A decision of the United States Supreme Court has invalidated state laws which require more than 30 days residency in the state or locality in order to be eligible to vote.

Persons who have resided in the state and locality for 30 days and have been registered for 30 days prior to the election in which they wish to vote are now eligible to vote Boosters To in state and local elections. Persons entering the state may register to vote immediately upon their arrival.



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



Woodson said that U.S. Department of Agriculture statistics prove that the farmer's gain in efficiency has helped keep food costs in check. He cited the following facts released by USDA:

-- The American farmer produces over 20 percent more on seven percent fewer acres than he did in the period 1957-59.
