

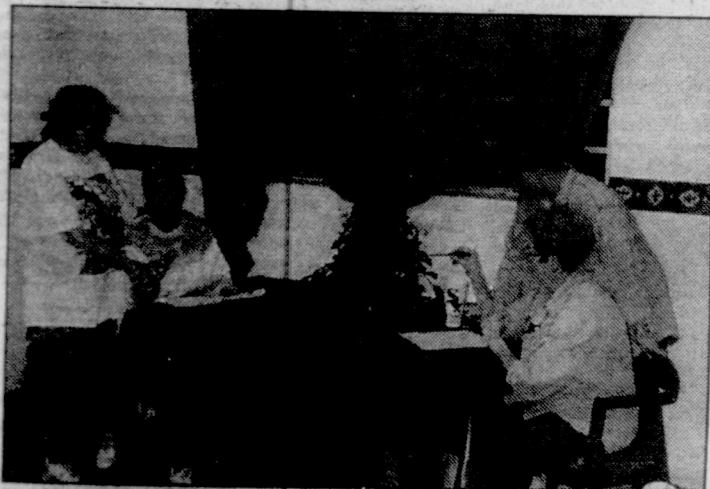

Ideas were discussed about how to bring in people since this year is not a reunion year. A chili cook-off or a chuck-wagon cook-off were a few of the ideas mentioned. A parade master was also discussed.

Fundraisers were discussed also to help pay for rodeo costs, but no decision was made regarding this matter.

McLean Feedyard Women Play Tough Basketball Game Against Celanese

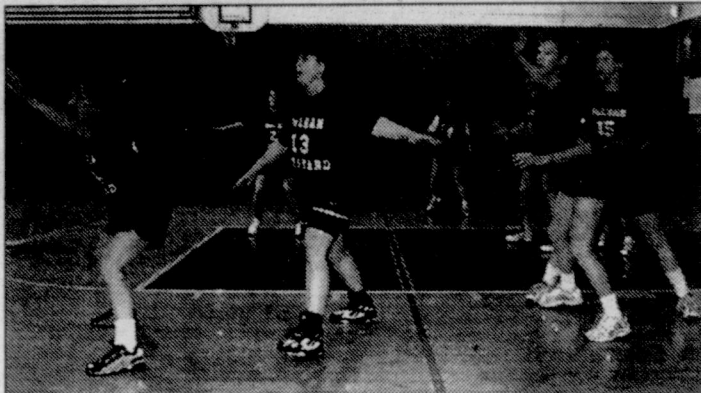

McLean School Board Hears Proposal To Accept Bids For Former Alanreed School

The McLean Independent School District Board of Education met for a regular meeting at 7:00 p.m. on February 21, 2000. Board members present were Mike Darsey, Billie Ward, Neal Odom, John Holland, Don Dorsey and Bob Glass. Others present were John Griffin, Superintendent, Pam Crockett, Secretary, Dick Crockett, Elementary Principal, Blaze Herring, Margaret Milam, James Burch, Toni Bohlar, Sally Bohlar, Bob Adams, David Crockett, Quentin Newton and Terri Adams. Absent from the meeting was T.D. Simmons.

All votes were unanimous unless otherwise stated.

The meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m. by Neal Odom, President. Opening prayer was led by John Holland.

Minutes of the regular meeting of January 17, 2000 were approved.

There were no visitor comments.

The Board went into executive session at 7:03 p.m., to discuss the Alanreed Property with Sally Bohlar and Billy Bob Adams and returned to open session at 7:25 p.m.

Mr. Griffin proposed that the McLean ISD put the Alanreed property up

for bid and that the Board can reject any or all bids. Mr. Griffin is to contact the school's lawyer regarding the bid specifications and insurance.

Shandee Tolleson was unable to attend the meeting due to illness. Quentin Newton spoke on behalf of the Little Drib-

blers wanting the basic basketball skills to be taught in P.E. Mr. Griffin's recommendations are being made as to what needs to be done to improve the P.E. program, which needs to be well rounded and not just consisting of basketball.

Mr. Griffin called for the School Board Election to be held on May 6, 2000, with two seats open (Neal Odom, John Holland).

Recommendation was made by Mr. Griffin to hire Molly McDowell as election judge, and for her to pick her own clerks to work the School Board Election.

Mr. Griffin informed the Board that Cleod Billington of CIB would be coming on March 22nd at 10:00 a.m. to discuss repairing the playing floor in the new gym. Replacement cost in preparing a new floor, including the tiger graphi-

cs are estimated at \$50,000.00, for which the insurance company would be liable.

Mr. Griffin proposed that 2 route buses were needed, and recommended 22 passenger Blue Bird

Elementary school librarian, Freda Holland announced that as of February 22, 7,996 books have been tested by Kindergarten through eighth grade with a school average of 86.6%.





The following bids were submitted: National Bus Sales bid \$29,000.00 for a 2000 model GMC Carpenter Cadet P-Series, 32 passenger; ATC Thomas Buses bid \$32,762.00 for a 22-passenger GMC, and \$34,670.00 for a 1999 Thomas O40MS, 19 passenger GMC. Texas School Bus Center bid \$33,800.00 for a 2000 model 22 passenger GM. State Wide Bus Sales bid \$32,000.00 for a 19-passenger 2000 model GM. Blue Star Bus

Sales bid \$33,720.00 for 2000 model/22-passenger GMC with a Chevy chassis. Mr. Griffin recommended a 5-year lease purchase from Blue Star because of a good history in past dealings with them, and the quality of their equipment holds up better and longer than any other buses. The proposal was approved and delivery can be expected in 30 to 90 days.

Financial Reports A, B and C were approved and approval was granted to pay January bills as presented.

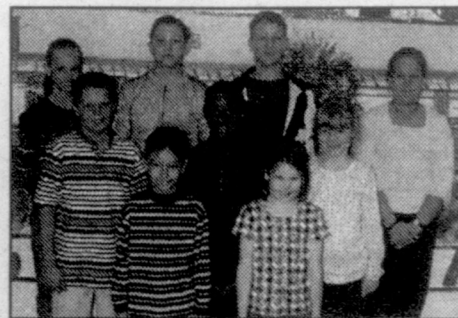
The Board went into executive session at 8:45 p.m. to discuss rehiring of administrative employees. The return to open session came at 11:35 p.m. for voting purposes.

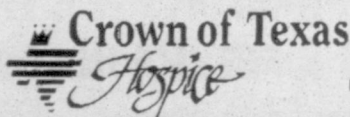

Scoring in the game were Zach Richardson with 8 points, Logan Sparling 6. Trent Darsey and Jacob Conners both put in 4 points each. Mark Smith, Tyler McMinn and Chase Bohlar put in two more points each. The Claude team scored 2 points for McLean.

County Commissioners Discuss Animal Control

Gray County Commissioners met in special session on February 1. All members were present except Jim Greene.

An invocation was given followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Minutes were approved for the January 14 meeting.

County Attorney Alvey addressed the court on the issue of animal control regulations. He pointed out that a County Commissioners Court only has the right to do what the statutes say it can do. There is very little the court can do immediately. There are statutes dealing with dangerous dogs attacking people or farm animals. According to the statutes, 100 people would have to sign a petition requesting an ordinance of animal control. This would have to be placed on the ballot of the next election and approved by voters. Then the county would require registration of every dog in the county, including those in Pampa, Lefors and McLean. A registration fee would be charged and each animal would be tagged.

Glennette Goode addressed the Court. She stated hunting dogs had gone on her property and killed the family pet. She asked the Court's help in proposed legislation that would address the issue. She stated she did not want to sue anyone. She just wants the law changed.

Doddie James asked if open range laws affected this issue. Mr. Alvey said "no."

Kim Jones stated she had raised llamas and miniature donkeys; but sold them because of the dog attacks on them. She said there was a very serious problem with dogs in Gray County and always has been.

Commissioner Wright suggests the Court check with other counties and game wardens to see how they handle the problem.

No action was taken. Coverage for Hoover Volunteer Fire Department as the first response department was approved.

Joe Millican, representative of the Hoover Fire Department, told the Court the volunteer department was created in 1989. At that time the department had 2 trucks and 10 volunteers and covered a 52 square mile area. Today, the department has 26 men and 9 trucks. One truck is a rescue truck. They still cover the same 52 square mile area. Mr. Millican requested an additional 52 square mile area along Highway 60. The area is 13 miles long and 4 miles wide at its widest point.

A high bid of \$750 was accepted from Lance A. Swan for a 1979 GMC Pickup.

An election services contract with the Republican Party was approved.

Approval was granted for a jury reimbursement fee at \$6.00 for anyone who responds to summons and \$15.00 for each day or fraction of each day served as a juror, effective February 1, 2000. This fee is for Justice of the Peace, County and District Courts.

Employees of the four precincts will be enrolled in a safety incentive program.

Cost will be approximately \$41.33 per employee per year. The cost will be paid from the Loss Control Budget. If the program is successful in the precincts, the sheriff's office and courthouse employees will be added at a later date.

Monthly bills in the amount of \$263,617.44 were approved for payment.

Gray County was awarded the Gold Award by the United Way.

High Plains Food Bank sent a thank you letter.

White Deer Land Museum will have a seminar February 14, 2000 from 4 p.m. to 6 p.m.

McClellan Watershed sent Gray County a thank you letter.

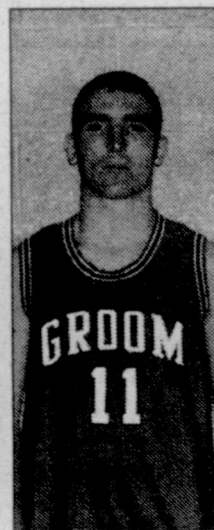

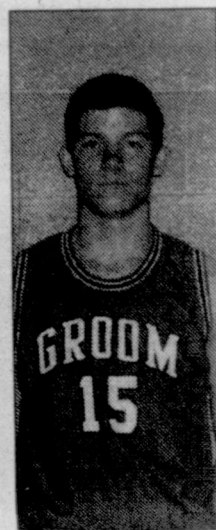

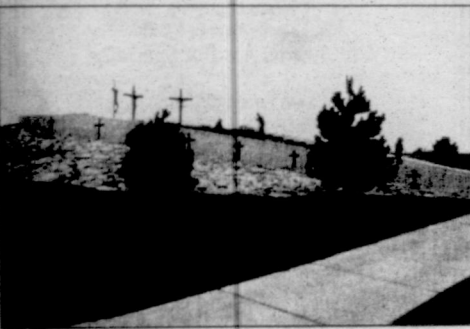

Co. Commissioners Say No To County Burn Ban

The Carson County Commissioners met in regular session on February 28th with the members and officers present as follows: Judge Lewis Powers, Commissioners Mike Britten, Kenneth Ware, Jerry Strawn and Kevin Howell.

The motion passed to pay all claims.

Money was moved from the reserve funds to Precinct #1 operating account. The \$20,000. transfer request will cover the cost of a truck purchased earlier for that precinct.

Judge Powers received approval of the court to hire William Young to fill the courthouse maintenance position. Young is currently holding that job on a part time basis until completion of a school. He will be employed full time in May.

The court agreed to approve a 9-1-1 contract with Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The standard contract places a 50 cent charge

on each person's monthly phone bill to fund the inter-local agreement. The PRPC has, since 1989, developed plans for the establishment, operation and maintenance of 9-1-1 services in the Panhandle area.

Judge Powers discussed the possibility of a burn ban for the county. The judge said that several requests have been made because of extreme dry and windy conditions. The court agreed not to impose a restriction at this time. The commissioners discussed ways to educate the public on general requirements for allowable outdoor burning and the liabilities.

Discussion was held on the appointment of a local rabies control authority because of rules from the Texas Health and Safety Code. Judge Powers recommended Gary Robertson for that position. The motion carried.

Sheriff Shows Breakdown of Cost For City Marshall

While the City continues to grapple with the possibility of hiring a city marshall, more information has been received from County Sheriff Gary Robertson concerning the cost of outfitting such a person.

Aside from salary costs, outfitting the marshall with a car and basic equipment such as guns, portable radios, bullet proof vests, etc. would cause an initial outlay of approximately \$30,000.00. County Deputy cars average lasting 3 or 4 years, but residents could expect a marshall's car to last longer due to the fact that it most likely would not be driven as many miles.

County Deputies earn a salary and benefits package that ranges between \$27,555. to \$29,779.65. A city marshall's salary would be based on the number of hours he was expected to work, on call hours and many other factors. The benefits might also be negotiated although full time employees of the city currently receive retirement, health insurance, several paid holidays and vacation annually. On-going training would also need to be considered.

The benefits of a local law enforcement officer

would also mean some income from citations. With the ability to enforce city ordinances, a marshall would have the authority to cite residents who do not comply with local laws concerning speed limits, illegal parking, and many other problems that face the city.

Also new since the last article, Sheriff Robertson has filled all the slots open on his force. None of these new employees will be residing in Groom. Furthermore, no deputy would be allowed to accept a stipend from the city in return for patrolling a few hours a week.

"We came to this decision after talking to the county attorney and the county judge, that such an arrangement might pose a conflict of interest," stated Sheriff Robertson.

This will remove one option from the city for consideration.

Commissioners

The City of Panhandle asked the court to pay for fire calls that were made in March 1998. The claims had never been presented. Judge Powers made the motion to pay \$4550 from the current budget and the motion passed.

Court adjourned until March 13, 2000.

City Of Panhandle Awarded Grant

The city of Panhandle was awarded more than \$250,000. last week by the Texas Transportation Commission to help dress up downtown's Main Street.

Panhandle City Manager reports that this is a dream to be a part of it Finalization for the city.

The money will be used for "streetscape" project beginning at the Carson County Courthouse and ending at the Panhandle City Hall.

"The project includes widening sidewalks, adding pedestrian lightning, trees and brick walkways," said Amarillo TxDOT District Engineer Mack Thomlinson.

The cost of the project is estimated at \$510,000. with TxDOT contributing \$250,427.50. The balance of the project will be paid for by the Panhandle Economic Development Commission.

The project is due to begin in March.

41st Annual Sausage Dinner Slated

St. Francis parishioners are making preparations for their 41st Annual Sausage Dinner on Sunday, March 12, according to Raymond and Jeriann Nobile, Sausage Dinner chairmen.

The Sausage Dinner has undergone an evolution over the past 41 years. Dinners were first held at St. Francis in the 1930s as a way for the parish to raise funds to keep the little rural church afloat during the depression and dust bowl years. In 1959, the ladies of the parish rejuvenated the idea of an annual Sausage Dinner. The sausage was served as patties that first year, but was not well received and the idea of serving link sausage was born.

Throughout the 1960s, parishioners gathered at neighboring farms to process their home-raised hogs into sausage for the dinner. Three hogs were butchered that first year, but as popularity of the dinner increased into the 1970s, the parish found itself unable to accommodate the demand. In 1972, the parish hired a meat processor to make the sausage using the "secret recipe." The late John and Theresa Leven originated the sausage-seasoning recipe. That recipe is still used today, with only a small few

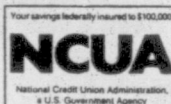

have damaging infestations in isolated fields. More fields will likely become infested over the next 30 days. Under certain conditions some of the greenbugs will develop wings and fly to


other fields rapidly spreading the infestation. Continue to monitor wheat for newly developing greenbug infestations.





22,000 Acres Burn In & Near Carson Co.

At approximately 6:30 p.m. on February 22 the Carson County Sheriff's Department was notified by Potter County officials that a fire that initially started in Potter County had entered into Carson County and was burning in a northeasterly direction.

The range fire was fought and thought to be contained late that night, but flared up again at approximately 6 a.m. on the morning of February 23. Fire units were again dispatched to the area and fought the burning until approximately 12:00 noon on the 23rd and again in the afternoon until 5:30 p.m.

There was estimated 35 square miles of range land burned, approximately 22,000 acres (7 miles long x 5 miles wide).

There were three structures threatened, but there was no loss of any.

The cause is still undetermined, but, believed to be caused by careless disposal of a cigarette. The reason for the three different flare ups was because of the rugged terrain and the high winds. During the entire incident, there were 50 fire fighting trucks used, by 100+ fire fighters in a joint effort from Potter,

Pantex, Panhandle, Frftch, Stinnett, White Deer, Skellytown, Groom, Texas Parks and Wildlife, Texas Forestry Service, various ranchers, as well as, the county maintenance crews from Potter and Carson. There was no damage to vehicles or personnel. At this time there is no estimated cost.

Extreme Fire Danger Warning

The South Plains and the Panhandle are under an extreme fire danger warning, according to the region's Texas Forest Service Regional Fire Coordinator Les Rogers. Current high winds, low humidity and a heavy fuel load have created the potential for wind-driven fires. This week, Rogers asks that residents postpone all outdoor burning. The South Plains and the Panhandle will not be out of extreme danger until significant rainfall and spring green-

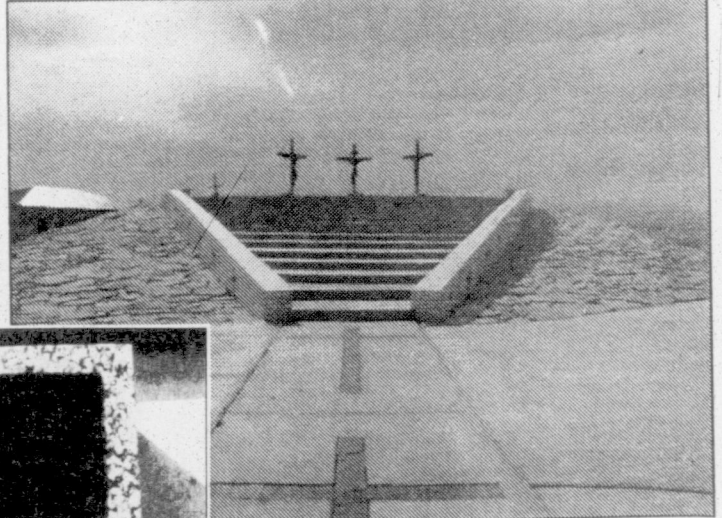
