Many will remember when for all farmers and ranchers. farmers in a five-state area fell for four dollar a pound grass seed in the early 1950's that turnure as outlined above was followstory about a Spring wheat variety that could produce close to seventy-five bushels of wheat per acre on one inch of moisture.

According to Dr. Kenneth Porter, agronomist, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Bushland, under Progress Report No. 2174, "Returns from Spring seeded wheat have never been profitable in Texas."

The Crop Quality Council, an Industry - State - Federal Service on wheat says, "Based on evidences available from this first year of tests; we conclude that the processing qualities of the wheat in question are not acceptable. Econnomically important deficiencies in milling, processing, and blending characteristics of the wheat in question revealed in these tests, suggest to us that the commercial baking industry will seek alternate sources of wheat supplies because of the extent of the undesirable characteristics of the Spring wheat in question."

R. J. Hodges, agronomist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says, "Texas has a good quality short-strawed wheat for irrigation on high yield level acreage called Sturdy, so why grow a poor quality, spring type that may be winter killed."

The first thing most reputable believe they have an outstanding new seed variety is get some of this seed in the hands of local Texas Agricultural Experiment Station for testing.

I would recommend that before you jump off the deep end and purchase any high-priced seed, to check and see what our Agricultural Experiment Stations think of the seed.

Don't forget it was the Texas Experiment Station that developed hybrid milo that has returned hundreds of millions of dollars of extra profits to the mile producers in the nation.

It was at one of the Texas Experiment Stations that the male, sterile screwworm fly was produced that eradicated the screwworm from Texas and saved Texas livestock producers an estimated 100 million dollars a
