Council Approves Building Lease; Adds Drug Policy

Groom met in regular session last week with Homer, Joe aldermen Ellis Don Case, Stapp, Mary Margaret Brooks and Jay Lamb present. Absent Jimmy Visitors included Forres McLaughlin and city employees Mary Sue Lyles, Jody Ball, and Donnie Evans.

Minutes of the October 14 meeting were read and approved and the Council unanimously voted to pay the bills.

The Council approved unanimously to enter into a lease agreement on the old Vivian's building located on Broadway and Second Street. Forrest and Patti McLaughlin agreed to rent the

building for two years at \$75.00 per month and have an option for an additional two years. Credit for improvements will be given against the rental price. Improvements will include installing a bathroom, painting and installing a back door. The City has agreed to be responsible for getting the sewer and water connections to the building, replacing the front glass and furnishing the door to be replaced.

A drug policy was adopted for the City's personnel. Using Carson County Drug Policy for a model, these new guidelines will become part of the personnel policies handbook.

A public hearing has

been slated for December 10 at 7:00 p.m. concerning a special use permit zoning ordinance. Tina Painter has requested this permit in conjunction with her property at 111 Newcome.

Discussion continued concerning purchasing cell phones for the office and barn. The matter was tabled pending information on cost being made available.

A pay rate for temporary or substitute office help has been set at \$5.15 per hour by unanimous decision of the board.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned.

In an emergency meeting, City Council members voted to accept Jody Ball's resignation effective December 2.

Ball told The Groom News reporter that his reasons for resigning

Groom School To Share In \$10 Million Grant

I would like to report on the status of the TIF grants from the TIFB to the PIC of the PIN and of the TIE grant from USDOE through TEA for AV collaboration. And these abbreviations are just the tip of the iceberg.

really would like to inform you of some of the neat and wonderful things that are going on in Groom and across the Panhandle. Groom will share in over \$10 million in grants that are coming to the schools of the Panhandle of Texas. By Christmas we hope to have installed 28 computers, 3 printers, local area network (LAN) and all the boxes. wires and equipment necessary for us to connect every computer in our school not only to

every school in the panhandle, but through the Internet, to every other such connection in the world. We will have a web page that will allow the world to see what is on in Groom ISD. Another part of the grants will allow all of our teachers to received at least 24 hours of training on how to use the internet to integrate our learning experiences with other students and teachers across panhandle and literally, the world. In addition, 8 of our teachers may

volunteer for training at video-conference sites located across the panhandle. To help them, the school will receive 4 lap-top computers that the school may use in any way necessary after the training. The value of all of the above equipment and training will exceed \$140,000.
