

The 80-year-old Texas ballad hunter died in a hospital here

last night. A heart attack last Friday cheated him of the first public appearance in his native state and last night he came to the end of the trail his cowboy bal-

lads foretold. A 39-year-hunt for the ballads of America took Lomax into every walk of life

A drunken Negro saloonkeeper in San Antonio, sang to him the wistful dream of "Home on the Range," and cowboys, prisoners, mountain folk and field hands told him of their loves, sorrows and hopes in the ballads that filled seven world-famed books. At his bedside when he died were his wife and sons. Alan, and John, Jr. Allan gained fame singing the ballads his father found.

The first collection he published, "Cowboy Songs", in 1910, contained some which have become famous.

"Home on the Range" was the

a musical tribute to the old West. It was the songs of the range that Lomax loved first and best. But he took his old-fashioned Edison recording machine into jails, cotton fields, wherever people sang ballads. On the banks of the Mississippl

one night he heard Negroes sing: "No more, my Lord, no more. "I'll never turn back no more." In the Texas state prison he met two Negro singers-Clear Rock and Iron Head. From Clear Rock came "Dats Allright, Honey". Iron Head sang about the

"Grey Goose." When he started collecting ballads in 1909, most cowboys refused to sing for him. They didn't like the big horn of his recording

machine they had to face. A beggar who faked blindness once took Lomax home with him. There in a small Fort Worth residence the beggar's wife sang 'Git Along, Little Dogies."

Lomax started writing down the songs he heard from here and there when a small boy. A professor at the University of Texas once told him they were trashy and cheap.

A fellowship from Harvard University had enabled him to start to collecting the songs.





### U. N. Studies Information Freedom Ideas

LAKE SUCCESS, Jan. 27. A-Clashing conceptions of freedom of information came up for airing today in the United Nations.

A sub-commission on freedom of information and of the press meets today to begin its long-anticipated attempt to write a short statement on the meaning of freedom of information.

Members of the sub-commission who are classed as "experts" by the U. N., agreed that the discussion, carried over from last spring, would be a preview of the world conference in Geneva March 23 on freedom of information. The principal opposing concep-

tions were those of Soviet Russia and of the western nations. The sub-commission cleared the way late yesterday for what its

chairman, G. J. Van Heuven Goedhart, of the Netherlands, called its "historic debate". It refused to write into the press section of a proposed covenant on human rights any ban on race discrimination and monopolies.

Y. M. Lomakin, of Russia, reintroduced his proposal to commit the world press to a struggle against fascism, which has been repeatedly defeated in the subcommission.

The security council was in recess. India and Pakistan tried to find some ground for settling their conflict over Kashmir. The delegates arranged to confer with Fernand Van Langenhove, of Belgium. council president, in his Manhattan office today.

The military, the industrial heads, the former service pilots-all have spoken out in bold tributes to the report. On this score, it might be surmised that it is all things to all men, and that almost every division sees in it pretty close to what it has sought.

Here are some of the highlights of the report, drafted by a board composed 80 per cent of laymen: That airpower is the most important arm for defense and offense.. that our air forces should be built up to a position of world leadership ("a second-best air force, when war takes place, is almost as bad as none") that more money needs to be expended in research; that the commercial air transport system needs strengthening and support; that the air industry needs to be developed to twothirds of its output in 1945, and that procurement needs to be placed on a five-year, instead of a one-year, basis; that there needs to be nearly 7,000 first line craft in the regular air force, 3,200 in an air national guard, plus a 34-group air reserve.

Perhaps most economy of preparedness could be achieved in the aeronautical field, but the field also is susceptible to recurring and rapid loss while it is in a transitory state. For instance, the five-year purchase program makes sense - and it doesn't. Considerably less than five years ago we thought the B-29 was the penultimate in heavy bombers; today it is junk material. The problem is to keep an ample supply of front line craft and personnel, while bearing down constantly in research to give us a tremendous qualitative edge to offset any quantitative advantage which might occur elsewhere.

### Eisenhower Takes A Bold Course

General Ike Eisenhower has rather positively and effectively removed his name from political speculation.

Overnight the "Ike for President" boom has collapsed. In its place there is a mild revival of the "MacArthur for President" movement. In a sense, both have been advanced as possibilities because of their popularity as military leaders. In times of stress, there is always a segment-sometimes a major segment - which reasons that the strong hand of a military man is needed as the top administrator.

The removal of his name from the arena of speculation by General Eisenhower about snuffs the possibility of a military figure as a major party candidate, for "Ike" carried considerably more personal popularity with the rank and file, both civilian and military, than any other figure which might be injected into the campaign.

Because he definitely would have been accorded a good chance of election, the general's plain statement has had the effect of raising him in public esteem. It is not easy to remove one's self as a candidate for such a high honor, and, as the general said, it is all the more difficult to phrase such a statement without violating the concept of availability for duty in any

Palestine's Future—Max Harrelson

### Tests To Decide Partition's Fate

First of a series of articles on the partition of Palestine-

THE UNITED NATIONS soon will face the first of a series of tests which will indicate success or failure of the plan to partition Palestine. When the General Assembly

adjounred last Nov. 29 after adjourned last Nov. 29. after left a blueprint for a new Palestine. Implementation of the plan was left for 1948. The current strife in the Holy

Land was foreseen by Arabs, Jews, British and by most of those who supported the plan to carve Palestine into separate Arab and Jewish countries. Problem Anticipated

When the Assembly acted, it had before it a warning from the U. N. Special Committee on Palestine (UNSCOP) that "enforcement measures on an extensive scale may be necessary for some time."

The big questions to be answered in 1948 are: How far will the strife go? Will Britain adhere to the transition timetable set

by the U. N.? Can the Arabs be forced to co-operate? Will the U. N. take adequate enforcement measures?

The two new countries are scheduled to become sovereign independent nations by Oct. 1, but much must be done before then. British evacuation must be completed, provisional governments established, security forces set up and an economic union formed to insure a stable economy in the Holy Land. So far only a few steps have

been taken. The five-nation U. N. commission which will help set up the new regimes was called together for its first planning sessions, starting Jan. 9 at Lake Success. A six-nation sub-committee of the trusteeship council has be-

gun work on a provisional statute for Jerusalem to be administered by the council as an international zone outside the new Jewish and Arab countries. The Jewish Agency for Palestine has been planning for the

provisional government of the new Jewish nation and for increased immigration as provided by the partition plan.

And Britain has announced it would terminate its 25-year-old League of Nations mandate by May 15 and would complete withdrawal from the Holy Land by Aug. 1.

The Arab Threat Meanwhile, the Arabs have made no move to set up a provisional government or to help form the proposed economic union. On the contrary, they have

promised a struggle to the end against the partition plan. This raises the vital question: How can the U. N. enforce partition? The program approved by the Assembly made no provisions for enforcement, despite warnings that force would be needed to put partition into effect.

This is certain to be a major issue before the U. N. Top U. N. officials agree that as long as the Palestine mandate remains in effect Britain will be responsible for maintaining order. But once the British pull out there is nothing to prevent U. N. intervention.

# Hoover Forgets Bull Market

WASHINGTON-When Herbert Hoover laid his large and dampening hand on the Marshall Plan last week, it caused a chorus of "I-told-you-sos" from certain people in and around the White House. These were the gentlemen who opposed Harry Truman's Republican appeasement policy and warned that where Herbert Hoover is concerned political oil and water do not mix.

Aside from this palace-guard debate, however, Mr. Hoover's testimony against the Marshall Plan recalled even more important facts. It high-lighted the ever deepening split inside the Republican party between the Taft isolationists and the Vandenberg interventionists-a split which is becoming just as deep and just as fundamental as between the northern and southern wings of the Democratic party.

It also recalled what so many people-perhaps even Mr. Hoover himself-may have forgotten that it was the Kredit Anstalt in distant Vienna which caused Mr. Hoover in 1931 to put up his first storm-warning of approaching world-wide depression, and that it was the withdrawal

In other words, it was the pumping of American money into Europe and Latin America by American bankers that heightened and prolonged the boom days which followed World War I. And it was the sudden drying up of that credit that accelerated the bust. Mr. Hoover only needs refer to his statement of June 20, 1931, declaring a moratorium on European debt payments to WILL HISTORY REPEAT?

And since history so often repeats-unless herculean steps are taken to prevent repetition-it's important to review some of our now pretty well forgotten financial history and the differences between the European pumppriming of 1921-31 and the Marshall Plan. First, let it be remembered

that the Marshall Plan calls for careful, supervised spending in Europe under the nose of Amer-

ican experts. It also provides that no money shall be loaned until a hard-and-fast agreement is signed between the United States and the country which gets the money. This agreement

will specify what is to be done

with the money. It will also make

certain that money is spent on projects which go into permanent peacetime reconstruction. Finally, the Marshall Plan calls for the building up of allied western Europe, while the pell-mell rush to lend Europe money during the "golden era" of the 1920's largely benefited an enemy state, Germany.

The detailed story of how tonly this money was squandered has been told in the hearings of various congressional committees, including the Pecora banking probe and the Nye munitions investigation. It is the story of American dollars, collected by U. S. bankers from an unsuspecting public, and then used to buy pistols, hand grenades and even knives for Hitler's aiready stirring gunmen.

The story shows that swimming pools, public parks, all sorts of other luxuries were lavished upon Germany at the expense of the unsuspecting American investor.

BUILT HITLER'S MACHINE Much more important, the big German steel plants, which Hitler later turned into the most efficient war machine in Europe, all were built up by millions of American investors-the chief money-raiser for Germany being the same man who now heads our national defense department -James Forrestal.

In Latin America also, loans were sometimes rammed down the throats of unsuspecting nations such as the \$100,000,000 loan by the national city bank of Peru, which was floated after the son of President Juan B. Leguia received a fat bribe; or, again, the Dillon, Read loan to Bolivia to finance the Chaco war. floated only after the minister of finance received a bribe.

All in all, a total of \$15 billions was loaned to Europe and Latin America during the boom days following World War I. And it remains an incontestable economic fact that our domestic prosperity was synthetically buoyed up by sending our own money abroad to finance our own exports. In other words, our exports were largely "gifts." It is likewise true that after

every war, reconstruction money pours into needy countries. It can be a good risk, such as some of the European money that came into the United States after our civil war-though even that was partially defaulted. Or it can be a bad risk, such as the money we put into Germany and Latin America after World War I. Or It can be a carefully calculated reconstruction risk, such as the Marshall Plan, in which the U. S. figures in advance that its money will not come back in actual cash, but may come back in long-time dividends through a more stable Europe and the avoidance of another war.

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
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
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

### **Red Critical** Of Allies' Rule Of Japanese

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26. 49-Soviet Ambassador Alexander S Panyushkin is critical of the job the Allies are doing to prevent a rebirth of militarism in defeated Japan.

The new Russian envoy told a reporter in his first formal interview here that he wants to draw serious attention to the record of the 11-nation far eastern commission in promoting democracy in

"In this regard the situation can not be considered as satisfactory,' he said.

In addition to his duties as Ambassador Panyushkin also serves as Russian representative on the commission which supervises allied occupation policy toward Japan.

His criticism was interpreted by diplomatic officials as the possible prelude to a full-fledged Russian attack within the commission against the policies carried out by General Douglas MacArthur.

Replying in person to a series of questions submitted in writing by this reporter 24 days earlier, Panyushkin also struck out at what he considers discrimination by the United States government against Soviet-American trade. He said this is something "certain circles" in the United States are trying to develop.

"As far as the Soviet Union is concerned," he asserted, "it has never refused the development of trade with the United States on condition of normal business prac-
