## City Tables Replacement For G.E.D.C. President

The Groom City Council met in regular session last week with the following present: Mayor Joe Homer, Aldermen Don Case, Ellis Stapp, Pete Ham, and Jimmy Britten; employees Mary Sue Lyles and Donnie Evans. Alderman Mary Margaret Brooks was absent from the proceedings.

Minutes of the September 8th meeting were read and approved. Payment of bills and the financial statement were read and approved.

The council unanimously approved to amend the budget as follows:

General Fund: Electricity up \$40.00 for a total of \$2540.00; Waterworks Fund:

Electricity up \$65.00 to a total of \$19,565.00; Trash up \$100.00 to a total of \$51,600.00.

A discussion was held concerning water vending machine rates. Voting in favor of leaving the rates as is were Jimmy Britten, Pete Ham and Don Case. Voting no was Ellis Stapp.

A discussion concerning an ordinance requiring an application for connection, contents and meter deposit for those wanting to have city water who do not live in the city limits was held. The Aldermen voted to table the item until more information could be obtained.

The Council approved continuation of the ACH agreement with State

National Bank of Groom at an annual cost of \$120.00.

Fire Marshall Glen Smith asked the council to consider placing a fire hydrant on the south side of Front Street (Old Route 66). The Council voted not to act on the recommendation at this time.

No action was taken on the matter of electing a new GEDC Board member to replace current President Ben Ingham, since Ingham has not formally resigned.

With no further business the meeting was adjourned.

## G.E.D.C. Discusses "Assisted Living" Options For Community Center

The Groom Economic Development Corporation met on October 6, 1998 at their usual meeting place with the following members present: Secretary Joyce Hutsell, and members Kathleen Barkley, Clif Britten, Sandra Britten, and Greg

Lamb, and with the following member absent: Ben Ingham. Brenda Guess of Pampa was a guest.

Joyce Hutsell called the meeting to order. Mr. Lamb moved and Mrs. Barkley seconded to approve the minutes as

read.

Brenda Guess reviewed her experience in the operation of assisted living facilities and offered suggestions on the floor plan, grant assistance, and renovation of the south side of the community center.

Discussion items included the improvement of rental facilities so that potential residents could experience living in

Groom. The impending resignation of Ben Ingham resulted in a consensus recommendation to the City of Groom that Phillis Jackson be appointed to the commission should she agree to serve.

No further business was presented and the meeting was duly adjourned.

## Tigers "45" Ft. Elliott

The Groom Tigers made good on their promise of being an "Equal Opportunity Team," as they treated Fort Elliott no differently than the other teams they have played, meaning they Forty-Fived them!

"The boys were not as emotional about this game as they have been others. But it didn't seem to effect their overall performance," commented Coach Larry Reid.

If anything factored greatly in the results of the game it was the wind.

"The wind hurt the Cougar's game because they rely so heavily on passing. It affected us also but luckily we also have a pretty good running offense to fall back on," Reid continued.

Fort Elliott connected on only 10 of 24 attempts for 70 yards and one touchdown. They had been averaging nearly 300 passing yards per game. They rushed seven times losing 7 yards, and completed

only five first downs.

Grooms passing game, also hampered by the wind, was nominal, completing 2 of 7 passes for 63 yards. However, the two completed passes were "quality," resulting in two touchdowns.

The Tigers rushed 22 times for 286 yards. They completed 11 first downs. The game ended just after the half with the "45" mercy rule for a final score of 52-6.

Daniel Treadwell opened the scoring for Groom on a 10-yard run early in the first quarter. He carried the ball twice for 16 yards and the already mentioned T.D. He also had two unassisted tackles. Treadwell was injured shortly after he scored, dislocating his finger. He is expected to be able to play this week.

Dean Fields carried the ball six times for 51 yards and two touchdowns. He had an 11 yard run early in the first quarter and a 15 yard run in the second



The Little Flower circle will be in charge of setting up and decorations. The Regina Coeli circle is in charge

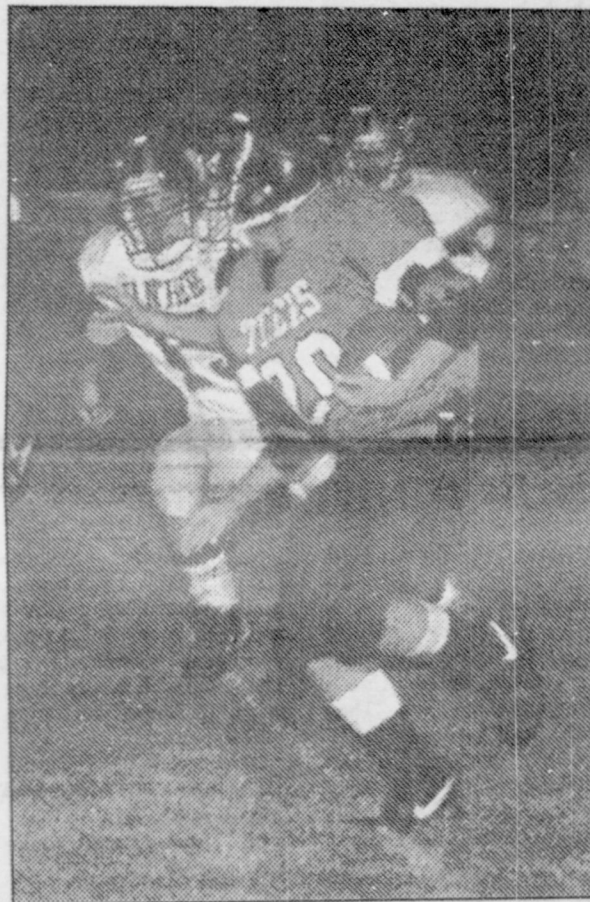
of advertising and running the bake sale and Saint Monica circle is in charge of preparing the meal.

Kathleen Barkley will be in charge of the craft booths again this year. The cost will be \$10.00. If anyone is interested, please give a call at 248-7070.

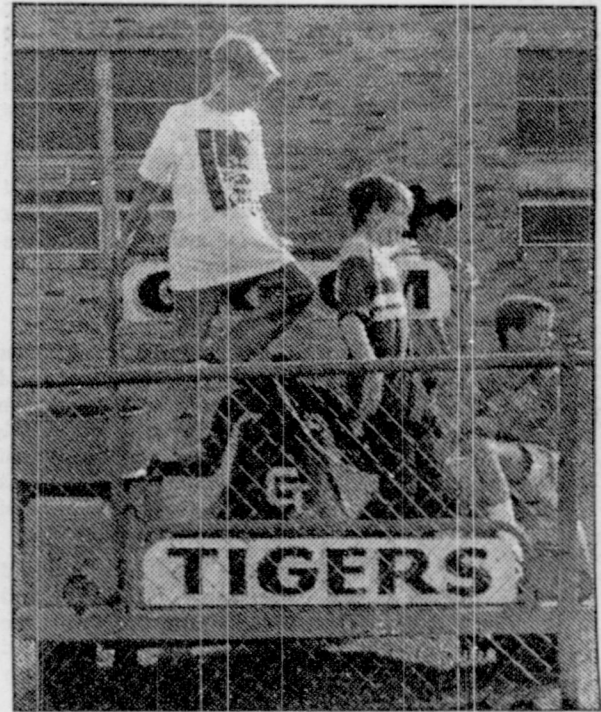

## Players Lead Area Stats

Stats for area teams are in and Groom is showing a respectable lead in many of the areas. In team offense, Groom was listed as 3rd, with 1544 yards rushing and 562 yards passing. Average for the Tigers figures out to 351. 1st place was Silverton with 1729 yards rushing and 915 yards passing earning an average of 434.5. 2nd place went to Ft. Elliott with 764 yards rushing and 1824 yards passing for an average of 431.3

Groom leads the group in team defense. They held their opponents to 234 yards rushing and 469 yards passing, for an average of 78.1.

The Tigers boast two players in the individual rushing. Dean Fields came in 4th in rushing

with 40 carries for 615 yards and 7 touchdowns. Wade Ritter earned 5th place with 51 attempts for 487 yards and 9 touchdowns.

Josh Evenson was named as 3rd place with 29 of 49 passes completed for 552 yards and 14 touchdowns. Wyatt Weinheimer was 9th receiver, catching 13 times for 211 yards and 7 touchdowns.

Wade Ritter also was named 5th in the scoring stats. He has scored a total of 12 touchdowns for 72 points. Jamie Shuck was named 6th with 3 touchdowns, and 21 point after attempts for a total of 60 points.

The Tigers work well as a team, the fact that there is no one big star of the team seems to be the key to their success.

The Tigers did an awesome job offensively as well as defensively. They rushed 25 times for 158 yards and two touchdowns.

Quarterback Grant Weinheimer connected on six of nine passes for 164 yards and three touchdowns.

Garrett Britten had a fabulous night, carrying the ball 12 times for 126 yards and two touchdowns. He also connected with

Quarterback Grant Weinheimer for a 13 yard T.D. pass. He had one interception and two kick off returns, one of which he ran in 64 yards for another touchdown making his total four for the game. He also scored three times on the point after attempt. He had six unassisted tackles.

Clay Ritter also did a good job earning two touchdowns for the Tigers. The first on an 18 yard pass and the second on a 53 yard

pass. He received three times for 121 yards. Clay contributed 12 unassisted tackles and a quarterback sack to the win.

Russell Conrad rushed for 15 yards on five carries and received for 24 yards. He scored on a P.A.T. and had two unassisted tackles.

Cody Bivens carried the ball six times for 25 yards and had 4 unassisted tackles.

Wyatt Britten connected on a pass for six yards.

Josiah Scott earned six unassisted tackles for Groom.

Trey Britten intercepted one of Miami's passes and had six unassisted tackles.

John Carroll had six unassisted tackles and a fumble recovery to help the team effort.

Hugh Weinheimer had three unassisted tackles.

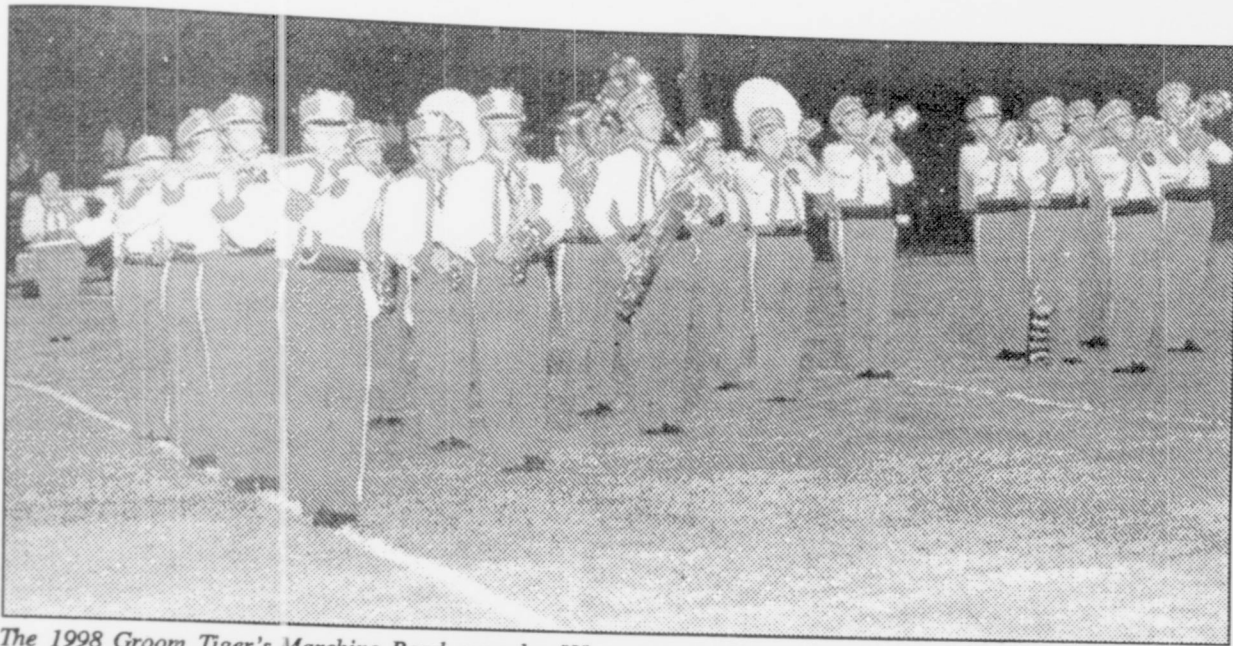





funeral home. Creed is originally from Memphis, Texas and Wanda is from Canadian, Texas. They brought up four children in McLean Schools.

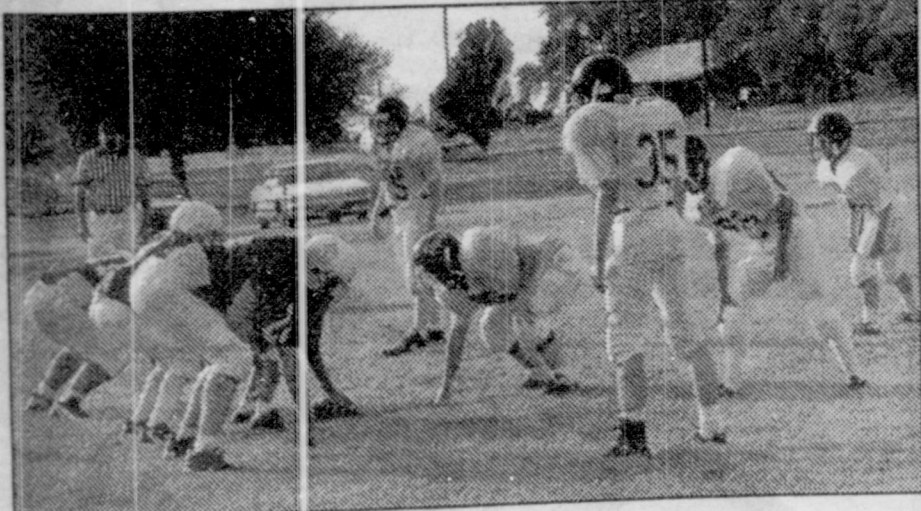
