The City Council and the present members of the McLean Economic Development Corp. feel that the one-half cent sales tax that is presently being collected for the 4a could be used so much more effectively for the community as a whole if it were being used under direction of the 4b guidelines.

facilities, streets, roads, water and sewer facilities, and commercial facilities. The 4b can be used for nearly anything that a small town might want or need to improve and will be more feasible for our purposes.

To be able to adopt

the 4b tax, the 4a tax has to be abolished and the 4b adopted in its stead. There is also one draw back on the 4b tax and that is that the board of directors has to have seven members instead of the required five members on the 4a.

Amarillo, Texas-The three Panhandle of Texas Silver-Haired Legislators (TSHL) are busy informing their constituents of the priorities passed in their September 2000 Legislative Session. Then ten top priorities are being sponsored by various State Senators and Representatives.

Veteran Representative serving her ninth year as a TSHL is Nikki Gatlin, 5006 Yale, Amarillo, Texas 79109, (806) 353-2460. First term co-workers are: Mary Latham, 11740 Jim Drive, Amarillo, TX 79124, (806) 352-7977 and Bill Reeves, P.O. Box 429, McLean, TX 79057, (806) 779-2979.

The Number 1 priority is Senate Bill-SB 535 and companion House Bill-HB 1421, which are Bills to retain the Texas Department on Aging as a single department. If these do not pass, Bills already enacted last session will become law in 2003 and they will then merge TDOA with the Department of Human Services. We know the departments are each very large now, serving many persons and the thought is if merged, the two groups would become unwieldy and services for each group would be diluted and delayed until the services would be insufficient and come after it is too late to benefit the client.

The other Bills are for

"Prescription Drugs for Seniors." Senate Bill-SB 556 and House Bill-HB 1231 would let Medicare recipients buy prescription drugs at the Medicaid price would be considerably less.

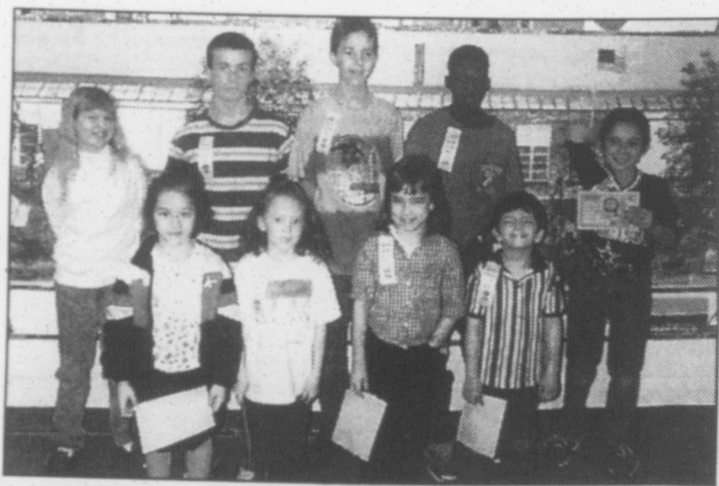
Girl Scouts learn many things from cookie sales including marketing, team work, budgeting, and responsibility.

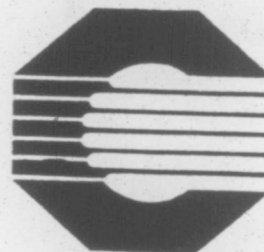

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### McLean's Hohensee Wins Recipe Contest

The "Texas Co-op Power" magazine recently held a recipe contest and the winners were announced in the February issue. Scott Hohensee from the McLean area and a wildlife biologist for TR Land and Cattle won in the chocolate category with his recipe for Texas Doodle Pie.

Scott received a copy of "The Second Typically Texas Cookbook" and an assortment of McCormick seasonings.

The recipe for Texas Doodle Pie is as follows:

**Crust:**  
6 tablespoons or 3/4 stick melted butter  
1 1/2 cups graham cracker crumbs  
1 tablespoon sugar

**Fudge Layer:**  
1/2 cup flour  
3/4 teaspoon baking powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
6 ounces semisweet chocolate (chopped)  
10 tablespoon butter  
1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar  
2 eggs  
1 egg yolk  
1 1/4 teaspoons vanilla extract

2 1/1 cups Snickers, chopped (about 12 ounces)  
**Cream Cheese Layer:**  
12 ounces cream cheese  
1/2 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract

**Ganache:**  
1/2 cup heavy cream  
8 ounces milk chocolate, chopped  
Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Make crust by

melting butter and adding to crumbs and sugar. Mold into 10-inch round, parchment lined cake pan that has been sprayed with Pam.

For the fudge layer, sift dry ingredients and set aside. Melt chocolate with butter and set aside. Beat sugar, eggs, and vanilla. Add chocolate mixture onto crust and bake until almost set up (about 15 minutes). Remove from heat and add chopped Snickers pieces.

To make cream cheese layer, mix cream cheese and sugar and then add egg and vanilla. Top pie with cream cheese mixture and bake until cream cheese is set. About 15 minutes.

Let cook. Make ganache by bringing cream to a boil. Add chocolate and let slightly thicken. Top cream cheese layer with ganache. Cool. Serve cold.

Malorie Homen placed 2nd in Health and Medicine. Javier Caro was 2nd in Botany. Katy Britten was 2nd in Environmental Science.

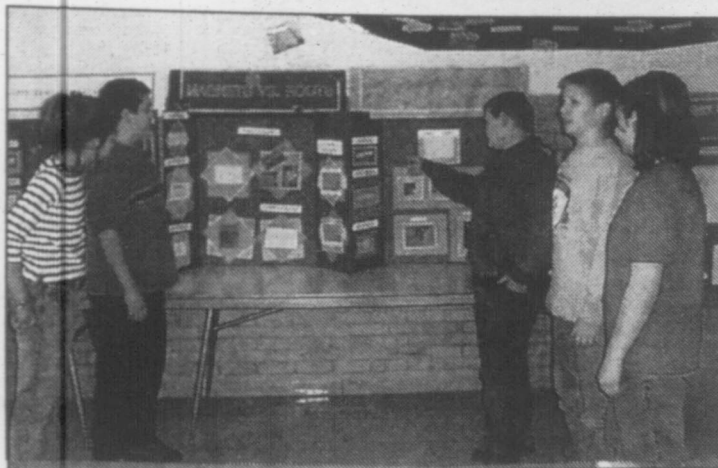
Carter Wilson earned the Peace Farm Award.

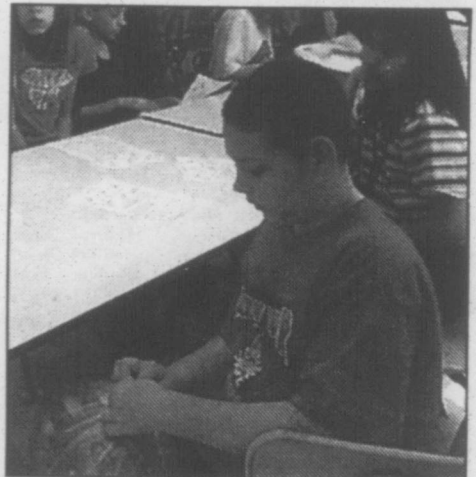
Kindergarten through fifth grade students were demonstrated proper hand signals and traffic signs. A video was shown to the group demonstrating bike safety.

## Groom ISD Earns Money For Being Exemplary

Monetary awards in the amount of \$1267 were made to Groom Independent School District as part of the Texas Successful Schools Award System (TSSAS). John Wilson, superintendent of the Groom Independent School District, announced today.

The schools are being recognized for gains in student performance on indicators that are part of the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS), more commonly known as the state's school report card. The Groom ISD schools are among 552 cash-winning schools statewide receiving awards for:

1. Exemplary recognized, or acceptable performance.
2. A ranking in the top 25 percent of all campuses in the same unique comparison group statewide, with respect to growth on the Texas Learning Index (TLI) derived from the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) reading and mathematics test given at Grades 3

through 8, and 10.

3. A campus exemption rate in TAAS reading, math, and writing for special education students and for Limited English Proficient (LEP) students that was not deemed excessive.

The awards are based on spring 2000 performance on the TAAS test, which measure performance in reading, writing, and mathematics. Schools also had to meet performance standards for dropout and attendance rates.

Cash awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 per school were given, depending on the number of students served at school. In the exemplary category, schools had at least 90 percent of all students and students in each student population group (White, African American, Hispanic, and Economically Disadvantaged) passing each section of the TAAS, a 1998-99 dropout rate of 1 percent or less for all students and each student group,

and a 1998-99 attendance rate of 94 percent or greater.

In the recognized category, schools had at least 80 percent of all students and those in each student group passing each section of the TAAS, a dropout rate of 3.5 percent or less for all students and each student group, and an attendance rate of at least 94 percent.

TSSAS award recipients had to rank in the top 25 percent of all campuses that are in the same unique comparison group statewide, with respect to their growth in student performance in reading and math. Campus categories are based on several factors including the percent of students identified as African American, Hispanic, White, Economically Disadvantaged, Limited English Proficient, and Mobile.

In addition, if the campus exemption rate in any subject area of the TAAS test was greater than the exemption rates of 75 percent of all

campuses in at least one subject area, the campus was eliminated from the list of possible winners.

A total of 2.5 million is being awarded to schools this year under TSSAS.

## No Action Taken On War Building Fees

On February 26, 2001, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Carson County, Texas met in pursuant to adjournment with the members and officers present. Present were Hon. Lewis W. Powers, County Judge; Mike Britten, Commissioner, precinct 1; Kenneth Ware, Commissioner, precinct 2; Jerry Strawn, Commissioner, precinct 3; Kevin Howell, Commissioner, precinct 4. The minutes were read and approved.

A motion was passed to pay all claims.

Committee Members Joyce Hoffman and Dixie Surratt met with the court to discuss costs for upkeep of the War Memorial Building. Current rules state that no charge can be applied for use of the 50-year-old building. The structure is currently maintained by donations and dues from the Lion's Club, Rotary Club, and 55+ Club. The county pays all utilities, insurance, and extensive maintenance projects.

The court discussed the possibility of requiring a deposit for usage, with part or all of the payment being returned once the building has been inspected. No decisive action was taken at this court date.

Tax Assessor-Collector Barbara Cosper petitioned the court to amend that office's budget due to bond schedules all

coming due in this budget year. The tax assessor-collector and her 2 deputies all renew their bonds this year with the county, along with the tax assessor's bond with the state. Commissioner made the motion to amend the budget by \$1645 to cover the premiums. The motion was passed.

The court approved a security release from State National Bank for the amount of \$300,000.00. The motion was passed to release receipt #420029799 and replace it with cusp #3133M5QB9.

Judge Powers discussed the replacement of heating and air conditioning systems for the courthouse. The court will look into the possibility of hiring an engineer to study all bases and liabilities that the county could encounter as specs are written and the job awarded to replace the 50-year-old units. The court will meet again on March 12, 2001.

I began to wonder... Grandview has a lot of money.... Groom has none. Although at opposite ends of the spectrum, both are subject to the whims of the legislature. At any given time one careless bill, could put us both out of business (remember the Robin Hood Plan).

Maybe it is time a discussion of this nature occurs. After all

Grandview and Groom are pretty much family. It makes sense to me that these two schools help each other in order to stay in business, rather than risk having something forced on us.

I know that Groom is not the only school that is in trouble. White Deer ISD, who had so much money last year that they had to give Groom \$60,000, is looking at a deficit of \$240,000 in the coming year.

A merge would be a long process. Nothing could happen unless residents of both Groom and Grandview-Hopkins Districts agreed. Maybe something like this is the answer to our problems rather than cutting programs and running off all our experienced teachers. It's just food for thought... and I think some of us are starving!

## Foot-and-Mouth Disease (FMD) Outbreaks 1/00-2/01



## Foot & Mouth Disease Marches Westward ... North America Untouched By Outbreaks So Far

Animal health officials in Texas are watching with concern the relentless westward march of foot-and-mouth disease (FMD), the most recent outbreak of which was confirmed in late February at several sites in England, where livestock operations already have been financially ravaged by the brain-wasting disease, BSE (bovine spongiform

encephalopathy) and outbreaks of the viral infection, hog cholera. Additional cases of FMD have been detected among cattle, sheep, and swine in Great Britain (encompassing England, Wales, and Scotland). In addition to the loss of thousands of animals, British farmers may lose as much as \$73 million just from the week long ban (which could be extended) on the transport and marketing of livestock susceptible to the disease.

FMD, which has not been in the U.S., is caused by a highly infectious virus that can cause death or disabling blisters and sores in and around the mouth, muzzle, teats, and feet of livestock with cloven or "split" hooves. Cattle, pigs, sheep, goats, and deer are highly susceptible, and can exhibit clinical disease signs after an incubation period of only three to eight days. To stop the spread of infection, affected or exposed animals must be slaughtered, then burned or buried. Premises and equipment must be disinfected to prevent disease spread.

"Foot and mouth virus poses special challenges, requiring proper disinfection and biosecurity protocols.

People who have worked around or been near infected animals can inadvertently carry and spread the virus via their equipment, cars, clothing, shoes, or even for a short time in their lungs or pharynx (throat)," said Linda Logan, Texas State Veterinarian and head of

the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC), the state's stock health regulatory agency. She pointed out that studies indicate the virus can drift up to 40 miles on the wind, another hurdle to confining an FMD outbreak to a defined geographic area. "FMD is probably the most economically damaging livestock disease." The disease is currently affecting four of the world's seven continents: Asia, Africa, South America, and Europe, leaving only North America, Australia, and Antarctica free of the disease.

"An outbreak costs a country millions of dollars to fight, and thousands of animals can be lost. Additionally, livestock markets must be closed to prevent spread of infection, dairies may not be able to operate, and transportation of livestock must cease. Furthermore, there's the cost of depopulating and disposing of affected or exposed animals and vaccinating clean animals to create a "disease-free

buffer zone," said Dr. Logan, a specialist in tick-borne and foreign animal diseases. She also serves on a national team reviewing how best to safeguard U.S. livestock from foreign diseases and pests.

Dr. Logan urged
