of authorized emergency assistance were depleted first.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment designating the purposes for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may be used."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 59 proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the Legislature from authorizing additional state debt payable from the general revenue fund if the resulting annual debt service (the amount needed each year to make payments) would exceed five percent of the annual general revenue avail-

able over the last three fiscal years, excluding revenues constitutionally dedicated for purposes other than payment of state debt.

The term "additional state debt" does not include bonds that, although backed by the full faith and credit of the state, are reasonably expected to be paid from revenue sources other than the general revenue fund.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment limiting the amount of state debt payable from the general revenue fund."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Texas Supreme Court does not act on a motion for a rehearing within 180 days of the motion's filing, the motion is

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to establish a deadline for supreme court action on a motion for rehearing."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish the Texas Tomorrow trust fund dedicated exclusively to the prepayment of tuition and fees for higher education. The amendment would guarantee that if there is not enough money during any fiscal year to pay the appropriate tuition and required fees, the needed money will be appropriated out of the first available money coming into the state treasury each fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
