Students Make Presentations To McLean ISD Board Of Trustees

Students from classes made presentations to the McLean School. Board last week, in conjunction with field trips and other programs.

Will Frost and Brad Sawyer gave a very impressive presentation of their new class called Math with Models, which is being taught by Mrs. Woodard. Students use mathematical methods to model and solve real-life applied problems involving money, data, chance, patterns, music, design and science. chance, patterns, music, design and science. Students use mathematical models from algebra, geometry, probability and statistics and connections among these to solve problems from a wide variety of advanced applications in both mathematical and non-mathematical situations. students used a The The students used a variety of representations, tools and technology to link modeling techniques and purely mathematical concepts and to solve applied problems. The

students learned to do problem-solving, language and communication and Mrs. and communication and reasoning. Mrs. Woodards' class used the TIKS objectives to make formulas of data compiled graphs, to figure the standard deviation of the 2nd grade Reading comission. grade Reading equivalency. This project was done by collecting the data needed and using their computer technology to prepare graphs of all types for displaying the results. Mrs. Woodard taught six chulents for a total of students for a total of nine weeks, and she, as well as, the Board was very pleased by the very pleased by the outcome of the Math with Models class.

Brice Ruthardt Recieves Master's At West Texas A&M


Congratulations to Brice Ruthardt. He recently received his Masters of Science Degree from West Texas A&M University. His degree specializes in Wildlife Biology.
