

Southwest Conference Basketball Race Has Drawn 7,000 More Than Last Year

DALLAS, Jan. 27. (AP)—Southwest Conference basketball, past the half-way mark of the 1948 campaign, has drawn 90,068 spectators in 34 home games, an increase of more than 7,000 over the same period last year.

Most of the gain, however, is because more games have been played. Last season there were 30 at this stage of the campaign. The 1948 average is higher, however. The 34 games have averaged 2,649 against 2,433 for 1947.

Every school except Texas shows a gain. The reason for the fall-off there is that one fewer game has been played. The biggest increase is by Rice with 13,000 for seven games this year.

Rice and Texas Christian are the only schools able to handle all who want to see the games. That is because they play in downtown coliseums.

There are no more facilities this year for caring for basketball fans to bring relief. Feb. 7, 50 ex-students will meet in Austin to discuss building a coliseum seating 20,000. The present gymnasium takes care of 7,500.

The saturation point has been reached in Southwest Conference basketball attendance and until larger gyms are built there will be no marked increases.

CUPID IN STATE HOUSE Two Governors Are Newlyweds

LONDON, Jan. 27. (AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin has begun talks with Arab leaders on Middle East problems, including what British government sources said is a program for an anti-communist security system in the Arab world.

The informants expressed belief that Bevin's fear of Soviet ambitions in the Middle East would supersede Jewish-Arab problems in Palestine.

They said Bevin is trying to set up a bulwark against the effects on the Suez canal of a possible guerrilla victory in Greece, and on British-American supremacy in the Mediterranean.

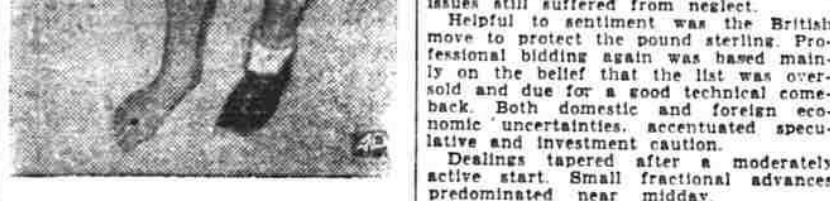
The sources said the move was part of a plan evolved by the British foreign office and the American state department.

First step, they said, was revision of the British Iraq treaty arranged earlier this month. That treaty, signed but not ratified, has been all but repudiated by Iraq.

Current talks with Trans-Jordan leaders represent the second step. Bevin's Middle East advisors also are reported planning talks on possible new British treaties with Saudi Arabia and Yemen.

Informants also said a resumption of the ruptured British-Egyptian treaty revision negotiations is imminent.

A British air ministry spokesman said U. S. military planes will be allowed to land at British Mediterranean bases.

U. N. Studies Information Freedom Ideas

LAKE SUCCESS, Jan. 27. (AP)—Clashing conceptions of freedom of information came up for airing today in the United Nations.

A sub-commission on freedom of information and of the press meets today to begin its long-anticipated attempt to write a short statement on the meaning of freedom of information.

Members of the sub-commission who are classed as "experts" by the U. N., agreed that the discussion, carried over from last spring, would be a preview of the world conference in Geneva March 23 on freedom of information.

The principal opposing conceptions were those of Soviet Russia and of the western nations.

The sub-commission cleared the way late yesterday for what its chairman, G. J. Van Heuven Goedhart, of the Netherlands, called its "historic debate". It refused to write into the press section of a proposed covenant on human rights any ban on race discrimination and monopolies.

Y. M. Lomakin, of Russia, reintroduced his proposal to commit the world press to a struggle against fascism, which has been repeatedly defeated in the sub-commission.

The security council was in recess. India and Pakistan tried to find some ground for settling their conflict over Kashmir. The delegates arranged to confer with Ferdinand Van Langenhove, of Belgium, council president, in his Manhattan office today.

The question of a Jewish militia for Palestine was before the five-member U. N. Palestine partition commission.

Albania filed a series of protests charging Greek violations of her border. The documents, dated Jan. 15, 21, 23 and 24, said Greek artillery shells, mortar shells and machinegun bullets had been fired into Albania.

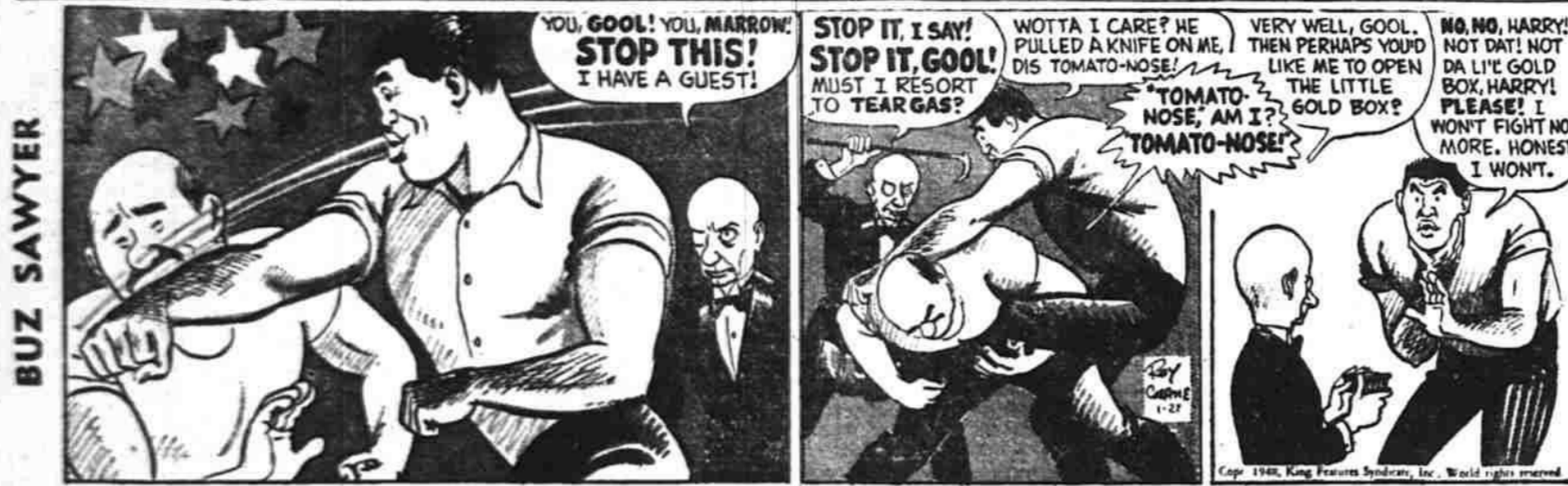

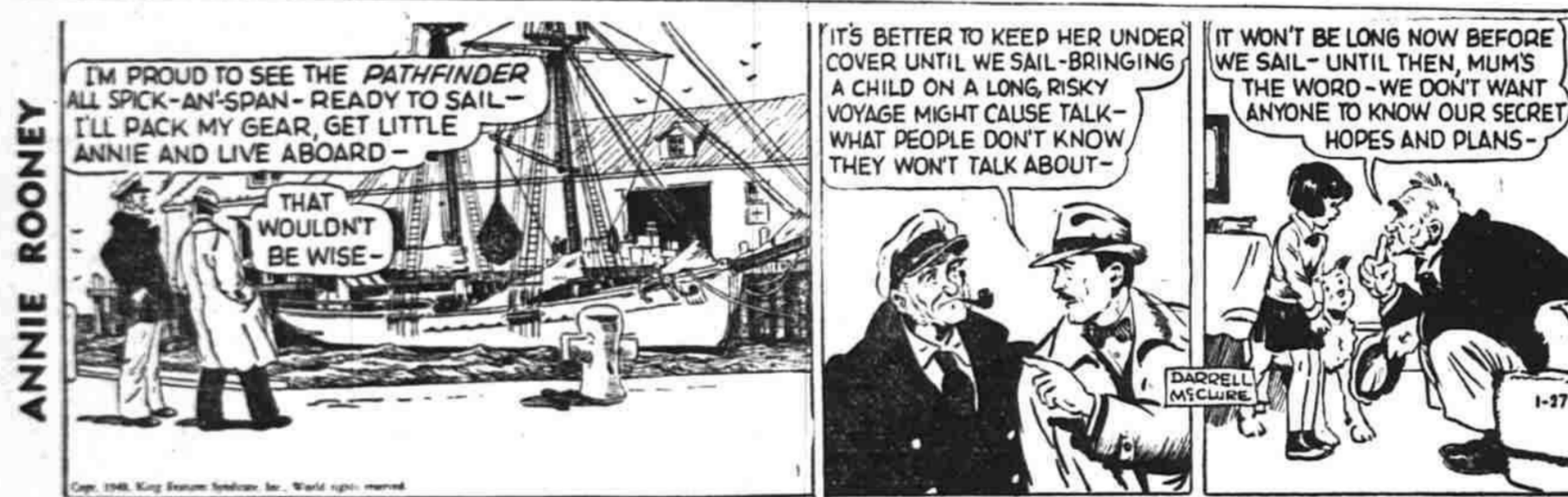

WITH THUMB-PRINTS Navajos Express Thanks For Aid

GOULDING'S POST, Monument Valley, Utah, Jan. 26. (AP)—A thumb-print-signed letter, expressing in simple, moving language the gratitude of a "nation without a nation," came today from tribal leaders addressed to the thousands of generous American who in recent weeks have sent food and clothing for needy Navajo Indians.

"The Navajos want their names on a paper," the letter said, "to send thanks to our Belacana (white) friends that heard about our hunger and cold and sent food and clothing from away off. It is very good with us. We will not forget this kindness."

The letter closed with a traditional blessing: "May you ride in beauty, may you live in beauty."

Beneath that parting wish a succession of blue inked thumbprints moved down the page like seals on an international treaty, each print the signature of a Navajo leader.

Red Critical Of Allies' Rule Of Japanese

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26. (AP)—Soviet Ambassador Alexander S. Panyushkin is critical of the job the Allies are doing to prevent a rebirth of militarism in defeated Japan.

The new Russian envoy told a reporter in his first formal interview here that he wants to draw serious attention to the record of the 11-nation far eastern commission in promoting democracy in Japan.

"In this regard the situation can not be considered as satisfactory," he said.

In addition to his duties as Ambassador Panyushkin also serves as Russian representative on the commission which supervises allied occupation policy toward Japan.

His criticism was interpreted by diplomatic officials as the possible prelude to a full-fledged Russian attack within the commission against the policies carried out by General Douglas MacArthur.

Replying in person to a series of questions submitted in writing by this reporter 24 days earlier, Panyushkin also struck out at what he considers discrimination by the United States government against Soviet-American trade. He said this is something "certain circles" in the United States are trying to develop.

"As far as the Soviet Union is concerned," he asserted, "it has never refused the development of trade with the United States on condition of normal business practice."

But, he added, American government trade agencies are applying controls "of a discriminatory character" to trade with the Soviet Union.

Episcopal Group Votes Limited Segregation Code

AUSTIN, Jan. 27. (AP)—Segregation of whites and Negroes in certain phases of Church work—in line with the present policy—was voted in effect here yesterday by the 99th council of the Episcopal diocese of Texas.

The council went into the third and last day of its annual session today. Delegates from 57 counties are attending.

It also voted yesterday to reject a proposal that would have allowed women to serve as council delegates.

The racial question stirred up considerable heated discussion and the council by voice vote adopted the report of its bi-racial commission, directing it to continue its work.

The report placed the responsibility of the segregation or non-segregation of whites and Negroes at council social functions on the host parishes. Members said there is no differentiation in Church worship and business sessions.

The commission also recommended that "until the council may deem otherwise, that camping and any other youth activities, except strictly business or worship sessions, be conducted separately by races."

A substitute resolution by Charles A. Shaw, lay delegate from Houston, said that in the Church there is "no place for bigotry, intolerance, segregation, discrimination or the philosophy of racial superiority."

Used Car Man Fined \$750 For Overcharge

FORT WORTH, Jan. 27. (AP)—T. W. Henry, Stephenville used car dealer, was assessed \$750 and court costs in an OPA-investigated overcharge case.

Henry allegedly over-charged Kenneth Kelly, a veteran and John Tarleton College student, on a 1939 model automobile.

Judgment in the case was awarded the government, which brought the case instead of Kelly.
