Columbia To Open Rural Health Clinic In Groom

President of Groom Economic Development Corporation, Ben Ingham and Mayor Joe Homer recently announced that an agreement has been reached with Columbia Hospital to provide a Health Care Clinic in Groom.

Columbia Health Care Services, the largest in the country, are responsible for the hospital in Pampa as well as far reaching homecare services. Branch offices in this area include

Amarillo, Borger, Childress, Clarendon, Dalhart, Dumas and Pampa.

Officials say that they are hoping for an opening date sometime in late June. The Clinic needs very little in the way of renovations, although part of the agreement is to paint the walls. The main delay will be waiting for the Texas Department of Health to certify the clinic.

Columbia will keep the Groom Clinic open two days a week, with a qualified

Physician's Assistant or a Family Nurse Practitioner. Additional staff will include a Licensed Vocational Nurse and an office clerk. The care provided will be over seen by a physician, who will visit the clinic weekly. Some of the services provided will include:

- Medical histories and physical examinations.
- Diagnosing and treating common health problems.
- Treating and

monitoring chronic health problems such as diabetes and hypertension.

- Ordering and interpreting diagnostic studies such as lab work.
- Family planning services.
- Well child care, including screening and immunizations.
- Collaboration with physicians and other health care professionals.

New School Board Members Take Office

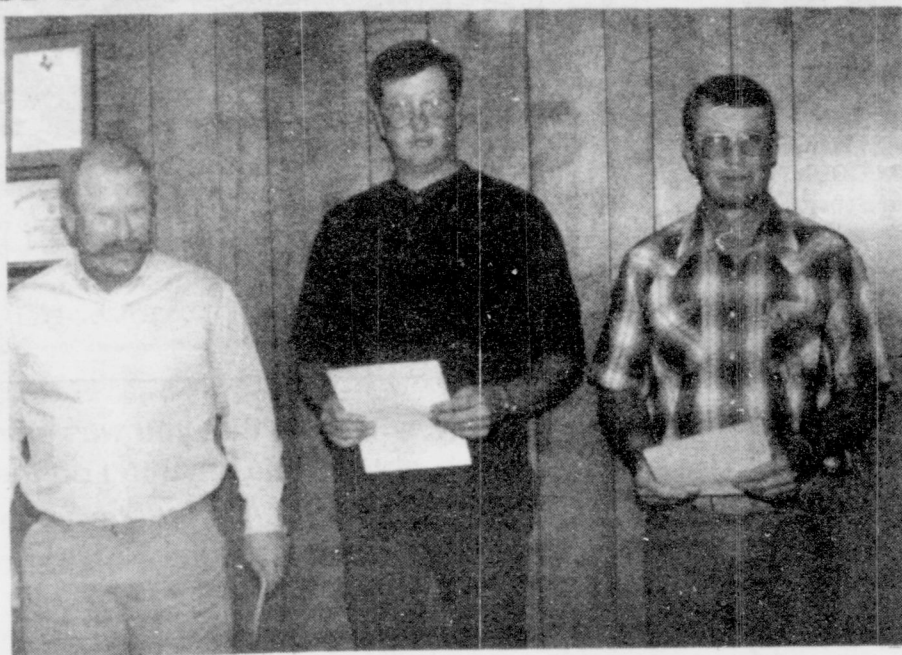
New members of the Groom School Board were sworn in last week in the regular session of the GISD board meeting.

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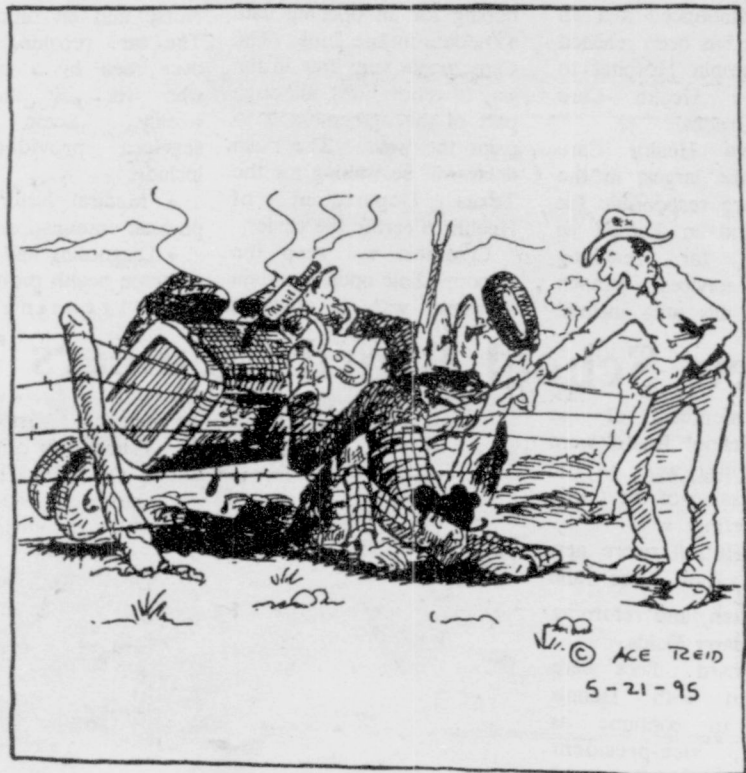

School Board

The board went into executive session at 9:20 pm to discuss personnel matters. They resumed open session at 10:17 pm.

The board agreed to accept the resignation of Donna Watson as a teacher's aide.

Trooper Davis Reports on Two Accidents On Farm To Markets

Well its been awhile since I've been able to write out the news. I've been to Ft. Davis, other places and I have not had time to write. Also, Donna told me to keep it short this week. For the month of April, Trooper Jeremy Wallace and myself, had a busy month. We made 205 traffic stops, which resulted in 150 citations, 96 warnings, 4 DWI arrests, and we worked 4 accidents. There were 3 misdemeanor criminal arrests and 2 Felony drug arrests.

On May the 14th, I worked two accidents. The first occurred in Hutchinson County north of Borger. Larry Turley of Borger was southbound on TX 136 at

9:35 a.m., when he fell asleep and ran off the road. The 1990 Chevrolet overturned onto its left side against a fence. Turley was issued a citation for Fail To Drive In A Single Lane. The second accident occurred at US 60 and FM 2373, the Pantex intersection, at 1:20 p.m. A 1995 Chevrolet pickup driven by Johnny Mann of Amarillo was setting in the crossover northbound. Mann pulled out and hit a westbound 1988 Ford driven by a Eva Nolan of Pampa. The driver and passenger in the Ford were taken to Northwest Texas Hospital by the Pantex ambulance. Mann was issued a citation for Fail To Yield Right Of Way - Yield Intersection.

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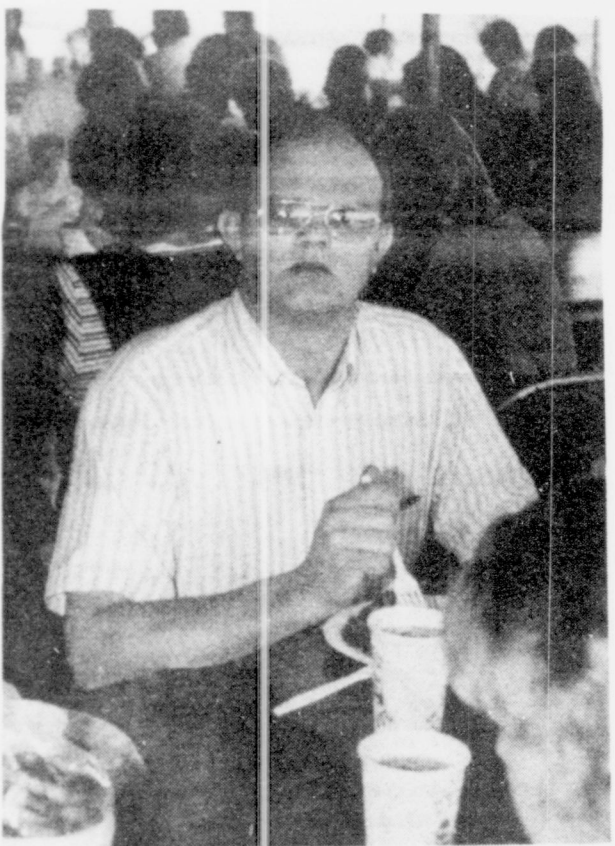
Justin Ritter and Stephanie Ollinger Are Named Fighting Tiger/Tigerette

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Columbia

Columbia has had a long-standing relationship with the community of Groom. According to their data, they have had 27 hospital admissions and 155 outpatients' visits at the hospital in 1995. Last year, they performed over 2,500 home health care visits in Groom.

Columbia accepts Medicare and Medicaid, along with many other Insurers. A few of them are Blue Cross, Texas Municipal League, MDPhysicians, AARP, IMS, American Medical Security, FirstHealth and Aetna/ProNet. They are currently negotiating with First Care to include clinical visits as they have an agreement with them concerning home care.

Other terms of the agreement include:

- The City of Groom will provide the utilities, with the exception of a phone which will be provided by Columbia.

- Columbia will use the

current furnishings and exam tables.

- General physical maintenance of the plant will be the responsibility of the City.

- Columbia will pay an annual lease of \$7,200 with a three year option.

Columbia estimates that the financial impact to Groom will be approximately \$230,000 over the next three years. If at all possible, they plan to hire locally and have their physician's assistant live in Groom.

Columbia Medical Center of Pampa offers a full range of comprehensive Medical Services. Some of them include: 24 hour Emergency Room, Computerized Tomography Scans, Day Surgery Units, Extended Care Unit, Laparoscopic Surgery, Laser Surgery, Lithotripsy, Magnetic/Resonance Imaging, Nuclear Medicine, Occupational Therapy, Obstetrics Unit, Pediatric Unit, Physical Therapy, Radiology, Respiratory Therapy, Speech Therapy and Ultrasound.

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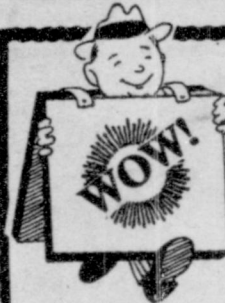
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
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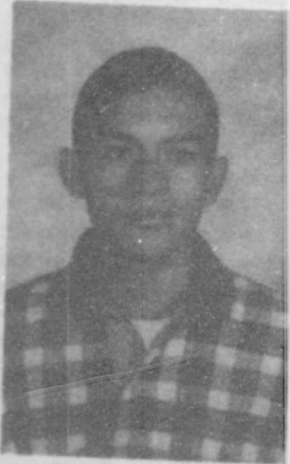

Memorial Day weekend is the gateway holiday to warm weather activities. There will be cookouts and campouts, swimming and fishing, hiking and biking. Nearly all of these will require traveling, whether it be a few blocks or several miles. The Texas Department of Public Safety urges motorists to take time to prepare for safe driving this holiday.

Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the D.P.S. Amarillo District offers the following safe driving tips: 1) Have the vehicle properly tuned; 2) Driver should be rested and alert; 3) Use safety belts properly, with the lap belt low and across the hip bone and the shoulder belt over the shoulder for maximum protection, and have safety seats firmly secured; 4) Use headlights day and night, it is as important to be seen as to see; 5) Drive at a safe speed, the faster we drive the greater risk of serious injury or death from a

wreck; 6) Develop a safe space zone, allowing two (2) seconds for the vehicle ahead to pass a certain place before you reach the same if you are in a car or pickup and four (4) or more seconds if in a larger vehicle; 7) Keep calm, don't let careless drivers rattle your composure and wreck your travel plans.

Snider reminds motorists that D.P.S. troopers along with officers from area agencies will be out this holiday weekend watching for errant drivers and motorists needing assistance. Snider adds that if a motorist needs assistance in a remote area and has access to a telephone that they may call toll free #800-252-5555 for assistance. When calling this number, please give as accurate location information as possible, such as road number or name, last town driven through, direction of travel and what assistance is needed. If it is an emergency, Snider recommends calling #911 with the same information.

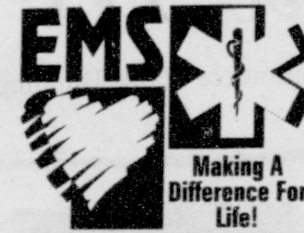

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Elderly Legal Assistance A Growing Concern To Texans

Elder Law: A Growing Field

As your Attorney General, I have been increasingly involved in issues that affect senior Texans: the quality of long-term care, the prosecution of elder abuse, Medicaid fraud control, and consumer fraud that targets elders. I believe we owe our senior citizens respect, protection and the highest standard of care.

In the private sector, the legal profession has seen the emergence of a new specialty: elder law. Elder law differs from traditional legal specialties in which the lawyer focuses on one body of law (taxes, insurance, criminal law, etc.). Instead, the practice of elder law covers all potential specialties that affect one particular group of people - senior citizens - many of whom live on a fixed income.

If you are a senior Texan, or if you are concerned about an elderly friend or family member, perhaps you have considered hiring an attorney. The following information may help you to decide whether an elder law specialist would be right for you.

Why is this new field growing?

In part, the growth mirrors changes in our population. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 33 million Americans are now over age 65, or roughly 13 percent of the nation's population. The fastest growing segment of this group is people over age 85. According to a report by the U.S. Senate Committee on Aging, nearly half of all senior citizens will spend time in a nursing home. While many of these stays are brief, such as for recovery after surgery, many others involve long-term residence.

The field of elder law covers a wide and growing range of topics. In addition to their tradition work in probate, wills, and trust and estate planning, elder law specialists are now involved in such diverse areas as:

- planning for disability or incapacity through living wills, living trusts, and durable power of attorney documents.
- establishing eligibility for Social Security, Medicare and Medicaid benefits.
- long-term care, including patients' rights, quality of care, and long-term care insurance.
- elder fraud and abuse.
- grandparents' visitation rights.
- age discrimination at work.

• housing problems (mortgages, housing discrimination, etc.)

• conservatorship and guardianships.

• retirement and pension benefits.

Should you retain an elder law specialist?

Begin by asking if you have a problem that requires the services of an attorney, or if in fact you have a social services or medical question. If you are not sure, ask a trusted friend, your clergy, or a social worker for advice. You may also call the Legal Hotline for Older Texans at (800) 622-2520 for a free over-the-phone consultation. Staff at the Legal Hotline can help you decide whether your problem merits retaining the services of an attorney.

Ask for referrals from local senior citizen groups, your clergy, other attorneys, and social service agencies. While the State Bar of Texas does not certify elder law specialists, its lawyer referral service (800-252-9690) will provide you with the names of attorneys in your area for your consideration.

Before retaining an attorney, ask for references, and check them out thoroughly. Ask how much experience the attorneys have, and about the aspects of elder law that they regularly deal with. Ask about the fee you will be charged.

Senior citizens share common concerns: quality of life and control over their affairs as they grow older, the threat of serious illness and steep medical bills, maintaining an adequate income, and safeguarding the interests of loved ones.

Unfortunately, most of us cannot know which of these concerns will be the biggest challenge we face in old age. Many elder law attorneys report that clients come to them during times of crisis. It is wise to plan as far ahead as possible before the need arises.

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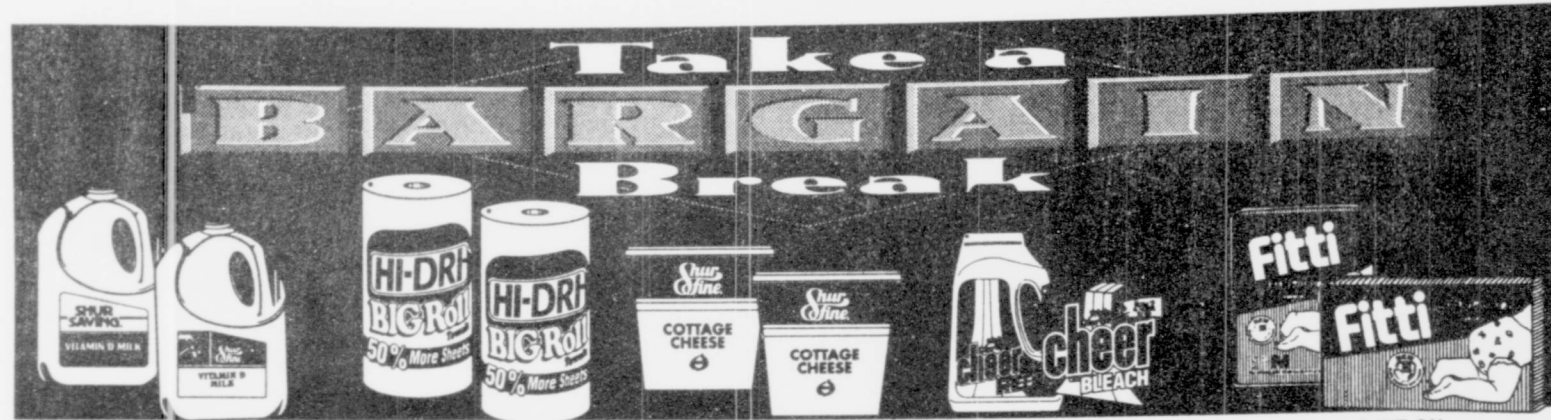
