

Bruce and I both made it to the final round and whoever won the race was going to have a significant lead in the chase. points chase. Unfortunately, Bruce broke his car during the semi-final run and as luck would have it, we were the only guys at the track who had a welder to fix Bruce's problem. Without team hesitation offered to fix Bruce's car so we could race him in the final. We fixed the car, got Bruce on the track and then we ended up winning the race in a close final round against him. I was so proud of my team for what they had done that day. Not many teams would have shown that kind of sportsmanship. 





"PRODUCTIVITY APPRAISAL" MAY LOWER THE PROPERTY TAXES ON YOUR FARM OR RANCH LAND

Texas law allows farmers and ranchers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on market value This "productivity value" means qualified land is taked based on its ability to produce crops and livestock - not its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

WHEN IS THE APPLICATION DEADLINE? If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to the Carson County Appraisal District by May I to take advantage of this benefit on your 2001 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by May 1. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty.

DO YOU NEED TO REAPPLY ANNUALLY? If your land already receives agricultural productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.


