Carson's Court Approves County Line Installation

Commissioners' Court met October 27 with all members present. Minutes were read and approved and all claims were approved.

The court discussed problems they are having on county road right-of-ways with the depth of communication line installations. Approval is given for installations to be 36" below the lowest portion of the barrow ditch. Some area lines are more shallow and cause problems when maintenance is required on right-of-ways.

Discussion was held concerning tax laws that relate to county vehicles that are driven to and from work.

After discussing the county personnel policy book, the court agreed that no changes were needed to the present policy.

The court approved Janet Grange as election judge for precinct 102 and 401 in White Deer.

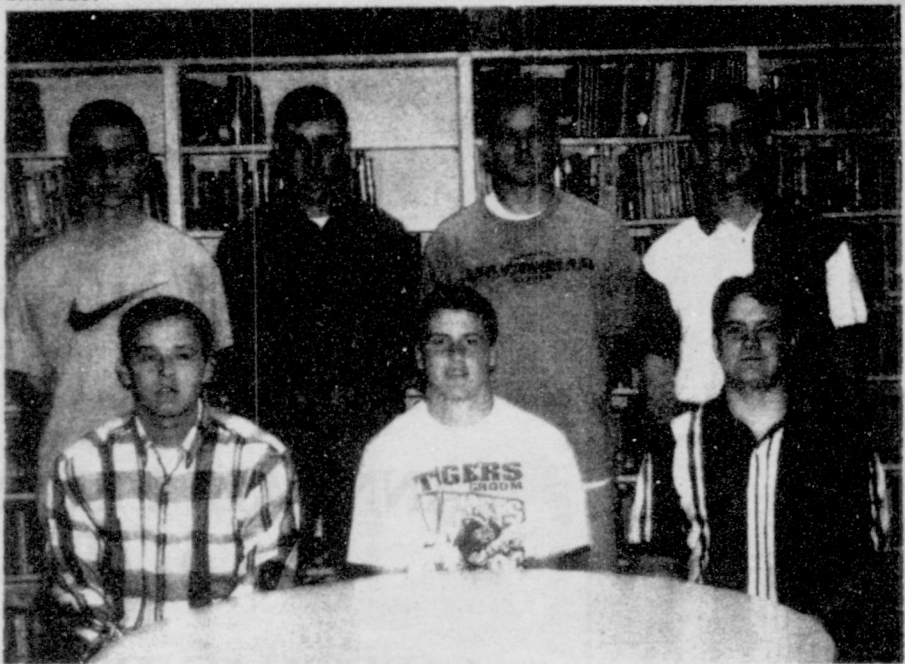
The court released three safekeeping receipts for First Bank and Trust of White Deer. The securities will be repledged.

Constitutional Amendments Election Nov. 4

Early voting begins on October 31 for the November 4th, statewide election that will decide 14 state constitutional amendments. Below is a brief description of each proposition:

Proposition 1: Allows municipal judges to serve more than one term.

Proposition 2: Would provide a 10% per year cap on increases in a homestead's appraisal value; also lets local taxing entities make retroactive tax freezes for those 65 and older.

Proposition 3: Would permit local taxing authorities to grant

exemptions from ad valorem taxes for water conservation initiatives.

Proposition 4: Would revise certain provisions in the state constitution that reflect changes in various national laws.

Proposition 5: Would allow Supreme Court cases to be heard in locations outside of Austin.

Proposition 6: Would remove the South African Investment Disclosure requirement from the Texas Growth Fund. (South Africans political changes have made this unnecessary).

Proposition 7: Would

consolidate \$1 billion in waterbonds and free \$77 million each year for loans to local communities to implement the State Water Plan.

Proposition 8: Would enable Texans to borrow money against the equity in their homes.

Proposition 9: Would permit Harris County fire district to increase taxes.

Proposition 10: Would dedicate crime victims compensation fund.

Proposition 11: Would limit to 5% the ratio of state department payable from the general revenue.

Proposition 12: Would set a 180 day deadline

for Supreme Court actions and motions for rehearing.

Proposition 13: Would grant full faith and credit backing to the Texas Tomorrow fund, the state's prepaid college tuition program.

Proposition 14: Would allow the Legislature to establish a set of qualifications for constables.

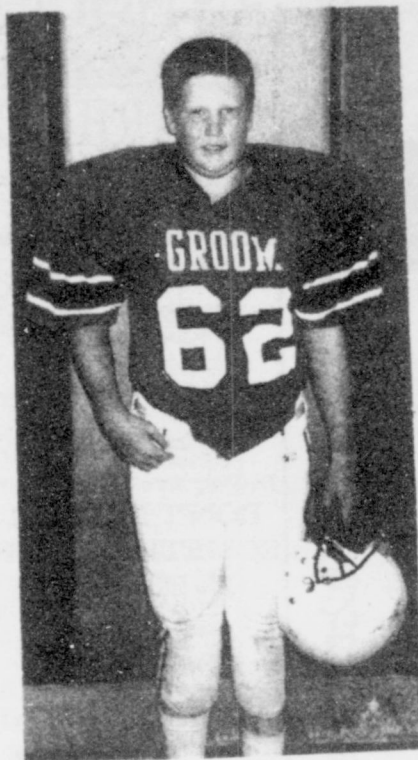

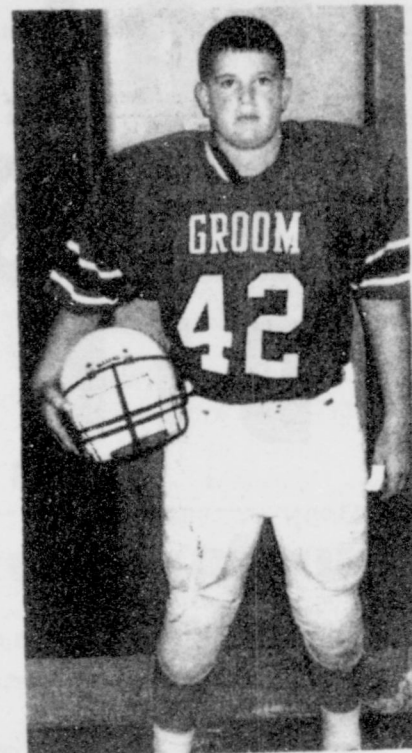

Mr. Tellman was born in Eugene, Missouri. He moved to Texas in the early 1950s. In 1961, he started building metal buildings, and in 1975, he started his own construction company called Nova Construction.

He married Betty Ann Koetting in 1961 at Amarillo. Betty Ann grew up in Groom and they often came back for local activities.

Mr. Tellman was a member of St. Hyacinth Catholic Church. He was a 3rd Degree Knight with the Knights of Columbus.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Lynne Tellman and Andrea Cochran, both of Amarillo; three sons, Kenn Tellman of Tyler, and Robert Tellman and Chris Tellman, both of Amarillo; four sisters, Jacqueline Newmann and

Wanita Bubliss, both of St. Louis, Bonnie Newmann of Hoffman Estates, Ill., and Loretta Colvin of Washington, Mo.; four brothers, Don Tellman of Darwin, Australia, Roger Tellman and Russell Tellman, both of Eugene, and Mike Tellman of Bloomington, Ill.; and eight grandchildren.

WD Polish Sausage Annual Festival Sun.

The Sacred Heart Parish of White Deer has scheduled its annual Polish Sausage Festival for Sunday, November 2, 1997, at the parish hall, one block east of Main Street, according to Carolyn Rapstine, publicity chairman. Serving time will be 11:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Tickets are \$6.00 for adults and \$3.50 for children.

The 1997 festival notes its 59th anniversary. This annual affair dates back to the summer of 1938, when the Rev. J.A. Zienta, a Polish priest, was pastor. The first sausage dinner was held in an open pasture north of White Deer and large black iron caldrons were used to steam the sausage. The rest of the food was prepared by the women in their homes. The meal was served on blank tables. An old family recipe was used which had been handed down for generations. Approximately 150 people were served. Today

more than 2,500 persons are served in a modern parish hall equipped with a modern kitchen and

barbecue pit. Today Alice Haiduk, Isabel Urbanczyk and their sons are the seasoning experts.

Some 5,000 pounds of Polish links will be made and served barbecued or steamed in the traditional Polish way. It will be accompanied by crisp slaw, red beans, potato salad, and apricots.

Take-out dinners, as well as, sausage-to-go will be available.

The proceeds from the festival are used for parish needs and charitable purposes.

White Deer is the only Polish oriented community in the Texas Panhandle. Sacred Heart Parish celebrated its 75th anniversary in 1988. "Roots of Faith," a historical book focusing on the Polish pioneers, was published to commemorate the celebration. The book will be on sale in the parlour where there will be a display of Polish roosters.





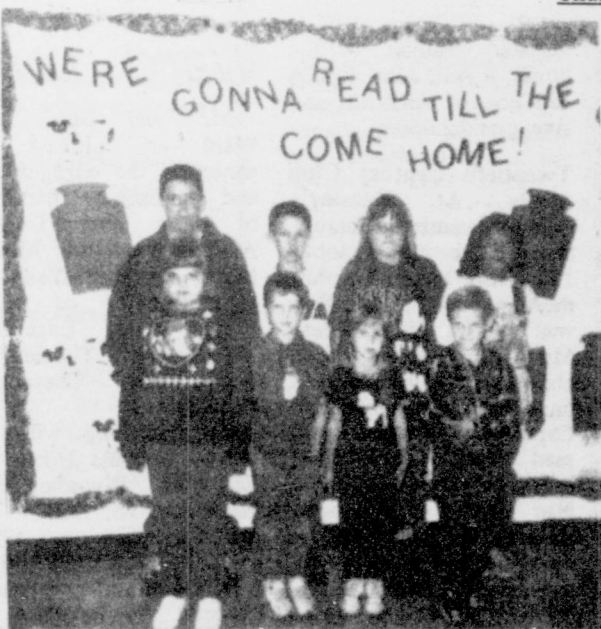
